### PROGRESS BY EMBARRASSMENT

The Russian government seems to have been embrassed by the UN Security Council's consideration of the Russo-Iranian controversy, So Russia, through her obedient friend and neighbor, Poland, apparently is trying to embarrass the United States and Britain by calling attention again to the continued existence of the Franco government

in Spain. Russia's attempt will probably be successful. During the war the two allied western democracies played along with Franco for understandable reasons of expediency. Since those reasons have become invalid, they have known their dislike of the Franco government by a half-hearted and ineffective invitation to the Spanish people to turn out the Falangist clique.

Meanwhite Russia, France and others have pressed for stronger measures. Now things are coming to a head, as they were bound to. A possible result is that the United Nations may be able to establish a precedent as to what constitutes a threat to world peace and what constitutes interference in a nation's internal politics.

There are proven charges against Franco. He gained and held his power with the military help of the Axis. He was a fawning admirer of Hitler and Mussolini, and gave them considerable aid in World War II. He had modeled his government along Axis lines, and is running a dictatorship of a cruel and repressive sort.

But does that make Franco a menace to world peace? Should the United Nations take active steps to remove him even though the Spanish people, given a free election me, ht astound the world by voting him continuance in power, as the Argentine voters did Peron?

There is good reason to answer yes to both those questions. The Spain of Francisco Franco is a menace to world peace because, so long as it remains, the fight arguest the Axis is not ended. WASHINGTON, D. C .- (NEA) - The Republican National Com mittee and the American Retail Federation held meetings in ad-joining rooms at Washington's Hotel Statler Monday. In a third, room, the Gridiron Club was holding a rehearsal for its next show. But this couldn't be any more satirical than the acts put on to the Republicans and retailers.



It wasn't a conspiracy, but both the Republicans and the retailers came to the same conclusion on OPA. That's right. They were both against it. The retailers were a little more broadminded however: Because they invited Chester Bowles to come in and give his side of the story before crit cizing his program. But when Bowles asked the retailers to keep their shirts on, a voice from the audience sang out "We haven't got any." That was the payoff.

The Republicans also elected a new national chairmen, Congressman B. (for Brazilla) Carroli Reece of Tennessee, to succeed Herbert Brownell, Jr. But if the choice had been up to the retailers, it probably wouldn't have been any different and couldn't have been more satisfactory. Either of the other two candidates, ex-Sen. John Danaher of Connecticut and John H. Hanes of New York, would have been equally okay. It was a field day for conservatism.

BUT it was when the Republicans got into their platform consideration that they really showed how conservative they were going to be in the coming campaign. Last December the Republicans met in Chicago and adopted an interim platform which was a masterpiece of generalities. They also appointed a seven-man committee, chairmaned by Barak T. Mattingly of Missouri, to fix it up good.

Mattingly made his report at the Washington meeting. Nobody paid much attention while it was being read, but the effect was that everybody thought the platform was dandy. Only recommendation was that they make it even stronger for conservatism.

What Stassen is shooting at is neighborhood or block-by-block organization of voters to study current issues and come to some definite conclusions on what the Republican platform should say on such controversial questions as labor policy and policy towards Russia. Probably the most interesting thing to watch during the coming months, up to the November elections, will be whether the Republican voters endorse the platform as dictated by the national committee, or whether Stassen's grass roots study clubs will come up with a really progressive platform and some new ideas that will guide the party to success in 1846 and 1948.




