WASHINGTON, D. C.-What will probably go down in history the world's longest "conversation" has just come to a close here in Washington, between U. S. and British negotiators. It began Sept.

Nations conference record.

Why the conference didn't run out of things to talk about or why they didn't bore each other to death can be attributed to the fact that they were talling about (a) Love, or (b) Money. It was the latter of course.

The conversations were popularly known as the British negotiations for a loan of four or fiv-billion dollars, more or less. But they talked abouother things too.
In all, something less than 100 people have been in on these conversations. They have been organ-

At the top has been the big four—Assistant Secretary of State Will Clayton, who was chairman; Secretary of the Treasury Free M. Vinson, British Ambassador the Rt. Hon. Earl of Halifax, and

THERE have been about 50 U. S. experts in on the subcommittees as against maybe only 15 or so for the British, but the British committee members here were aided by larger staffs of experts in London. Everything done had to be referred to London. That's what took so long.

There has been a minimum of formality about all the talks. Except for the high hats, everybody got to calling everybody else by pet names

and the whole thing was quite chummy.

There has been a minimum of social activity, too, Will Clayton threw a big party right at the opening, and there have been several less pretentious affairs thrown by each side. But mostly the conversations have gone on morning, afternoon, and sometimes far into t night—with British time out for tea, of course. And everybody talked so much during the business sessions that they didn't feel much like talking after they were over. And you can't blame them for that.


