

WLB Setting Up Machinery For Wages Cases

WASHINGTON (UP) - The War Labor Board is setting up machinery to handle voluntary wage cases under President Tiuman's new wage - price policy, it was announced today. Chairman Lloyd K. Garrison

said the board was acting on Mr Truman's request that it establish a Mipartite division to carry on board functions after it is liquidated and until the wage stabili-

laziation act expires next June 30. The new division will not handle labor disputes but will merely pass on voluntary wage increases requiring approval, and handle violations of wage stabilization re-

WASHINGTON, D. C .- Mississippi big-wigs have been worried w about the bad publicity their Senator Theodore Gilmore Bilbo and Representative John Elliott Rankin have been getting. Regardless of what they thought about these men personally, they believed that their antics were giving the state a bad reputation.

So these state leaders back home got together and decided to come to Washington and explain to folks—particularly newspapermen—that there are some pretty solid citizens in and from Mississippi and the place is pretty good generally. They raised close to \$5000 and decided to give a fancy party at the swanky Statler Hotel as the vehicle for their explanation.

Of course, they couldn't come out openly and announce their rea-son for the affair, but no guest was in doubt as to why he was there. The sponsors called it a testimonial dinner for Governor Thomas L. Bailey. Naturally, Mississippi was the motif.


