(Editor's Note: A little more than a year ago a strange soldier walked into the office of the Times and offered his services to the editor for the three days that he would be here on a pass. He worked faithfully for those three days. Sunday he came back to Ranger to visit the friends he had made here and wrote the following article for the Times.)

It's been 14 months since we visited Ranger. That was 23 pounds, four teeth and one Pfc. stripe ago. In spite of all the water that's passed under the bridge, we've always had a soft spot for the old place. It's tough to explain why—maybe it's the neon on the oil derrick or tubu again it could be the coffee and rolls at the Zaramount.

Things have changed an in every American community. Folk don't ask a soldier when he's going overseas or when he's going home. The major sign now consists on "When are you getting out of the Army?" The answer is points, age, dependents and how many congressmen the khalid had his finger on. There's a lot of advice we can give to people honoring the return of sons, fathers and brothers from the fighting fronts. In all the time we've served, we never yet have spotted a man that wanted to be showered with favors because he was privileged to wear the uniform of his nation's fighting forces. Give your boys a chance to welcome themselves home.

GI Joe will naturally expect to be invited to civic functions, parties and the usual relative inspections. Don't lay it on too thick. Don't tell him you'll help him find his place in society. Let the ex-serviceman find his own way—on his own two feet.  
Soon we'll discover that he'll find his way to the Church of his choice—the friends he enjoyed—and the things in life he most desires.  
He'll take his job in the oil field, behind counters, return to a profession or perhaps wind up in the hospital—mortality Chief Murphy is silently planning.  
Who knows—you may see them to the important posts in this city. And that's the way it should be for they've earned the right to plot the course of our peacetime "ship of state."

## Everett Weaver Gets Discharge From U.S. Army

Everett Weaver, for the past 28 months in the service of the Army has received his discharge and is now back home. The discharge was issued to Weaver at Atlanta, Georgia.  
"Of the 28 months in service, 18 were served in foreign duty in the European war where he was in the thick of the battle for Germany having gone in with the invasion forces of D-Day on June 6, 1944.

## Sgt. Camacho At Hospital In Washington State

Madigan Hospital Center, Fort Lewis, Washington—Encouraged by a speedy trip to the United States and anxious to be returned to their homes, men from Texas including Sgt. Arturo R. Camacho of Ranger were among a group of EAMP's (Repatriated American Military Personnel) who have arrived at Madigan General—the beginning of a dream they often thought would never come true.  
They will be processed here and then sent, whenever possible, to the army hospital nearest their home. There they will be given brief furloughs, then returned to the hospital for eventual disposition. This means further hospitalization, discharge or return to army duty.  
Generally, the men are in good health despite a torturous period of confinement in Japanese prison camps ranging from 36 to 44 months. Most of them tell stories of brutal treatment and forced labor with little or no food clothing or medical care. In many cases they were beaten unmercifully, without reason and this was the order of the day—beatings became routine. Mostly, they are prisoners from action connected with the fall of Bataan and Corregidor, and are entitled to wear the following decorations: Asiatic Pacific ribbon with one star, Philippine Defense ribbon with one star, American Defense ribbon with one star, Presidential Citation with two clusters, and the Good Conduct Medal with clasp. Some have earned other individual citations.

# President Truman Asks For One Year Military Training

## SITE FOR PLANT TO BE SELECTED

Doug Anderson of Breckenridge who is going to build a locker plant in Ranger, was in Ranger Monday afternoon, looking at locations where the plant might be constructed.

Anderson stated that he had ordered the machinery for this plant and he would make his decision where the plant is to be located within a week's time. He contemplates buying a building and remodeling rather than building a new building because of shortage of material. The plant can be completed much sooner in this manner than if a new building was constructed.  
Anderson further stated he was on his way to College Station to attend a three-day school in refrigeration and post-war locker operation and that he hoped to bring back with him plans that would make the Ranger locker plant one of the most modern plants that has ever been built in the State of Texas.  
The plant will be equipped with slaughtering facilities, processing and curing services for meats, fruits and vegetables.  
His equipment will be 100 per cent Frigidaire.  
Anderson further stated that when he returns from College Station he will have information that will be complete in detail as to the plant's location and everything concerning the progress he is making.  
He plans to put in a plant with 500 lockers now and the plant will be large enough to increase it to 697 lockers.  
Persons wanting lockers can make their deposit for a box at the Chamber of Commerce or the Commercial State Bank and they will be given a receipt. The lockers will rent for \$12.00 and \$15.00.

## T-5 E. L. Martin In University In England

SHRIVENHAM, England—Technician Fifth Grade Emmett L. Martin, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Martin of 710 W. Main St., Ranger, Texas, and a former student at Ranger Junior College, is enrolled at Shrivenham—American University in England where the second two-month term opens on 8 October with an enrollment of more than 4,000 students.  
T-5 Martin, who is with the headquarters, 76th Infantry Division, is taking commerce section courses at SAU. He is 29, has been overseas 11 months and has three battle stars. He comments that "my first impression of SAU was that it was well organized."  
More than 350 courses in eight academic departments are offered at SAU, which is operated by the Army's Information and Education Division. The school's mission is to provide courses of college and university grade for personnel awaiting redeployment or in the Army of Occupation.  
Students from all the 48 states attended the first term ranging from private to lieutenant—colonel. Coming from 150 American universities, the faculty consists of 130 leading civilian educators and 100 officers and enlisted men.  
The 760-acre campus has modern brick class buildings and dormitories. Brig. Gen. Claude M. Thiele, commandant, has cut army regulations to the minimum to permit students to concentrate on studies while German prisoners perform most of the housekeeping duties.

## M. L. KIGHT TO DIRECT CHEST DRIVE

At a meeting of the directors of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce held Monday night, Morris L. Kight was named to head the United War Chest Funds drive in Ranger.  
Kight has accepted the place and stated today that as soon as information has been received from the County chairman, Fred Brown of Eastland, it will be passed on to the public.  
It was also announced at the meeting last night that Charles Speers of Cisco, president of the First National Bank in Cisco, has been named county treasurer and a check from one major oil company has already been received.

## Junta Officials Barred From Nat'l Elections

CARACAS, Venezuela (UP)—The Venezuelan revolutionary government issued a decree today prohibiting any member of the present interim Junta from being a candidate for president in a national election scheduled for next April.  
By decree the Junta froze the bank accounts of all persons in the country having more than \$50,000 on deposit. The freezing will be in effect until a three-man commission investigates whether the owners involved in alleged widespread graft during Medina's tenure.  
Former government employees were forbidden to engage in real estate deals of more than \$50,000.  
The government also bid for diplomatic recognition by the rest of the world.

The sale of memberships is to be launched soon and plans for the campaign will be made at the meeting tonight. Mrs. Homer Healy, Ranger chairman, will outline plans suggested by the county organization.  
Initial plans for the organization which will bring three concerts to the county during the winter months, were laid last summer when a representative of Community Concert Service with offices in New York and Chicago, visited Eastland, Ranger and Cisco in the interest of organizing the association. All three towns have agreed to cooperate in the effort.  
Hall Walker and Paul MacDonald have accepted places as directors from Ranger, to fill vacancies unavoidably created.

This announcement was made recently by Captain Jack D. McCullough, Professor of Military Science and Tactics at this institution. Robert is a member of Company D of the Cadet Corps.  
As a Cadet Second Lieutenant of the military unit, Robert will hold a position of responsibility and will be given an opportunity to develop leadership qualities inherent to that rank. "This," Captain McCullough states, "is an opportunity that will prove invaluable in either a civilian or military career."

Masses of Desdemona were in charge of the services at the grave.

## RED REPLY TO SUGGESTION IS AWAITED

WASHINGTON (UP)—The United States awaited Moscow's reply today to a proposal that this country and Britain share equal responsibility with Russia for economic recovery of Hungary.

It was learned at the state department that this government suggested the program of economic collaboration in an October 13 message to Russia and Great Britain.  
A spokesman emphasized that this action did not constitute a protest but was a "presentation of views" resulting from concern over Russo-Hungarian economic pacts that reportedly give Russia a grip on 50 per cent of Hungarian industry.  
The U. S. viewpoint was that any long-term economic agreement concerning an ex-satellite state like Hungary was "a matter of concern and responsibility" for all three signatories of the armistice and the Crimea declaration of liberated Europe.

## U. S. STEEL REJECTS WAGERISE

U. S. Steel corp. today rejected a United Steel Workers of America—CIO—demand for a general 25 cent hourly wage increase for 180,000 workers as the number of American workers idle in strikes dwindled to the lowest point in four weeks.

Acting on behalf of five operating subsidiaries, U. S. Steel president Benjamin F. Fairless told Philip Murray, president of the steelworkers union, and the CIO that the corporation was unable to grant a wage increase. He said CIO ceiling prices and the government's wage stabilization policy made the raise impossible.  
The \$2 per day wage increase was demanded for U. S. Steel workers in the Carnegie-Illinois Steel Co., American Steel and Wire Co., Tennessee Coal, Iron and Railroad Co., National Tube Co. and Columbia Steel Co.  
Fairless termed the union's demand as "staggering."

During his years of service, Marion spent 18 months in the European theatre.  
He is a former champion inline and bull riding at Madison Square Garden in New York.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (UP)—"Hard-headed" John McGreer admitted it and bragged about it. But he didn't live up to it.  
The sideshow Barker was treated for severe scalp lacerations and loss of blood after losing a bet that he could break a pop bottle over his head.

## TO EXEMPT NONE EXCEPT PHYSICALLY DISQUALIFIED

WASHINGTON (UP)—President Truman today called for one year of military training—opposed to military service—for every male American. The training would begin at 18 years of age or upon graduation from high school.

The President told a joint session of Congress that although the United States will use all its moral influence to maintain the peace, the nation must face the fact that peace must be built on power as well as good will.  
"To maintain that power we must act now," the President said. His proposal for universal training provides no exemptions for occupation, dependency, or any other reason except total physical disqualification.  
He said, "I recommend that the training should be for one year." "Each young man should enter training at the age of 18 or upon his graduation from high school, whichever is later but in any event before his 20th birthday."  
"A trainee who completes his high school education in his 17th year should be eligible, with parental consent, to enter the course of training."  
"After the first few months of training, selected trainees who are not physically qualified for military service could be trained in certain skills so that if war came, they could take their place in shipyards, munitions factories and similar industrial plants."  
The president made a sharp distinction between his proposal and conscription.  
"Conscription is compulsory service in the Army or Navy in time of peace or war," he said. "Trainees under this proposed legislation, however, would not be enrolled in any of the armed services. They would be civilians in training."

## BRITISH CUT TAXES

LONDON (UP)—The British labor government, in its first peacetime budget today slashed 10 per cent from the standard income tax and eliminated 2,000,000 more and bull riding at Madison Square Garden in New York.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The question is whether your Uncle Samuel should continue to mind the baby. During the war, the Federal government had to play nursemaid so mama could take a job in a war industry.

This makes government baby-sitting a live issue in Washington, a question on which you should be fully informed.

DURING the war this government nursery business could be justified. There was a man-and-womanpower shortage and it was considered necessary to get every pair of cradle-rocking hands on a riveting gun.

As of the end of the war, there were over 110,000 youngsters being taken care of in government-supported day nurseries of nearly 3000 war production centers.

All of this was according to law. The program was administered by Federal Works Agency under the Lanham Act.

A YEAR ago, General Fleming as FWA Administrator advised state governors that baby tending really was no business of the Federal government. He suggested that plans be made to have this activity taken over by the public school systems.

### Says More Must Study Dentistry

**CHICAGO (UP)**—More persons must study dentistry if Americans are to receive adequate dental care, according to Dr. Harry Strasser, of New York.

"We have the facilities for the education of 3,800 dental students per annum per class," he said. "If we provide the inducements to allow for a graduate group of 3,500 to 4,000 per annum, in about 30 years the entire population would be on a ratio of one dentist per thousand."

At present the nation is short approximately 750 graduate dentists per year, Dr. Strasser said.

"For the freshman class of the school year 1940-41, the registration was 2,895," Dr. Strasser reported. This enrollment, he said, was reduced to 1,972 when these students reached their senior year.

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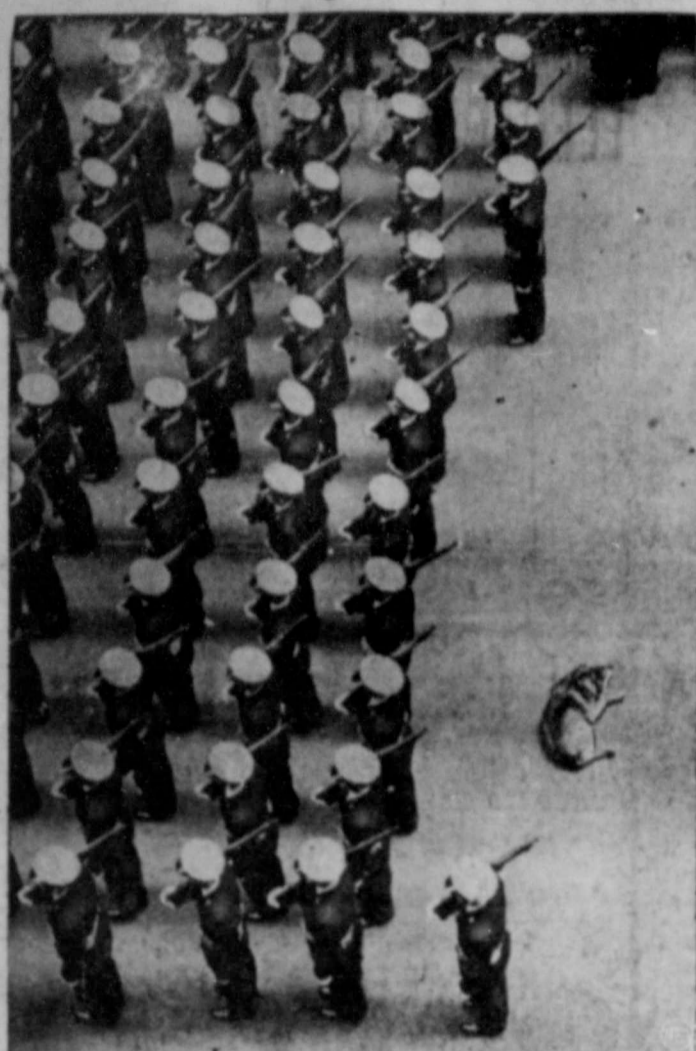

JOSIE BISHOP'S MINE IS MILLION DOLLAR SOURCE OF URANIUM

Pitchblende Deposits Discovered On Mojave Desert May Provide Rich Supply Of Vitrally Needed Ingredients of Atomic Bomb



Josie Bishop has waited for years to vindicated in her claim that her Mojave Desert radium mine was rich in pitchblende. Confirmation came this year, when she was offered \$1,000,000 for her buried treasure. Here Mrs. Bishop stands beside one of her claims. The mine may prove to be an important source for uranium, used in the atomic bomb.

SAN FRANCISCO—Josie Bishop owns a radium mine. Pitchblende, radium-bearing ore, is also the source for uranium—the vital ingredient in the atomic bomb.

For that reason, her buried treasure, 600 feet under the Mojave Desert, is even more important now than it was in 1937, when tests of her Red Rock mine first revealed the presence of pitchblende.

The discovery created an international furor. The Curie Institute in Paris made tests and was convinced. The precious substance was then—and still is—mined at only one place in the world, and that was in Canada. One other mine in the Belgian Congo had long since closed down. Mining interests began to bid for drilling leases on the Red Rock claims.

Fantastic riches were dangled before the eyes of Josie Bishop, self-styled desert rat. She was feted in San Francisco, honored in New York. She planned a home for crippled children—and a refuge for worn-out prospectors. She brought with her to the streets of the cities a whiff of pungent desert holly.

CLAIM MINE "SALTED" Then an "official" test sample ores from her mine showed no traces of radium. There were innuendoes and dark hints that the mine was "salted". Hurt, outraged, disillusioned with the world of business in which she admitted, "I'm a fool," Josie Bishop returned to the desert to lick her wounds. But she never gave up. In the scrawling hand that is the despair of her correspondents, she wrote mining folk the world over.

This year vindication crowned her efforts. Engineers of the Canadian Radium and Uranium Corp. made new and exhaustive tests. They came up with assurance that radium ore is indeed present in Josie Bishop's mine. Triumphant waving the report under the noses of her one-time critics, the doctory desert rat came back. She confronted her former business associates—and wound up with a contract calling for a million dollars—not in a lump sum, but at \$250 a month until the mine starts producing, then on a profit sharing basis, until the million is paid.

"I'm getting old," freely admit the gray haired woman who is better acquainted with a pickaxe than with a bank book. HONESTY PROVEN

"I want to enjoy some of that money before I die. I've proved I'm honest—that's all that matters. Look—they're paying me to live in my own home on my own desert, where there's sage brush and I can breathe. I can still haul water for my morning bath—but I can't stand people thinking I'm not honest."

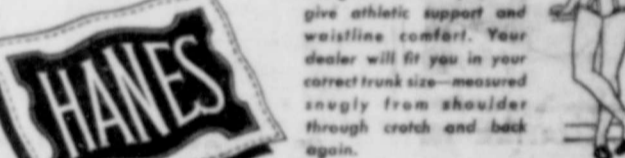
