### NEWS OF COUSIN, MISSIONARY IN JAPAN, COMES TO BOSWELLS

Indirectly Dr. and Mrs. G. C. Boswell have had a very interesting news from a first cousin of Mrs. Boswell who is a missionary for the Church of Christ in Japan. The cousin is Miss Sarah Andrews of Dickson, Tennessee who has been a missionary in Japan for a number of years and the news to the Boswells was the first word from her since the war started. The news came in a letter from a soldier in Japan whose home is in Tyler and who is a close friend of Miss Andrews' sister and brother-in-law. The soldier learned that Miss Andrews resided in occupied territory in which soldiers were barred, but with a buddy and

a Jap interpreter, they took a back road and reached the town, 110 miles away, where the missionary resided. When they arrived there they found that she had gone by train 20 miles to another town to attend church. They decided to wait her return. When she arrived, the soldier related, she was very excited at seeing American soldiers and had difficulty in understanding who her visitors were because of her excitement. The guests were taken to her home, which they explained, was a great treat in as much as it was the only American home they had entered in Japan. The soldiers had taken a number of cans of food with them and which they gave Miss Andrews. Her delight with the food was explained as being like that of a child with its first doll. On their return to their station, officers of the camp were told of the trip and the situation of Miss Andrews and the officers instructed the men to return the next weekend with a truck load of food for Miss Andrews. Correspondence between Miss Andrews and her sister will be carried on through the soldier friend until American troops enter the territory for occupation, a letter which she will be permitted to write direct to her sister.

SAN ANTONIO (UP)—The Congress of Industrial Organizations, Inc., a Texas corporation which has been active in fighting the national labor union using the initials CIO today disclosed that, like the better known CIO, it too has a "PAC." Where "PAC" stands for "Political Action Committee" in the national organization, Phil Hopkins, president of the Texas CIO said his group's "PAC" was the "Reserve Americanism Committee." Hopkins' statement was made, he said, after reading news stories quoting Carl McPeak, regional director of the labor union's PAC, as saying that certain Texas congressmen would be opposed actively by the union if they stood for re-election.

### Chinese Group Asks Countries For Meditation

CHUNGKING (UP)—A group of Chinese democratic leaders today appealed for mediation of China's undeclared civil war by the United States, Great Britain and the Soviet Union. They also asked the withdrawal of both Kuomintang Chinese and Communist troops from Manchuria. Delegates to the forthcoming consultative council said they favored international mediation of Chinese internal disputes and objected to foreign troops of any country being stationed in Chinese territory particularly during the civil war.

### Mineral Wells Silk Industry Increases Stock

MINERAL WELLS (UP)—The infant Texas silk raising industry came of age today. Stockholders of Texas Silk Industries, Inc., the company formed by 62 Mineral Wells businessmen two years ago to plant mulberry trees and raise silkworms in Texas, announced today that they have increased their capitalization 500 per cent. The company, originally incorporated at \$10,000, increased its stock to \$50,000 at a special meeting.

### Junior Rer Cross Contributes To Fruit Collection

Mrs. Roy McCleskey, Ranger chairman for the Junior Red Cross announced Saturday that two Ranger schools, Young and Hodges Oak Park, had contributed \$19.76 toward Christmas fruit for the camp hospital at Camp Bowie. Each year the schools have been asked to contribute the fruit but this year they were asked for money which will be used to buy the fruit.

### GM AWAITS NEXT MOVE BY UNION

By United Press General Motors Corp. officials today waited for the United Automobile Workers to make the next move in the coast-to-coast walk out which has shut down 93 plants and kept 225,000 GM workers from their jobs. Following the first renewal of negotiations in the 11-day-old strike, the company last night proposed a partial resumption of operations for the benefit of other automobile manufacturers. A union reply was expected momentarily.

The proposal, as outlined in a letter to UAW President E. J. Thomas from C. E. Wilson, head of the giant General Motors firm, provided for the reopening of GM parts and accessories divisions to work exclusively on material for other auto manufacturers. Meanwhile, union demands for more pay were reflected in a nation wide strike vote taken yesterday by members of the packing house workers union. The national labor relations board reported that early returns showed members nearly 25 to 1 in favor of a strike.

### Says Industry Holds Good For Reduced Taxes

WASHINGTON (UP)—For the third time in the past week high government officials have publicly complained that industry is holding up shipments of consumer goods until the new year to profit by reduced taxes. ### NOTE LEFT BEHIND TOLD HITLER OF HIS PLANS

NUERNBERG (UP)—Adolf Hess parachuted into Britain in 1941 to bring King George VI back to Germany for a peace conference before Adolf Hitler opened his attack on Russia, the United Press learned exclusively today. Hitler knew nothing of Hess's dramatic rescue scheme until he read a letter Hess left behind, it was learned. The Fuehrer was left speechless, then began racing at everyone possible contact with Hess. In a statement Hess said out to bring about peace but he could not accept the fact that "the two greatest peoples of earth were attempting to annihilate each other."

Hess prepared his flight so secretly that he didn't even tell his wife he was going. Nobody knew of his intentions except his adjutant and secretary, both of whom were arrested later. Hitler, when he recovered control of himself, told Hermann Goering—so Goering told interpreters—that Hess was mad to try "an impossible mission like that."

### WASHINGTON COLUMN

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Big catch in all the talk about international atomic bomb control is that no one has yet come forward with any concrete ideas as to how it can be done.



The idea that the United States be made international trustee of the bombs is out.

If the bombs are given to the Security Council of the United Nations Organization or the Council of Staff Committee which is to advise the Council on military matters, either group of men conceivably could become rulers of the world through sheer force of power.

If the bombs are put in some kind of safe deposit vault with a special lock requiring the cooperation from each of 60 or more nations to insert his key before the bombs are brought out for use, someone would be sure to turn up missing who any one nation could effectively veto action by the Council against aggressors.

Also, the mere fact that the material used in the bomb is the same material that must be used for peacetime development of atomic energy makes every use of this enriched material a potential bomber.

In this predicament, President Truman's original suggestion of renunciation of the use of atomic bombs by all nations makes a lot of sense.

Secretary of Commerce Henry Wallace has crashed through with one suggestion on control of atomic energy research which did not get the attention it deserves.

Testifying before the Senate joint committee hearings on science mobilization, Wallace proposed that control over atomic energy research and exchange of information be entrusted to the National Science Foundation which is being backed by Senators Kilgore, Magnuson and Fulbright.

To the Atomic Energy Commission proposed in the controversial May-Johnson bill, Wallace proposed giving only control over the technical application of atomic power—the licensing and administration over the enriched material from which atomic energy can be released for commercial or military purposes.

The Federation of Atomic Scientists, made up of more than 100 of the young scientists who worked on the project, is still looking for office space to set up headquarters in Washington.

Dr. Harlow Shapley of Harvard Observatory helped arrange temporary office space for the F. A. S. in the fourth-floor, walk-up headquarters of the Independent Citizens' Committee of the Arts, Sciences and Professions.

The Federation will move from there as soon as it can find other space, but to this address has come much mail from sympathizers.

### Petroleum Shows Production Drop During October

AUSTIN, Tex. — Petroleum production declined in Texas in October, compared with September, 1945 and October 1944 daily average production.

According to the Bureau of Business Research at the University of Texas, there were 1,482,350 barrels of petroleum produced daily in October, and 2,133,350 barrels produced daily in October a year ago. September, 1945, average daily production was 1,859,100 barrels.

In the United States as a whole, daily average production last month was 3,977,800 barrels, compared with 4,725,550 barrels in October, 1944.

September gasoline sales to the United States government as recorded by motor fuel distributors in Texas were 150,362,404 gallons.

### Texas Building Almost Triples Over Last Year

AUSTIN, Texas — Building activity was recorded in Texas during October, as permits issued increased from \$1,781,917 in October, 1944 to \$9,949,759 October 1945. This figure includes 41 major cities in the state, according to reports by the Bureau of Business Research at the University of Texas.

Building permits issued in October, 1945, in the larger cities totaled as follows: Dallas: \$1,740,729; Fort Worth: 1,007,609; Houston: \$1,672,913; San Antonio: \$1,377,514; Austin: \$687,620; Amarillo: \$482,752; Lubbock: \$408,465; Corpus Christi: \$137,176; Tyler: \$136,605; Waco: \$136,880; Wichita Falls: \$94,289.

# MEDICOS SPEED VETS THROUGH IN 30 MINUTES

BAER ARMY FIELD, FORT WAYNE, Ind. (UP)—From soldier to civilian in 30 minutes—that's the record chalked up by the medical processing section of

this Army Air Force separation Center, where men walk into the hospital as GIs and emerge as Minsters.

In the medical section, each soldier being discharged receives his final physical examination, designed by the Army to guarantee that he is in as good—if not better—physical condition than when he first put on his khaki uniform.

Baer Field is the AAF separation center for men living in a 300 mile area surrounding Fort Wayne. The section includes Chicago, Detroit, Cleveland, Cincinnati, Columbus and Indianapolis.

A ratio of six officers and 29 enlisted men are ushered through thorough physicals with speed that any industrial assembly line would appreciate. The section has been turned by a medical officer of the Continental Air Forces headquarters as probably the most efficient in any of the 32 air force separation centers.

Business started Oct. 18, in a building converted from a hospital ward. Capt. George H. Douglas of Los Angeles, officer in charge of the medical center, said the peak "production" has been 600 men in one day, but facilities have been geared to accommodate 600 veterans daily.

The men are given a briefing by Lt. Clifford C. Norton. The lieutenant, a former radio actor, producer and director at Chicago has devised signs posted on the wall to encourage action: "Keep it moving buddy"; "Hubba, Hubba"; and "Follow the arrows today if you want to be a Mister tomorrow."

Arrows painted on the floor lead the men from one doctor to another. After they receive their physical examination work sheets on which their reactions to tests are recorded, they adjourn to a dressing room and strip to shorts and socks.

Their medical history from infancy is recorded—and then begin the tests. Ears, nose, throat, bones joints—all are examined.

Only 60 seconds are needed for X-ray. The soldiers were stood on a ladder—till ones on the bottom step ranging to the short ones on top—and the picture is snapped.

Before the airmen return to the dressing room, hearts and lungs, weights and measures, and pulse and blood pressure are checked. Doctors scrutinize visual and hearing capabilities.

A dental check is the next step. If slight defects are discovered the potential civilian is given his choice by the War Department directors of having defects corrected before leaving the army or signing a waiver and having his teeth repaired on his return to civilian life.

If a serious contagious defect is discovered by the Army test the soldier is removed from medical processing line and not returned until he is in good physical condition.

A psychiatrist is available for men who report "nervousness" or whose work sheets record a memo from one of the doctors suggesting that he talk to the psychiatrist. Few fellows need a psychiatrist at this phase of the game, Norton said.

The most dramatic phase of the entire check-up comes in the 20th minute—the final review. At that time, the work sheet is re-examined and approved or rejected. If

"OK Med" is stamped on the sheet, the GI's worries are over so far as his physical being is concerned. Well, practically over. The blood tests or X-ray pictures may turn up some ailment missed otherwise. In that case, the soldier is recalled a second time. But those instances are infrequent.

Five to seven per cent of the men walk into the next office to file for disability compensation from the Veterans Administration. They are eligible if they have been wounded in action or if they are disabled because of an aggravation to some defect they had when they entered the Army. In any case, every soldier being discharged is appraised of his right to file for the disability plan.

## New Business In Texas Shown On The Increase

AUSTIN, Texas — Forty-one merchandising firms were chartered in Texas in October, and a total of 137 new businesses were given charters to operate in Texas, the Bureau of Business Research at the University of Texas reports.

Total capitalization for the new businesses was \$2,942,000. In October, 1944, there were 57 firms chartered at a capitalization of \$3,886,000.

Twenty-seven firms were capitalized at less than \$5,000 last month, and 6 were capitalized at \$100,000 or more.

Fifteen foreign corporations were given permission to do business in Texas in October—exactly the same number receiving permits in October, 1944.

According to classifications, the new corporations include the following: 4 banking and finance; 19 manufacturing; 41 merchandising; 4 oil & public service; 19 real estate building; 5, transportation; 43, all others.

## Turkey Shipments Show Increase Over Last Year

AUSTIN, Texas — Turkey shipments were higher in Texas during October than in October, 1944 but chicken shipments dropped to half the total shipped in October, 1944, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports.

Fifteen carloads of turkeys were shipped inside the state, and to out of state stations last month, compared with 11 shipped in the same period of 1944. Twelve carloads of chickens were shipped, whereas 25-1-2 carloads were shipped in October, 1944.

## ARMY OFFERS MEN 1' FREE COLLEGE EDUCATION

Under the G. I. Bill of Rights a man under 25 years of age can receive a free college education equal to the number of years he enlists for, plus one year, thus, a man enlisting for 3 years will be guaranteed 4 years of college education in the subjects of his choice and at the expense of the government. Here is one thing however, that must be considered now—4 October 1946 is the deadline to enlist and become eligible for the G. I. Bill of Rights.

At 17 years of age a man must have the consent of his parents to enlist in the Regular Army. If it is found inconvenient for the parent or guardian to come to the Recruiting Office, located in Brownwood, the applicant may come to the Recruiting Office and receive a form which he must take home and have signed, then return signed form to this office, whereupon preparations are made

to send applicant to Dallas for completion of his enlistment. The enlistment periods are 18 months, 2 years and 3 years. An enlistee enlisting for 3 years may choose his branch and overseas theater of service. The theaters are: European, Pacific, China, Caribbean and Alaska Department. Some of the branches of service are: Quartermaster, Ordnance Engineers, Field Artillery, Infantry, Air Forces, Armored Command, Cavalry, Signal, Coast Artillery, Finance, Medical and Transportation.

## Retail Sales Up For Independent Business Firms

AUSTIN, Texas—Sales of independent retailers were up 15 per cent in October over October, 1944, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports. Filing stations reported 32 per cent increase in sales during October over the same month last year; department stores reported 14 per cent gain; drug stores, 8 per cent; food stores, 7 per cent; general stores 6 per cent; eating and drinking places, 4 per cent; and dry goods and general merchandise, 3 per cent. In the durable goods trades, lumber - building materials dealers reported a 26 per cent sales increase for the month over last year, and motor vehicle dealers gained 24 per cent. Furniture stores had 18 per cent gains, hardware stores 17 per cent, and jewelry stores had a 7 per cent gain.

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Indian Girl Serves 6 Months On Her Honor

KEAMS CANYON, Ariz. (UP)—Bertha Kohe, 19-year-old Hopi Indian girl, is serving out a six-month sentence at hard labor in an unlocked jail following a trial that seemed unbelievably simple in the light of the white man's complicated legal machinery. Members of a tribe of Indians who have remarkably few brushes with the law, either their own or the white man's, Bertha atoned a U. S. Government check to read \$66.73 instead of \$14.73.

Under authorization of the U. S. Attorney's office, Bertha was tried before her tribal judge, Irving Pabanele. She arrived a little late for her hearing, because the ride she had arranged for did not materialize and she had to work the 12 miles from her home to Keams Canyon, site of the government's Hopi Indian Agency. Judge Pabanele dealt directly with the defendant and with no interference from a prosecutor or defense counsel. No one was placed under oath, because it was assumed that no one would lie. The only red tape involved was that the jurist had to conduct the trial through an interpreter because English is required by law in such instances and none of the participants could speak English. The Indian jurist ruled that Bertha must spend the next six

1,200 Teen-Agers Belong To City Junior Police

OKLAHOMA CITY (UP) There are more than 1,200 teen-age boys in the Oklahoma City junior police, which is sponsored by the Kiwanis Club International here. It was instituted by the Oklahoma City Club in 1926 and has been copied since in many other cities.

The junior police here are selected from questionnaires given by their teachers. The group then appoints its captain and lieutenants. The number of officers appointed is governed by the size of the school.

Each member of the organization is presented with a badge, a belt and a certificate which is signed by Gov. Robert S. Kerr, State Safety Commissioner J. M. Gentry City Police Chief L. J. Hilbert and Mayor Robert A. Hefner. The junior police act as traffic and "peace" officers at the schools.

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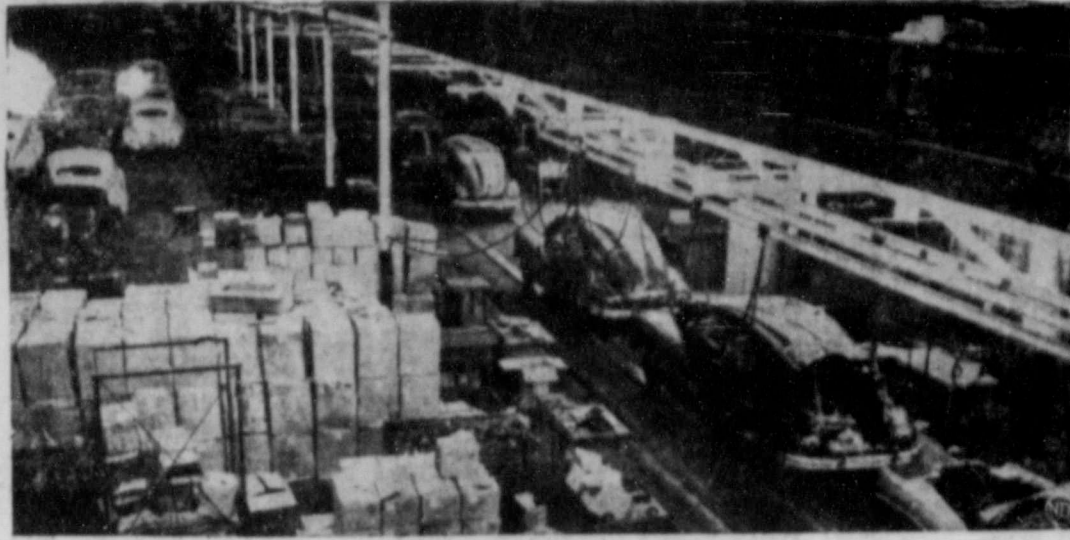

**Currency Flown To China For Naval Payrolls**

SHANGHAI (UP) — The United States mint in San Francisco is serving naval installations in all corners of the globe with currency in one of the longest and most drawn-out financial transactions in history, according to Lt. Comdr. Roy C. Stratton, Dayton O. Navy disbursing officer for China.

Tons of currency are flown to China by Naval Air Transport Service planes and are then distributed by whatever means of transportation is available to American personnel throughout China. Stratton said that U. S. forces use American currency to avoid conflict with the Chinese exchange

market and to prevent any influence on the fluctuation of Chinese money.

The Navy's International Aid and Disbursing Office was operated throughout China even during the Japanese occupation. Millions of dollars of currency were carried thousands of miles through Japanese territory, and at times money has been delivered by Chinese junk, packhorse and even parachute.

Besides handling all naval lend-lease and reciprocal trade, the disbursing office has handled business for American firms on Navy orders and cashed large numbers of postal money orders and treasury checks. War correspondents of every nationality have been paid through this office, as well as retired naval personnel living here.

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**Charges Rent Rates In Austin Are Too High**

AUSTIN, Tex., (UP) — Rental rates charged veterans in Austin are too high, according to a complaint registered by Secretary W. M. Akin of the State Council for

the C-I-O. Akin says he has compiled a list of 300 rental offerings from sources serving veterans and their families and that the rates ranged from \$8 to \$15 per week per room. About 180 of these listings were for \$10 or more per week or \$40 or more per month, he said.

"If these rent charges prevail, the G-I bill is going to be meaningless to many veterans who would like to, and deserve a chance to, complete their education," the labor official said.
