





WASHINGTON, D. C .- Big moment in ex-ambassador Pat Hurley's appearance before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee came when Sen. Tom Connally referred to Hurley's repeated charges that he had been unable to get a public statement from the Presi dent or the Secretary of State on what U. S. policy

"Oh, yes, I knoty," said Connally, "you wanted to get something in the papers."

That was when Pat blew his top. "I resent that," he stormed, "That's not true. I don't want my government passyfooting and I will not."

The audience clapped wildly in approval.

Connally is usually the one to blow up, but this time he kept calm and said quietly, "All right, all right." Then he again went after this subject of U. S. policy on China. Earlier in his testimony, Hurley had maintained that there had been no public statement of Chinese policy between Secretary Hull's statement issued in November, 1941, and Secretary Byrnes' recent letter on Chinese policy, sent

to Congressman Jack Anderson almost exactly four years later. ACTIONS would seem to speak a little louder than words in this case, for the record of U. S. aid to the Chinese Nationalist gov-

ernment from 1931 on is long. Also, there comes to mind immediately a speech made before the Foreign Policy Association in New York on Oct. 30, 1945, by John Carter Vincent, head of the Far Eastern Section of the State Department. This Vincent is the man whom Hurley accuses of crossing him up, making it appear that the policy Hurley was pursuing in China

was not the official policy of the State Department.

Vincent's speech is too long to quote in full here, but the interesting thing is that it goes down the line, item by item, with Byrnes' recent letter to Congressman Anderson,

WROTE Byrnes: "We deem it desirable that China solve her internal problems. While we recognize that this is a task which China must carry out largely through her own efforts, we seek by all appropriate and practicable means to pursue such policies as will best facilitate China's achievement of internal unity and stability to rehabilitate her devastated economy and to develop a higher

standard of living for her masses. Further said Vincent: "At the root of China's difficulties is the need for certain economic reforms, particularly in the agrarian field and in the field of taxation. China's leaders reslize this, and we may hope that with the return of peace, they will set about instituting the necessary reforms. Much is written about industrialization of China. But without reforms, one of which would be to increase the individual incomes of Chinese farmers, and without an expanded transportation system and a sound currency, industrial development would be meaningless to the Chinese people," etc. *






