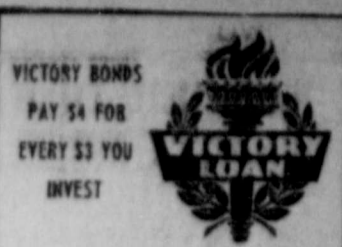

WASHINGTON COLUMN

WASHINGTON, D. C.—James Newman, lawyer-mathematician from the Office of War Mobilization, who has been loaned to the Senate McMahon Committee on atomic energy, sizes up the situation this way: "Never has so much been given to produce so little that had such great effect on civilization."



Senate majority leader Alben W. Barkley committed a horrible diplomatic faux pas when Great Britain's Prime Minister Clement R. Attlee came up to Congress to deliver his speech. Not recognizing the prime minister in the party from the British Embassy, Barkley stepped forward to give a hearty welcome to the man at the head of the group. It wasn't Attlee. The prime minister had to be pointed out to Barkley, who then extended his welcome all over again.

It's still no handicap to have Missouri connections if you want a job in the Truman administration. Maple Hart, state banking director from Colorado, has been nominated for the office of director of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation by President Truman. He may look like an outsider. But Mrs. Hart comes from Missouri.

IDAHO'S Senator Glen H. Taylor is grooming himself to become a new champion of small business. Job ahead of him is to try to bring some order out of present government confusion in aiding the little fellows. Idea of transferring Smaller War Plants Corporation to Commerce Department has been balked because the law creating SWPC won't permit it. Federal Reserve Board and Reconstruction Finance Corporation have divided authority over other small businesses.

Veterans Administration can guarantee private bank loans limited to giving free advice. Henry Wallace's plan to have the whole problem dumped in his lap will meet with some congressional opposition. Senators in particular don't want to give Wallace authority over loan policies.

ON the eve of his resignation as Assistant Secretary of War in charge of military government, John J. McCloy took occasion to criticize administration policy of withdrawing U. S. forces from Germany and Japan too fast.

That 300,000 tons of food that Maj.-Gen. Lucius D. Clay has requested for Germany does not represent a deficit which must be filled to keep the Germans from starving this winter. General Clay now has on hand enough food to give Germans in the U. S. occupation zone 1350 calories a day. The 300,000 tons of additional food supplies for Germany would be used only in case the four-power Allied Control Commission in Berlin should decide that the Germans should eat better than the Poles.

MUSHROOMING basketball's greatest season is off to a flying start in more ways than one. The recent definitely is on speed. The only rule change of consequence and a minor one stamps out unnecessary delay. Teams are traveling by air on a large scale for the first time.

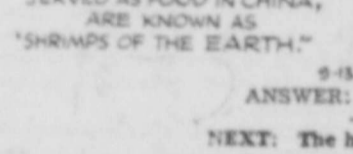

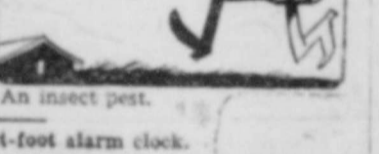

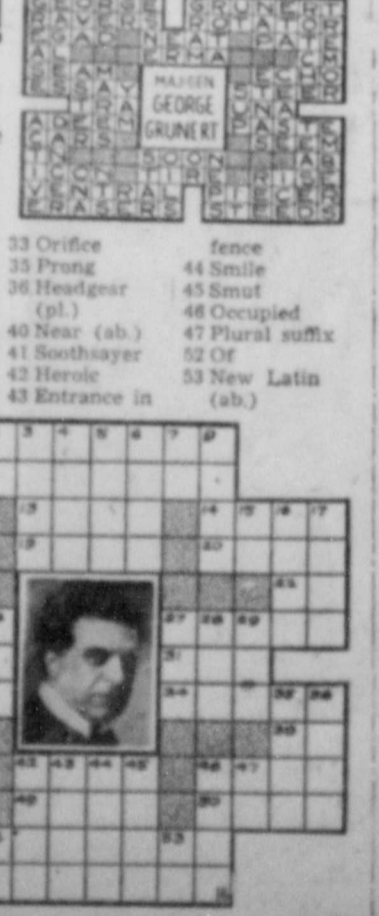

German Refugee Now U. S. Aid At War Trials

CINCINNATI (UP) — A German refugee who worked in a tailor shop here is back in Germany as a member of the Allies four-power tribunal.

He is Dr. Richard Newkirk, a former judge in Germany, who fled to America in 1936. Unable to find any other work, he took a job with the tailor shop. On the side he studied law, took the Ohio bar examination and passed three years ago. He became

an attorney and wrote articles for law journals which attracted the attention of a Supreme Court Justice.

Then things happened. Newkirk was summoned to Washington, in 1942 for a federal position. He had just become an American citizen.

Last month he received a call from the United States representatives on the Allied Tribunal in Germany asking him to come to Berlin.

Newkirk left that night on a chartered plane. He now is aiding in legal matters in the war criminal trials.

COLUMNISTS' FEUD OVER TEXAS, WYOMING RAGING

CHEYENNE, Wyo., (UP) — The western-style feud between Wyoming and Texas concerning the size of the respective states continues to simmer along, with the local newspapers taking up the duties of the Chamber of Commerce officials.

Nothing much has been heard from civic authorities who apparently have been keeping tongues in cheek, or, on second thought, perhaps agitating the newspaper columnist along.

Anyhow, the latest report comes from Kemmerer, over in the southwest part of the state. The columnist there claims the "squabble is no squabble at all."

The squabble, or, to conform with the Kemmerer journalist, the "incident" started with the opinion of a Thermopylae writer, who figured out that Wyoming could be made twice as large as the Lone Star State, merely by moving out some of the ragged mountains that mathematician is Ken Eberly, in case you've forgotten, who writes in that he desires credit for such astute pencil work.

The defense took over from Dallas. Among other things the Texas editorialist said in rebuttal was that the postoffice in his state could be reached in six minutes without use of a railroad. He asserted Wyoming was a crazy, hot water-potting place.

Reverent to those two statements flares up in the Kemmerer columnist's typewriter. It's explained Wyoming residents can still get to the postoffice in winter on skis or horseback, or "even in the old jolney between bizards."

As for hot water, it's admitted that "there are a lot of hot air-

spoutin' politicians in the state, just the same as any place else." "Then wonderful, hot water rivers of ours is just expressing, in a joyful sort of way, their grateful appreciation for being privileged to spout in a state where they really got something to spout about."

This Kemmerer writer says "the boss" has been around the state of Texas some, and claims that "our 'crazy' state" don't move across into the next county ever time the wind blows, and a lizard can crawl under a rock here in Wyoming for his afternoon snooze without dropping—he's trapped between the hatchways of blades and the down-draft from an overhead black furnace."

Czech Women Get Salt After 6 Months Wait

PRAGUE (UP) — The proverbial pinch of salt for six months almost totally lacking in Czech kitchens is returning to Prague recipes as the first trainload of supplies from ceded Carpatho-Ukraine is distributed.

Pre-war Czechoslovakia filled all its domestic salt requirements and even exported to neighboring countries from the extensive salt deposits in the tiny, mountainous eastern tip of the country known then as Subcarpathian Rusia.

But when the province, under its new name Carpatho-Ukraine, was ceded to the USSR this spring, war-depleted communications and political difficulties cut off all connections between it and Bohemia, and a serious salt short-

ages resulted.

An attempt to evade Austrian salt for Bohemian coal some weeks ago did not come off, and Czech housewives still struggled to make meager rations palatable without the vital pinch of salt.

The first freight train from Carpatho-Ukraine recently arrived according to the Ministry of Information, bringing 1,200 tons of salt and various other food and raw materials.

Mineral Locality Map of Texas Is Published

AUSTIN, Texas — The first mineral locality map of Texas to show graphically all of the known localities has just been published by the University of Texas Bureau of Economic Geology. Dr. J. T. Lonsdale, director, has announced.

The map shows occurrences of useful minerals, rocks, oil and gas fields, and other geologic substances. Dr. Lonsdale said it was prepared by Dr. E. H. Sellards, director emeritus of the Bureau, Glen E. Evans and Leo Hendricks, geologist with the Bureau.

Localities for 86 separate mineral substances in addition to oil and gas fields are shown by symbols on the map which bear descriptions of the occurrences given in the legend.

The map shows that many common mineral materials, and especially those known to be present in substantial amounts. These include sulphur, grinding pebbles, iron ores, celestite, mercury, feldspar, graphite, vermiculite, canal coal, copper, lead, zinc, silver, and others.

Other materials not produced commercially or to a limited extent but have possible future value also are shown.

The map is available for distribution from the Bureau of Economic Geology.

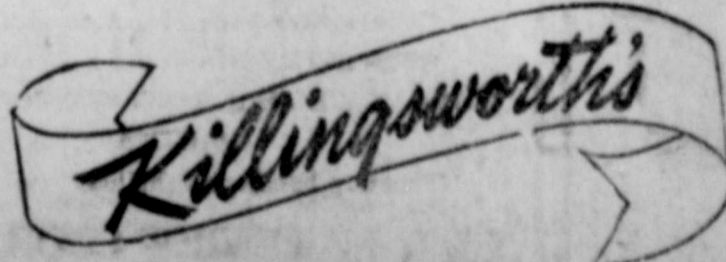

Ultra-High Radio Waves Research Is Being Made

AUSTIN, Texas — A research project in ultra-high frequency radio waves is now being conducted by the University of Texas for the Office of Research and Investigations of the Navy Department. Dr. E. W. Hamlin, director of the project, has announced.

Dr. Hamlin is professor of electrical engineering, and is directing the \$162,500 project with a staff

of 10 radio engineers, mathematicians, and technicians.

The major objective of the project is to determine the effect of ultra-high frequency waves on the human body. The project is being conducted in the DeForest Research Laboratory, set up in September, in developing a set of instruments for the Navy's Bureau of Ordnance.

Vernon and Van, Texas, is appointed to the post of Agricultural Agent of the Texas and Pacific Railway effective January 1, 1946. It is announced by Mr. L. C. Porter, assistant to the president.

In announcing this appointment, Mr. Porter said that Mr. Senter will work with Texas and Pacific local agents, county agents, and members of vocational agriculture throughout Texas in improving farm techniques and in the development of diversified agricultural programs in areas served by the railroad.

Mr. Senter, who is 41 years old and a native of Teague, Texas, will make his headquarters at Van, Texas.

Mr. Senter studied agriculture at Texas A. and M. college and was graduated in 1924 with a Bachelor of Science degree, and in 1927 with a Master of Science degree.

Entering the public schools system in Van, Texas, in 1925 in a

similar capacity. Here he held evening meetings of farmers and sponsored over fifty educational trips among farmers to principal agricultural sections throughout the south. The success of these measures is evident in the fact that east Van Zandt County—in which Van, Texas, is situated—annual crop yields from 150-200 carloads of tomatoes, sweet potatoes, turnips and other truck crops.

Texas Wary Of U. S. Control To Coastal Shelf

AUSTIN, Tex., (UPI)—Texas is having coastal pains along practically all of its 370 miles frontage on the Gulf of Mexico.

Its land officials and legal department are worried by the suit of U. S. Attorney General Tom C. Clark to set up federal control of coastal areas in the Gulf of the continental shelf.

Texas fears this may interfere with its long-cherished boundary, which is not the actual Gulf Coast line, but an imaginary, or at least unmarked, line paralleling the coast, but 99 1/2 miles out in the Gulf of Mexico. That was the boundary set when Texas affected its separation from Mexico.

Another coastal difficulty is between Texas and Louisiana commercial fishermen. Recently the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster department has complained that Louisiana fishermen are invading Texas waters without paying a high license fee. Louisiana has a law keeping out Texas fishermen.

Another pain, recently smoothed by a State Supreme Court decision, was over ownership of Indian land. The court performed an apparently so far as the state was concerned by deciding the state had no title to the land.

It is a curious kind of land paralleling the coast from Corpus Christi to Brownsville and separated from the mainland by lagoons. The island was granted to an early priest, Nicholas Ball, and his nephew by the State of Tamaulipas, Mexico, in the early 1900s. The grant, however, spoke of 11 1/2 leagues and the island has about 30 leagues of land. So Texas claimed at least the excess, but the court said the grant called for an island and that meant the entire island.

End of war has about ended another coastal pain. Many acres of submerged land along the Gulf of Mexico had been leased for oil development. Then with war, the Federal government took over practically all this territory either for bombing areas or for patrols against submarines.

Oil operation was prevented. Company leases had limited time to run, so the Legislature had to declare a moratorium, pending the leases from the time development can be resumed.
