TROPHIES TO HEAD LIST OF GI GIFTS FROM JAPAN

YOKOHAMA (UP) — American Christmas trees come Dec. 25 are going to be decorated with a lot of odd gifts this year—such as Japanese rifles, swords and bugles and dainty but fragile Nipponese toy dolls.

TO ASK UNO MACHINERY TO PROTECT ATOMIC USE

WASHINGTON (UP) — The atomic powers today offered to share all their secrets with the rest of the world as soon as "effective enforceable safeguards" can be established internationally against the atomic bomb.

"On the 6th, the American minister presented to the government of this country—Hungary—a British government communication to the effect that a state of war would break out on the 7th."

Sen. Homer Ferguson, R. Mich. told reporters later, however, it was possible the Budapest message may have had no reference to the Pearl Harbor attack.

He said it might have referred to the British declaration of war on Hungary "which came at that time."

Sees Electronic Cooked Meals Of Frozen Foods

LINCOLN, Neb. (UP) — The American housewife's hopes of preparing full meals from frozen food lockers and of using electronic heat to cook the food in a few minutes are not "far-fetched dreams, but plans which soon will be realities," according to J. Frank Grimes, president and founder of the Independent Grocers' Alliance of America.

Complete frozen food meals will be available at all modern grocery stores within two years, Grimes predicted. They will be stored in home lockers, where the housewives can keep supplies for as long as a year.

New stoves, utilizing electronic heat, will enable cooks to prepare a raw, frozen roast while the family eats the first course of the dinner.

Grimes foresees a controlled economy in which the prices of food, lodging and clothing will be kept down, as the scale of wages increases. Consumers, he explains, will have more money for non-essentials. Additional employment will be possible, and life will be kept on an even keel.

The greatest variety and finest quality foods ever put on the market will sell at the lowest prices in 50 years, in the face of increased wages, he said.

Illinois Museum Gets Lincoln Totem Pole

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (UP) — A historic "Abraham Lincoln" totem pole, carved by Alaskan Indians, is a proud possession of the Illinois State Museum, presented by the Mid Day Luncheon Club of Springfield, where the "Emancipator's" body is entombed.

The pole was carved by Indians of the Raven tribe of Alaska in honor of Lincoln, whom the Indians considered to be their emancipator because of his abolishment of slavery. The Raven tribe had been enslaved by another Alaskan tribe but was freed when a white United States hunter brought the totem pole originally stood 49 feet high and was topped by an eight-foot figure of Lincoln complete in frock coat and high hat.

However, only the figure and 11 feet of the totem shaft were brought to Springfield. The base was left in Alaska.

For three generations the descendants of the tribe have honored Lincoln. Walter Province, president of the club said, "There are probably only three such totem poles in existence. One is in a museum at Juneau, Alaska, one in Seward, Alaska, and the third in Springfield."

Guitar Comes Home To Two Overseas Vets

Baer Army Air Field, Ind. (UP) — While soldiers in one of the barracks at this field sleep because of all-night hillbilly music, two of their buddies ponder over the unusual history of a Spanish guitar.

Here's the story: In April 1942, when Cpl. Sam Ponder and Sgt. Jack Barton were preparing to leave for service overseas, they decided to pop up their lives with musical harmony.

Ponder is from Kentucky and he claims there isn't a hillbilly song that he does not know. Barton had learned to play a guitar at his home in Kansas. The two soldiers hopped off their train at Atlanta, Ga., and bought a second-hand Spanish guitar in a pawnshop.

The guitar kept them company on the Queen Mary between New Jersey and Halesworth, England. Later it accompanied the two soldiers across the English Channel to Chartres, France. Then the instrument changed hands. A swing- guitarist took it and eventually sold it to a sergeant, who gave it to a corporal.

Ponder and Barton lost track of it after that.

Finally, the two soldiers were based at Baer Field for redeployment. One day a stranger walked into their barracks with his baroque bag—and the Spanish guitar.

That's the story. That's why Ponder and Barton spent the night yodeling and playing their guitar. That's why other members in the barracks cannot sleep.

The Bond of a Common Interest

A HOBBY has always been a consolation to men and women whose lives were not satisfactory in other respects; but if it is a profoundly interesting one, it can replace in many ways the excitement of war and serve as a substitute while he grows more accustomed to the normal pace of living.

The wisest woman is the one who will learn to make her husband's hobby her own, to see that a strong common interest holds them together. How many times a marriage, on the very brink of divorce, has been saved and become a happy one because a common interest developed between the man and woman.

There was a couple who had become so bored with one another that they fell into a stricken silence when they were together. Quite by chance, the man's eye was caught one day by a picture in the window of an art gallery. He went back to look at it a second time, and on impulse went into the gallery and bought it. He felt rather foolish when it was delivered, expecting some mocking comment from his wife.

The unexpected happened. His wife was delighted with the picture and took great pains to see that it was well hung and properly lighted. Then she looked around her and laughed.

"It makes everything else in the room look wrong," she exclaimed. "Garish taste, no sense of balance or harmony."

Together, she and her husband began to make plans for the improvements of the room and when it suited them, they started out together, this time to find some more pictures. They are always together now, at auction galleries, in art museums, studying pictures, buying them when they can afford it, so absorbed and interested in their mutual hobby that there is not time enough for all the things they want to discuss.

But that takes money, you say? So little, I have known couples on the tiniest incomes to get equal joy out of inexpensive etchings and water colors. Another marriage had gone on the rocks and the couple was on the point of divorce. The man was a great writer and, just before divorce proceedings were instituted, he went blind. The woman could not, in decency, leave him under the circumstances, so she determined to make the best of her lot. She set herself the job of being her husband's eyes, doing his research, acting as his secretary, and in time became so absorbed in his work that when he recovered his eyesight, there was no more question of divorce.

DURING the reconstruction period after the war, too many men, without any plan in view, will take the first job that comes their way. Finding their own field and preparing themselves for it will be a much better advantage if a happy life, because it will be a productive life.

Certainly, here is a constructive job for the war bride. Study your husband. Find out what he can do best. Do not urge him to take a job whose only advantage is salary, simply because the man next door likes such a job or makes more money at it. Encourage him to enter the field which suits his particular qualifications.

Very likely, he does not know himself what his own qualifications are, what he would like to do. An appalling number of people try to adjust themselves as well as they can to a job, any job, because it was the first to crop up.

There is no satisfaction like that of having a job that suits you, that uses your abilities and gives you a creative interest. Help the returning serviceman to fit himself into such a job and you have made an immense stride in contributing to his well-being, physical and mental, and to his happiness.

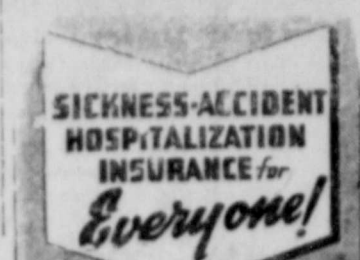

After 12 Tries Frogs Began To Outscore U. of T.

FOOT FORTH, — It took T.C.U. 22 years to win a football game from the University of Texas, but once the Horned Frogs found out it could be done they have managed to win slightly more than their share of the contests.

The two schools met on the gridiron first in 1897, and it was 32 years later—in 1929—before T.C.U. got a victory. In fact, in only three of the 194 games before 1929 did the Frogs even manage to score, although the 1929 contest was a 9 to 0 tie.

T.C.U. became a member of the Southwest Conference in 1923 and the Frogs have played the Longhorns 49 times since that date. Those 49 contests have resulted in 10 victories for the Frogs and eight for the Longhorns and one tie.

Coach Duteh Meyer, who took the reins at T. C. U. in 1934, has produced seven victories in 11 starts. In Austin in 1943, however, the Frogs gave the Longhorns their worst conference defeat, a 10 to 7 affair. Last year, in Fort Worth T. C. U. won 7 to 6.
