## Spur Schools Get Two Bombers For Flying Class

SPUR, Tex., (UP) — The Spur Public School System has purchased two surplus army aircraft from the War Assets Corporation for eventual use in the pre-flight courses to be instituted in the schools next fall.

Both planes, the "Belching Buzzard," a B-17 bomber, and an AT-18, a twin-engine army transitional trainer are now resting at the Spur Airport, a field with three runways of 2,800 feet in length.

The Spur School System got the "Belching Buzzard," a plane that flew 118 bombing missions over Germany during the war, for the expenditure of a mere \$350. That's not much to pay for a plane that cost something like \$250,000 new. The AT-18 went to the school for \$150.

The cost of the two planes was borne by a Spur organization of businessmen interested in the development of aviation, the George S. Link Aeronautics Association.

**WOMAN AIDS EUROPE NEEDY BY ADOPTIONS**

ITHACA, N. Y. (UP) — When Mrs. C. R. Otto first originated her "Adopt a Family Plan" to aid war-stricken families in Europe, she never dreamed of the success it would have.

Already 35 families with no friends or relatives in America have been "adopted" by local residents, church or social groups and fraternal organizations. And name of more needy families in many countries are pouring in rapidly.

At the beginning there were more "adopters" than "ad-pees," but the picture is now reversed, says Mrs. Otto, herself a native of Holland.

In organizing the plan, a committee of nations was set up with a chairman for each country. Greece, Austria, Great Britain and Poland have local representatives and others are being named for Italy, Finland, Denmark, Belgium and Luxembourg. Parcels already have been sent to Norway, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, France and Holland.
