LINCOLN, Neb. (UP) - Prop cts are goor for finding large commercial deposits of uranium in areas not already being mined, acording to Prof. E. F. Schramm, hairman of the University of Neb nska geology department.

Echramm warned against the anticipated "postwar rash of pros pecting for the metal" to aid in producing atom bombs.

"Instrument makers and device venders whose success in busines ispends upon the stupendous gullibility of human nature soon will be placing their wares upon the market for the purpose of aiding the credulous prospector in his search for uranium ore," the gool ogist said.

Uranium is not rare, Schrame said, but only a few mining dis tricts in the world can produce the ore in commercial quantities without paying an exorbitant price for its recovery.

The four leading deposits are found in Colorado, Utah and Arizona in the United States, the Belgian Congo, northwest Canada and Bohemia. Schramm said. 
