#### HELL FIRE AND BRIMSTONE

One writer compares the program of the National Committee on Atomic Information with the old-fashioned "hell fire and brimstone" type of religious evangelism. That is, he says the NCAI is trying to create interest in the potentialities of atomic fission by "scaring the hell" out of us-

Atom bombs are so cheap, the Committee says, that "even a small nation may soon possess the means of obliterating a large nation at will."

"It is possible today," we are warned, "to smuggle an -atomic bomb into a large city, and detonate it at any time-even decades later-by means of a radio signal from another country."

And don't trouble to try doing anything about this terrible situation ,either, because the Committee says that there not only is no defense now, but there aint' going to be none, neither.

Goodness, gracious, what's this world coming to?

What's the use of trying, if we're predestined to be blown or seared into unrecognized atoms-or maybe molecules or protons or neutrons?

Of course, the Committee could be over-excited, we hope. Let's see, now-


