In speaking of the campaign to get Christmas gifts for all veterans in hospitals, members of the Legion stressed the fact that this is everybody's opportunity to have a part in making the veterans in hospital have a happier Christmas.

At the open house tonight an all soldier program has been arranged and will be presented by veterans who have returned from World War II. At the close of the program members of the Legion Auxiliary will serve refreshments.

Gifts brought to the open house should have the name and address of the giver attached to the gift and if the gift is wrapped, the contents of the package should be listed on the outside.

## Science Seeks To Focus Radio To Single Point

CHICAGO (UP) - Science, attempting to bridge the gap between the longest light waves and the shortest sound waves, may one day discover how to direct a broadcast to a single point, focusing it as precisely as a small stream of light.

Dr. Phillips Thomas Westinghouse Electric research engineer, recently stated that ultra short-wave radio development has reached a temporary barrier which he said would last only a short time.

"In our efforts to bridge the gap between radio and light waves," he said, "we apparently have reached an impasse, some way around the obstacle has been found."

"Were it possible to still further shorten wave lengths and still obtain reasonable amounts of power, radio waves would begin to act like light waves," he said. "They could be reflected from small mirrors, condensed by small lenses into narrow beams like light beams. Instead of broadcasting them indiscriminately into space, they could be sent to only one receiver point. This would solve the problem always with us in long-wave radio, that of secrecy."

Present limitations seem to lie in the vacuum tube, Thomas pointed out, and once those limitations are passed, a new field of expansion will be opened for further work in shortening sound waves, he said.

## Pittsburgh U. Used \$180,000,000 Worth of Gas

PITTSBURGH (UP) - Freshman, radium class - \$5,000 per lecture.

The University of Pittsburgh's fall term catalogue could have listed such a course at one time. Because that's what the lecturers used to cost - but the students didn't know it - and neither did the professor.

It was Dr. Alexander Silverman's lecture, and he used \$180,000,000 worth of radon gas in six years in the accompanying demonstrations, given three times in one day in each semester.

His former student, Dr. Glenn D. Kammer, became associated with a chemical firm in 1945 and began to work with radium.

Radium is a solid, Dr. Silverman explained, and it is composed of atoms. About half of the atoms break up or disintegrate and give off two gases. One is helium and the other radon.

When Dr. Kammer experimented with the gas back in the early 1920s it was known only as "radium emanation." No uses were known for it.

And so Dr. Kammer presented Dr. Silverman with three three-and-a-half-ounce bulbs of radon each day he gave his lecture on radium.

Today, a sealed tube of the gas, now widely used in radium therapy, filled with one milliecurie, or less than one-millionth of an ounce of radon, sells for \$2.50.

But back in the early '20s Dr. Silverman used \$180,000,000 worth a day just to show the fledgling students how it glowed.

## Russia Refuses To Allow Troops To Fight Rebels

LONDON (UP) - An Iranian embassy spokesman said today that Russia has refused formally to permit Iranian government troops to move against the Azerbaijan rebels in Soviet-held northern Iran.

The spokesman said Russia returned a categorical "no" to five separate notes sent by the Tehran government asking permission to dispatch reinforcements against the rebels.

The Soviet note, the spokesman added, threatened that the Red army would reinforce its own garrisons in northern Iran if the Iranian government tried to move additional troops into that area.

## Delayed Message Was Warning To Pearl Harbor

WASHINGTON (UP) - Army officials in Washington expected half-hour delivery on a warning message sent to Pearl Harbor an hour and seven minutes before the Japanese attack, the Pearl Harbor committee was told today.

The message actually was decoded and delivered seven hours and three minutes after the attack.

## TRUMAN SAYS RECONVERSION PROGRESSING

WASHINGTON (UP) - President Truman said today that re-conversion of U. S. industry from war to peace production was well on its way toward completion.

In a news conference review of the first 100 days of reconversion, Mr. Truman said total employment was rising after the initial post-war layoffs and was now back at the level of V. J. Day. He added that employment is expected to continue to rise.

He warned that inflation pressures are still great, and he saw "danger signals" building up through the winter and spring, particularly in rising real estate, wholesale and raw materials prices.

"We must continue to hold the line," he said. "We cannot permit inflation."

## T. U. To Resume Old Schedule September '46

AUSTIN, Texas - The University of Texas probably will return to its old calendar of a nine-month long session beginning in September, 1946, Dean E. J. Matthews, Registrar, has announced.

Members of the Faculty Council voted recently to return to the regular nine month schedule, but the legislation requires general faculty and Board of Regents approval before it is effective.

When the Naval unit was brought to the University, the school calendar was changed to have a ten-month long session, and two short terms of two months each.

The proposed change will give a two weeks' vacation period at Christmas, and a short summer vacation between terms for faculty members.

## Reunited Couple Will Take No More Chances

SEATTLE (UP) - Mr. and Mrs. Dan Teters are pretty sure their plans won't go wrong this time.

The couple were separated on Wake Island just before the Japanese invasion. Mrs. Teters returned home on the Japanese "peace" ship to Washington. Her husband was taken prisoner by the Japanese a short time later.

## QUESTION OF FURTHER AID FROM U. S. TO BE PROBED

CHUNGKING (UP) - Lt. Gen. Albert C. Wedemeyer, U. S. Commander in China, said today that Gen. George Marshall is coming to China to survey the military situation and make recommendations to President Truman on future military aid to China.

"Few men in the United States" Wedemeyer said, "are better equipped to evaluate the situation than Marshall."

Wedemeyer disclosed that he has opened discussions with the Chinese regarding sale of surplus U. S. Army property in West China.

Meanwhile, President Truman said today in Washington that General Marshall will be given specific, published instructions before he leaves on the near future for Chungking as temporary diplomatic successor to Patrick J. Hurley.

The President said at a news conference that Marshall will adhere to the same policy in China which this country has followed for some time.

He declined, however, to restate this policy.

Mr. Truman also refused to comment on charges voiced by Mr. Hurley when he resigned this week as U. S. Ambassador to China that America's far eastern policy was being sabotaged by the state department's career diplomats.

CHUNGKING (UP) - Lt. Gen. Albert C. Wedemeyer, commander of U. S. Forces in China, said today he had ignored Chinese Communist Gen. Chu Teh's formal protest against American intervention in the civil war because his instructions directed him to deal only with the Chinese Central government.

## Leaders Promise Investigation Of Charges

WASHINGTON (UP) - Responding to angry demands from both republicans and democrats, congressional leaders today promised an investigation into Ex-Ambassador Patrick J. Hurley's blistering indictment of American career diplomats.

Chairman Tom Connally, D., Tex of the Senate foreign relation committee, said he would call both Hurley and Secretary of State James F. Byrnes to get the full story behind Hurley's dramatic resignation as Ambassador to China two days ago.

British Say Soerbaja Taken  
BATAVIA (UP) - The British announced officially today that Soerbaja has been occupied completely and that fighting in Java appeared to be confined to the interior regions and the western part of the island.

At the same time, Indonesian Premier Sutan Sjahrir said he now was prepared to resume talks with the Dutch and British but that the date had not been fixed yet.

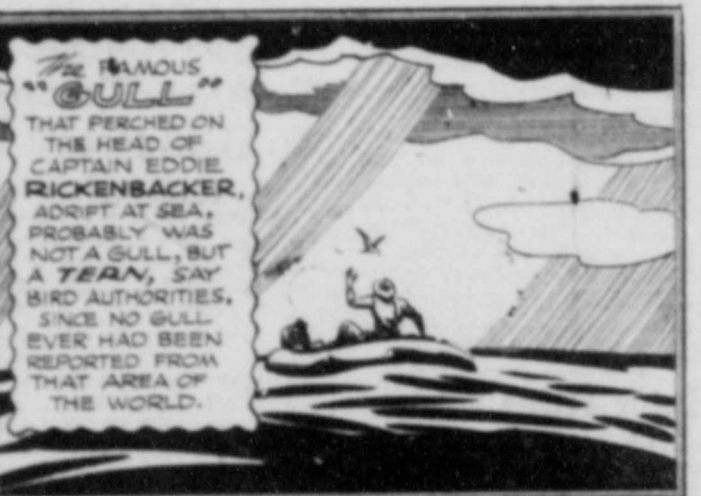
JAPAN'S OBJECTIVES NOT only were the European partners of the Axis unable to coordinate their plans and resources and agree within their own nations how best to proceed, but the eastern partner, Japan, was working in even greater discord.

The Japanese, for many years, bolstered by a fanatical belief in divine guidance and their own spiritual and military supremacy, had planned the domination of the Far East and eventually the world.

What Japan Intended The best estimate of Japan's plan for the accomplishment of her objectives appears to be the following:

- 1. Neutralize or destroy the U. S. Pacific Fleet by an attack on Pearl Harbor.
2. Drive rapidly south over the Philippines and the Southwest and South Pacific islands.

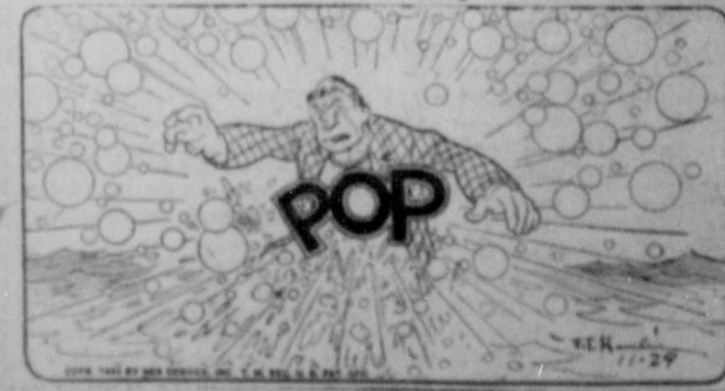

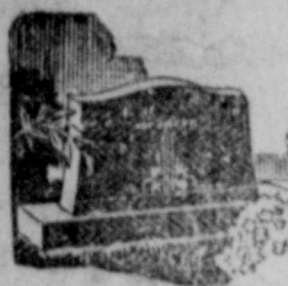




### Honest Burglar Advises Man To Keep Door Locked

### Hails Disabled Veterans For First Class Job

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (UP) — Blinded and maimed veterans are making good at the Marlin Firearms Co., Frank Higgins, personnel director, reports. They have been performing difficult jobs and are "every bit as good as the physically fit," Higgins said.

Take Nick Palermo, Niek was a sergeant of the 45th (Thunderbird) Division when it hit Cisterno, just beyond bloody Anzio Beach

In Italy. A booby trap exploded in his face, destroying his sight. Today his pretty wife, whom he married after his misfortune, cradles him to work at the Marlin plant, where he assembles peep sights for 22-caliber rifles.

Palermo's buddy at the next bench is Jim Mathis, a former platoon leader in the 4th Marines, who lost his right eye at Iwo Jima when a hand grenade exploded.

These are two examples of the growing number of disabled veterans who are finding employment with Marlin and are proving that physical handicaps can be surmounted.

### Texas To Mark Hundred Years Of Statehood

AUSTIN, Tex. (UP) — Texas will extend its "centennial of statehood" observance from Dec. 29, 1945 until Feb. 19, 1946.

The long observance period is due to a conflict in the dates on which Texans and the U. S. Supreme Court hold that the Republic of Texas ceased to exist and became a part of the United States of America.

Dec. 2, 1845, was held to be the official annexation time in a decision of the U. S. Supreme Court in a tax case. Texans cling to the later date because it was on Feb. 19, 1846, that the Lone Star Flag of Texas was hoisted down over the capitol and the Stars and Stripes run up.

In ceremonies that day Anson Jones, last president of the Republic of Texas, turned over affairs to Pinckney Henderson first Governor of the State of Texas.

The federal court ruling on the earlier date was based on the fact that the President of the United States on Dec. 29, 1845, signed the

joint resolution for admission of Texas to the Union.

The intervening months were used in election of state officers to replace those of the Republic of Texas.

The celebration will be entirely different from that of Texas' centennial of independence, celebrated in 1936. There will be no exposition, no historical monuments and markers such as were features of the 1936 observance.

Instead, a series of public and school activities pointed to stress agriculture and Texas and American history are being planned.

FORT WORTH, Tex., (UP)—Included in a \$4,000,000 expansion program at Texas Christian University will be a \$2,000,000 building rehabilitation and beautification program for the physical plant of the institution.

The entire expansion program is expected to be completed in five years. In addition the T.C.U. Stadium Association will be enlarged and landscaped in a \$150,000 program. Seating capacity of the stadium will be increased to approximately 25,000 for the start of the 1946-47 football season.

Included in the first half of the program will be the building of a new dormitory housing 212 coeds; a new dormitory for men, accommodating 140; a fine arts building, a building to replace the warehouse, shop and employe's quarters; and rehabilitation of Jarvis Hall, women's dormitory.

The second half of the program will include a science building, field house, another men's dormitory, rehabilitation of Goode and Clark Halls, the administration building, and Brite College of the Bible, and enlargement of Mary Cooks Burnett Library.

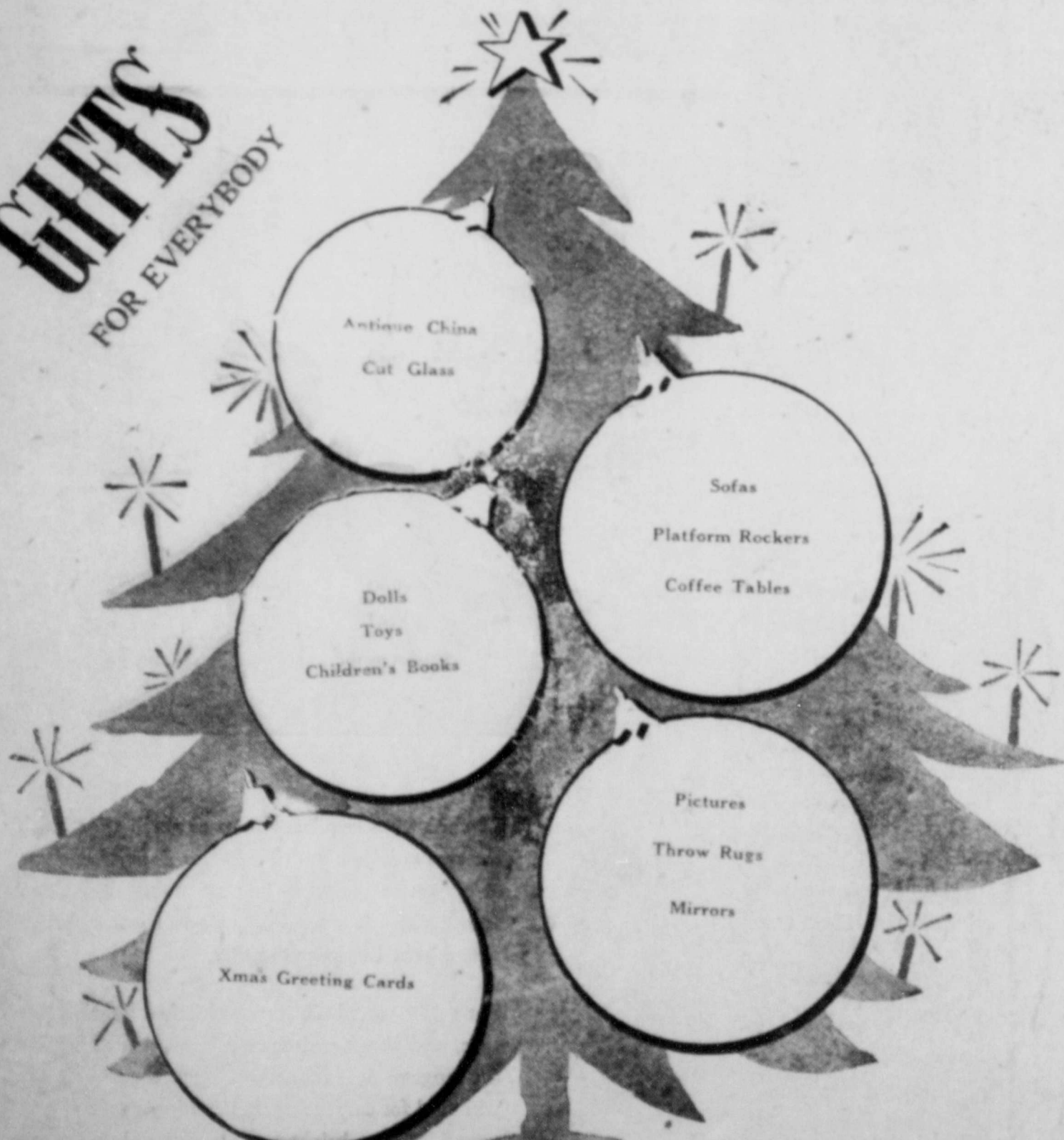

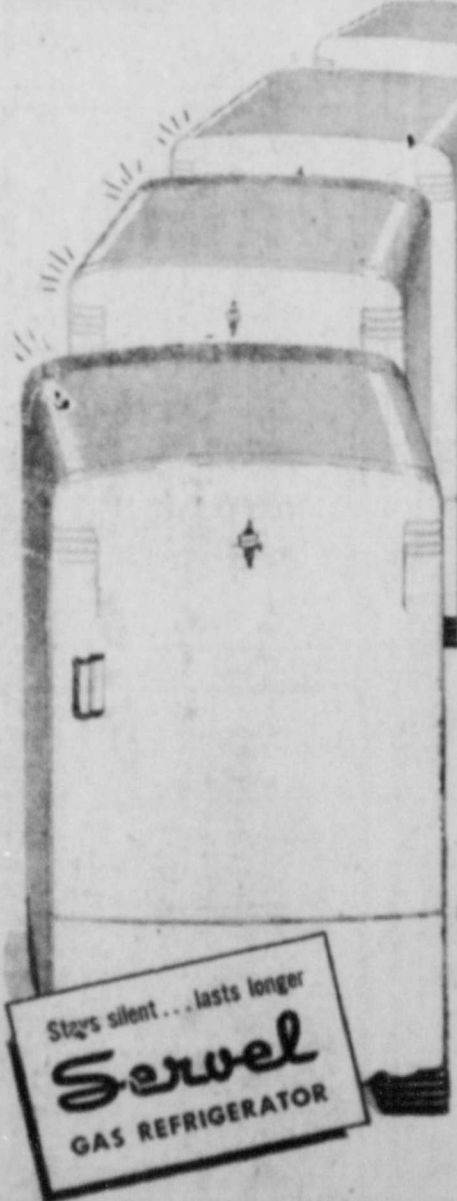
