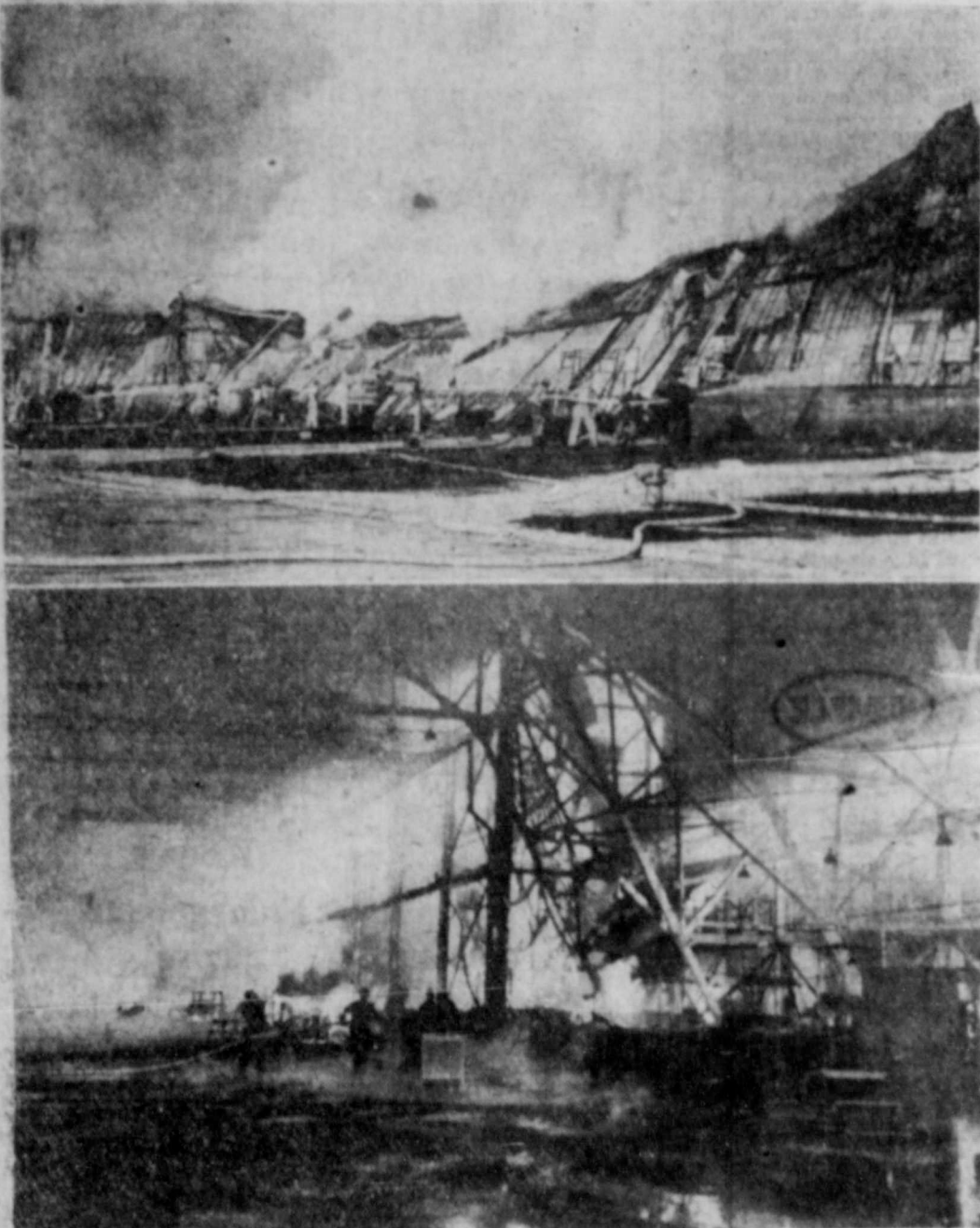

### \$750,000 Blaze Destroys Hangar



Reportedly starting from an explosion of cleaning fluid, a flash fire destroyed the main hangar of the Oklahoma Army Air Depot at Oklahoma City, Okla., causing the deaths of 16 persons and leaving 38 injured. ### CRASH VICTIM TO BE BURIED IN INDIANA

The body of Robert Binford French, who was killed in a plane crash east of Ranger Tuesday morning, was taken overland to Weatherford today by Morris Funeral Home and from there will be shipped to Green Field, Indiana for burial.

Arrangements for the services and burial were made by the wife of his brother, Howard P. French, who is with the Armed Forces in Tokyo but whose home is in Greenfield. Mrs. French was contacted yesterday through information secured from the Erwin-Newman Company of Houston for whom the deceased was flying.

The crash occurred about 11:35 a. m. Tuesday about a mile and a half east of Ranger on the Hogan ranch. Leslie Hagaman who witnessed the crash stated that as the plane flew overhead, the pilot seemed to be racing the motors and apparently the motors were still running when the plane hit the ground. Others who saw the plane falling stated that it came from out of a cloud bank and descended at a terrific rate of speed in an almost vertical line to the ground.

The plane was completely demolished and the body of the flier was thrown out of the wreckage, and was found at the side of the plane. He was killed instantly by the impact.

### Hess Cannot Act As Own Counsel

NUERNBERG (UP) — The war crimes tribunal today rejected a request by Rudolf Hess for permission to act as his own defense counsel.

The court appointed Dr. Otto Stahmer of Kiel, who also represents Hermann Goering, to defend Hess.

### CHIEF WARNS ON USE OF GUNS IN CITY

Chief George Murphy today issued a warning to the people of Ranger against the use of firearms within the city limits.

The warning came after L. N. Bryan who resides on Eastland hill reported that a shot from a .22 rifle, fired by an unknown person, shot through the window of his home Tuesday and narrowly missed hitting Mrs. Bryan in the head.

Chief Murphy stated that it is definitely against the law to shoot firearms or fireworks in the city limits, and urged that people obey the law in order to avoid serious consequences. He stated that many boys had received firearms for Christmas and perhaps they have not been warned that it is against the law to shoot them in the city. "Parents who have given children firearms should instruct them as to laws concerning their use," Chief Murphy stated.

### Service Officer Takes First Case To Vet Hospital

Bob Hansford, service officer for the recently organized Veterans of Foreign Wars post in Ranger, lost no time in getting at his job, and today left for Legion to accompany a veteran of the European war to the veterans' hospital there for a check-up and treatment. The admission of the veteran to the hospital was authorized by the Veterans' Administration.

At a meeting of the new post held Monday night in the Blue room of the Ghobson hotel, Commander Templeton of the Brownwood post, Heart of Texas, mustered in the charter members of the post and turned the meeting over to H. R. Hicks, post commander. About 50 members took the oath.

According to Hansford, membership chairman, veterans of foreign wars are still eligible for membership in the post and those interested in joining the organization may contact committee members, Everett Weaver or Capt. Jack Palmer and Hansford.

Mrs. Hulsey died Wednesday, January 30, 1946 in Ranger. She was born in Fayetteville, Arkansas, February 14, 1874 and had resided in Olden for the past 15 years.

Survivors are one son, J. H. Hulsey of Dallas, two daughters, Mrs. W. H. Lockhart of Abilene and Mrs. Phil Schultz of Sneedport, La., one brother, Robert Havell of El Paso and 10 grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

### STRIKE IDLE NUMBERS ON THE DECLINE

The number of strike-idle workers declined today as new efforts were started in Washington and Detroit to solve the nation's labor crisis.

Across the nation, the total number of workers made idle by strikes dropped to 1,500,000 for the first time in ten days.

The return of packinghouse workers to government-operated meat plants this week, the end of the Midwest truck drivers' strike, and the return to work of employed in several small steel plants cut the total of those idled by strikes.

Rumors persisted that a break was near in the nationwide steel workers' walkout. The magazine Iron Age said today that U. S. Steel Corporation would agree to President Truman's compromise offer of an 18 1/2 cents an hour wage increase if guaranteed a satisfactory price rise.

At Detroit, General Motors executives and the negotiating committee of the CIO UAW scheduled a meeting today with a federal labor mediator presiding in an effort to end their 71-day strike deadlock.

### 80 Enrolled In County's Vet Training Plan

M. D. Fox, coordinator for the Eastland County Veterans' training program, states that the organization is well under way and so far is running smoothly. There are over 80 men enrolled to date. Approximately half of the enrollees are taking work in auto mechanics and skilled shop work. About 25 per cent of the men are enrolled for business administration courses which offer training in the management of businesses ranging from the small filling station to hotel management. The other 25 per cent are enrolled for work in agriculture. This includes management and operation of farms.

The instructors for the courses are not only trained in a technical sense with the necessary college degrees, but have had experience in the line which they teach. As this is an "on the job training program," the men who desire to enroll should be on a job or ready to go to work when they enroll, for the practical experience, to be obtained in such training has to be had while the man is actually working.

### Former Resident Of Ranger Buried In Fort Worth

Funeral services for Mrs. Lawrence L. Rector of Ft. Worth, formerly of Ranger were conducted in Ft. Worth Wednesday afternoon at 4:00 o'clock at the Ray Crowder Funeral Home. Interment was in the Greenwood cemetery.

Mrs. Rector died in a Fort Worth Hospital Monday following a long illness. She is survived by her husband and one son Richard Rector of Roswell, New Mexico; her mother, Mrs. Martha Kaufman and one sister.

During Mrs. Rector's residence in Ranger she was active in church and club circles and was a charter member of the Columbia Study Club in Ranger.

### S-Sgt. Wilson Expected Home With Discharge

Mrs. Fred Wilson received word Tuesday by telegram from Fort Worth that her son, S-Sgt. William J. Wilson, is on his way to Camp Panton for a discharge. She expects him home today or tomorrow.

S-Sgt. Wilson served 5 months overseas with the 712th Airborne Division. He returned to the states in August and has been stationed at Fort Bragg in North Carolina since that time. His wife joined him there and will return home with him.

### TED MILES ANNOUNCES FOR CONGRESS

Ted Miles, Stamford (Jones County) business man, known to many here, today announced his candidacy for the Congress of the United States.

Miles' entry into the race touched off predictions that the hottest Seventeenth District primary the last decade is under way. Although this will be his first personal campaign, Miles carried a majority in nine of the 12 counties in the 1944 race for the State Senate, while he was on active duty with the U. S. Army. He lost the election to the incumbent by a total of only 25 votes, although he was never in the district at any time during the campaign.

In making his announcement for the U. S. representative, Miles said that his aim in seeking congressional office was to carry the interests and problems of the people of this district to Washington and to make them known. In professional politics and the charm of distant intrigue and international wrangling, too many of our elected representatives are overlooking the road to earth problem of the home-folks who sent them there, he believes.

Miles, who has lived in the Seventeenth District all his life, is 30 years old, married and has a little daughter, Ginger. He is author of a book on the G. I. Bill of Rights, published by the Ewing Publishing Company in 1945.

His knowledge of the G. I. was gained first hand. Early in 1942 he volunteered for the air corps. On completion of the necessary training, he was made an aerial navigation instructor, and later first pilot on a B-29 when the Superforts came off the production line.

Miles has visited in Ranger several times, and has many friends and acquaintances here. It is expected that Ranger will be included frequently between now and summer.

### Merged Party Members Back New Labor Bill

WASHINGTON (UP) — House republicans and southern democrats were lining up today in support of a sweeping anti-strike bill introduced by Rep. Francis Case, R., S. D.

The bill would make labor unions and employers equally liable under the law for violations of their contracts. It would also provide a 30 day-no-strike cooling off period in major disputes and outlaw violence by union pickets.

### Says Navy High Command Was Warned

WASHINGTON (UP) — Capt. A. H. McCollum, former naval intelligence officer, said today he warned the Navy high command on December 1, 1941, that war was imminent and received assurance that orders had been sent "fully alerting the fleets for war."

SINGAPORE STRIKE ENDS SINGAPORE (UP) — Singapore's two day general strike was called off tonight and union leaders ordered the city's 200,000 workers to return to their jobs tomorrow morning.

### TRUMAN ASKS APPROVAL OF BRITISH LOAN

WASHINGTON (UP) — President Truman today asked Congress to approve the \$3,750,000,000 loan to Great Britain to enable her "to move side by side with the United States toward the common goal of expanded world trade."

Such expanded world trade, the President told Congress in a long-awaited message, "means expanded production, consumption, and employment and rising standards of living everywhere."

The loan would provide Britain with a \$3,750,000,000 "line of credit" on which she could draw until 1951 to finance purchases of American goods and fill other needs for dollars. Repayments would begin in 1951 and interest would be 2 per cent.

### University Play To Be Chosen From Originals

AUSTIN, Texas — Settings ranging from the hills of Arkansas to modern China are included in the original plays submitted to date to E. P. Conkle, resident playwright at the University of Texas who will select one for production by the University's department of drama in the spring.

"All scripts must be in our hands by February 15," Mr. Conkle stated. "The playwright whose script is chosen must be with us beginning March 11 to work with the director on any necessary revisions in order that the play can go into production April 17-20."

Twenty-three manuscripts have been received from writers in Arkansas, New York, Wisconsin, California, Texas and other states. A play on life in China was submitted by a Chinese student at Yale University. Other plots are built around such themes as a home for aged women, a Pennsylvania Dutch settlement, and Russia.

"To our disappointment, very few playwrights from the South-west have responded," Mr. Conkle said, "and we are anxious to have more scripts from writers in this region."

The author of the winning script will be granted an honorarium large enough to pay travel expenses to the University and living expenses during the rehearsal period. The only restrictions are that only off-campus writers are eligible and no musicals or one-act plays will be considered.

### BRITIAN SAYS SOVIETS HAVE BROKEN BIG THREE TREATY

LONDON (UP) — The Soviet Union turned down an offer by Iran today to negotiate their dispute under the jurisdiction of the United Nations Security Council.

Foreign secretary Ernest Bevin accused Russia before the UNO Security Council today of breaking the three power treaty of 1942 guaranteeing Iran's sovereignty in what he said looked like "the beginning of an aggression."

Andrei Vishinsky, Soviet vice foreign commissar, bluntly rejected an appeal by Seyid Hassan Taidadeh of Iran to the Security Council to keep the Iranian-Soviet controversy in its hands.

Taidadeh said Iran was ready and willing to negotiate, as suggested by the Russians Monday, but only on condition that the council retain jurisdiction.

"If the Iranian government really and sincerely wants direct negotiations," Vishinsky said, "we are prepared to accept. But this business of placing the negotiations under the Aegis of the Security Council would make a fiction of it."

Vishinsky's statement brought near a climax the first political dispute to come before the new Security Council.

The United States, it was reported authoritatively, will oppose vigorously any trend toward letting the council wash its hands of the dispute, even though direct negotiations between the Iranians and Soviets are opened.

The Americans feel, now that the council's attention has been called to the controversy, it must at the very least keep some strings on it, and be assured of at least reports on progress if and when the negotiations evolve.

### Theatre's March Of Dimes Now Totals \$335.01

With the addition of \$22.25 collected Tuesday night at the Arcadia Theatre, the theatre's March of Dimes collections reached a \$335.01 total, better than \$35.00 over last year's total collections.

Tonight is the last night on which the collections will be taken the program for the theatre's participation in the drive having been scheduled for January 24 through January 30.

Other activities it is understood are being planned for Ranger's participation in the drive for funds for the fight against infantile paralysis and will be announced as soon as completed. The drive extends through February 15.

## Brilliant Czech Pianist To Be First Of Community Concert Ass'n Series

On February 8 at 8:15 p. m. the Eastland County Community Concert Association is presenting Rudolph Firkušny, brilliant young Czech pianist, in a concert at the Eastland high school Auditorium. This is one of three concerts scheduled for the season by the association which was organized by music lovers from Cisco, Eastland and Ranger.

Young Firkušny who has been received with much enthusiasm in music circles, first visited the United States in 1938, appearing in New York, and other large cities in the East and Middle West. This introductory tour ended, he returned to Europe with the expectation of returning the following season. But he had not counted on Hitler's armies occupying his homeland. The occupation of Prague happened on the eve of his departure for a concert tour in France and England. When he applied to the Gestapo for permission to buy his railroad ticket, he was curtly refused. But diplomatic intervention effected a change of attitude, and he was allowed to leave Czechoslovakia. Only to meet the Germans again in Paris, when they took over that city.

It was not until December of 1940 that Firkušny finally succeeded in reaching Lisbon and procuring passage on the S S Exaltador for America. Firkušny was fortunate in having friends in this country. He also had the good fortune to meet again Sir Thomas Beecham, under whom he had played in London. Sir Thomas was instrumental in having Firkušny engaged as soloist for the Ravinia Festival during the summer of 1941. It was the occasion of the celebration of the 100th anniversary of Anton Dvorak's birth, and most appreci-

ately Mr. Firkušny chose for his appearance the latter's Piano Concerto in G minor—a work that had not been given in this country these 65 years.

In resurrecting this work, Firkušny did a real service to music-lovers, as well as to the memory of his great countryman. In his recital programs, the young pianist is doing a like service in making the concert public acquainted with the wealth of beautiful piano material by another of his countrymen—Smetana. For some reason, these compositions, with the exception of one or two of the dances, are practically never played here.

Possibly the reason is that until now we have had no Czech pianist to interpret these works as they should be interpreted. Only the born Czech can do them justice—the rhythm, the furious pace, the exaltation of the dance is in his blood. When the Czech plays a furiant, a hulan, or a polka, something that, neither practice nor musical talent can give is heard.
