N the compilation of returns from over 28,000 labor organizareporting in 1943, the gross labor union income is shown to be o 390 million dollars. Of this amount, union dues contributed 218 mill dollars, with an additional 70 millions raised by fees, fines and asse ments. Sixty-four million dollars more were assessed as taxes for support of national headquarters and affiliated organizations, so total dues payments were in the neighborhood of 252 million dollar

In the Treasury's breakdown of union income, seven reported gro for the year of over five million dollars each. Thirty-four unions we reported in the one-to-five million income class. Four hundred . ported incomes of from \$100,000 to a million dollars a year. But the vast majority of the unions-the locals-are revealed as little organ zations which would be tax-exempt in any law that might be writte by a hostile Congress.

MANY unions are known to have bought was bonds to the limit their treasury funds. Interest payments to the unions on the investments are put at over a million a year. Receipts from rents of union owned property were half a million. And not so incidenta the unions did pay over a million dollars in taxes on their holds. So they aren't exactly tax free.

About 83 per cent of the unions' 1943 income was reported as expense. The total was 323 millions, leaving 67 millions as union profits or reserves for the year, in accounting for the total income of 390

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
