

WASHINGTON, D. C .- Plans are being made to give this city a badly needed face lifting to make it presentable to the thousands of tourists expected next year and to restore it as the nation's show-

Maintenance and repairs of the national shrines and memorials were drastically curtailed during the war. As a result the weather and pigeons have made eyesores out of otherwise beautiful buildings and numents. Some of the restoration has already begun.

For the first time since the war the White House now can literally be called a white house. It's getting a coat of dazzling white paint, the gardens are being replanted, and the fountains are turned on. One of the big mysteries of the White House gardens, however, is the disappearance of a shipment of tulip bulbs. They were supposed to have arrived weeks ago, a gift from the Netherlands government. Investigation has failed to locate them,

THE Lincoln Memorial has stood up pretty well. Only minor repairs are needed. But the same trouble that has plagued caretakers since it was built continues to bother them, The Memorial has a small flood every morning. When the sun comes out, it warms the air. The marble walls inside don't get the sun and don't warm as fast as the air. This causes condensation. If resulting water was not mopped up, early visitors would get very soggy shoes.

It is known by only a few persons, but the Lincoln Memorial was built with an elaborate heating system. Pipes and ducts run through all the walls. But it has never been connected to the central heating system. If the heating system was connected it would eliminate the condensation nuisance.

A similar but less serious problem of condensation exists in the Jefferson Memorial. More of its surface is exposed to the sun. All of the Capital's 75 lesser monuments are in bad need of a clean-ing. Mortar in the joints of most of them has chipped out. When water gets in and freezes it cracks the marble. This has happened to several. It is estimated it would take about \$75,000 to do the basic job of restoring the Capital to normal.

THE biggest blight is the hundreds of temporary buildings which almost fill the once-beautiful Mall and disfigure most of the parks. Some temporary buildings are left from the first World War.

It is up to each agency to tear down its temporary office buildings and restore the landscape. But office space is still one of the hardest things to get here. Federal Works Agency is trying to get money to build new permanent buildings. Congress is considering that appro-

Probably the most ambitious plan for the additional beautification of Washington is a huge stadium. Most persons agree that it should be built at the end of the Mall opposite the Washington Monument. Whatever is needed, officials hope to have this town as spic and span

Sometimes, if the man is strong enough and wise enough he has been able to hold onto his civilization, to keep his soul free of the primitive thing that war unleashes. Sometimes, he has given way to savage brutality and hatred and fear, and civilization has been stripped from him as completely as though men had not built it painfully for thousands of years. Sometimes, young and impressionable, brought up in an at-mosphere of decency and kindli-ness, the shock of horror and bloodshed is more than his spirit can bear. He believes no more in the decent and kindly things. and he is sick to death of the horrors. He has lost one set of values and has acquired no others to take their place.






