### Union College Physicist Lauded For Radar Role

Now that the wartime work of American scientists is being discussed, Dr. Peter I. Wold, late head of the Union College physics department, has been honored posthumously for his important role in radar development. The mechanism he helped devise furnished the earth's first man-made contact with the moon.

A specialist on electrical properties of metals and vacuum tube phenomena, Dr. Wold went to Hawaii early in the war to work on a secret research project for the Navy Bureau of Ordnance. He carried on liaison and survey work in the development of radar until his death here, June 17, 1945.

In a letter to Union College, President Karl T. Compton of Massachusetts Institute of Technology, praised Wold for his "most valuable" service as a scientific consultant to the head of Naval liaison at the Radiation Laboratory.

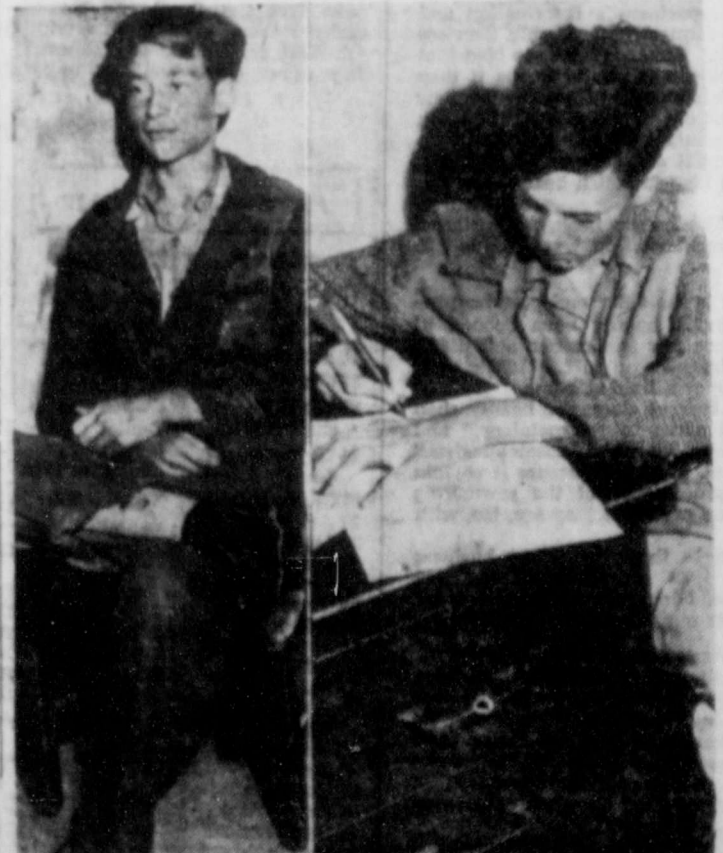
### Russia Agrees To Disarmament Plan For Nazis

DANGEROUS ONE-WAY STREETS

The various wartime alliance against the Axis has shown definite symptoms of breaking up...

It has long been the practice of nations, especially the strong ones, to go their own way when it seemed expedient to do so...

The United Nations, like the League of Nations before it, is trying to break these old habits. It isn't an easy job...

A good example of the latter, of course, is the Russo-Iranian dispute. Russia started it off with a unilateral violation of a three-power agreement...

In each instance, collective action prevailed, though not triumphantly. And Russia, despite an impressive performance, failed to win her points completely...

An equally good example has been our stumbling policy toward Argentina.

Our government went its own way without consulting its Pan-American neighbors. Lacking Pan-American support it succeeded only in arousing a united feeling of national pride in Argentina.

There still remains considerable danger of unilateral strife within the United Nations; of opposition for opposition's sake between Russia on the one hand and an Anglo-American team on the other...

Most nations learn slowly and with difficulty. But there are hopeful signs that they are learning.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—(NEA)—Are you a discharged veteran with a suppressed desire to go into business for yourself...

Commerce has a whole series of booklets, in fact, giving advice on how to establish and operate all kinds of shops...

It was the War Department's Information and Education Division—formerly the Moral Services—that started all this. Somebody got the idea that it would keep up the spirits of the troops...

The books are really educational. The beauty book, for instance, says that the first machine for permanent waving was invented in 1910.

HISTORICALLY, though, sawmilling is the older and prouder profession, the first sawmill in America having been opened at Jamestown in 1625.

To make up for this late start and lack of class, the beauty shop business is now trying to change its name to "cosmetology," and beauty shop operators call themselves "licensed cosmetologists."

There's apparently a lot more room in the cosmetology business than in sawmilling, though. The 1939 census reported 85,419 beauty shops. But today, says the other book, "the zing and buzz of more than 30,000 sawmills are heard in our forests."

IN a lot of other ways the two businesses have much in common. Both books say you should have skill and experience. You have to know your machinery. You have to have good health...

Both lumber and curls need thorough drying. A permanent wave in a plank, though, would get the boss sawyer fixed.

Better stick to sawmilling, buddy. It will keep you outdoors, and it won't be nearly so hard on your nerves.

Morgan, whose firm has been using nylon filter cloths for more than three years, puts it this way: "Suppose a woman has a dozen pairs of nylons. She puts six pairs away to 'save.' She wears the other six pairs. With the usual care, the six pairs she is wearing will outlast the six that she is saving."

Morgan has found that nylon keeps better when it is tightly sealed. It deteriorates faster when stored open to the air, the chemist points out. However, he adds that the deterioration won't take place in a few months or even within a year's time.

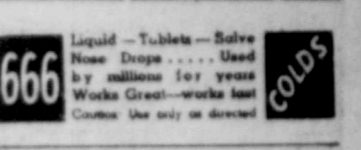

Brig. Gen. Ward H. Maris particularly urged parents and school authorities to conduct the widest possible safety education campaign so children would not be injured or killed by a sudden explosion of shells they may run across on the former artillery firing ranges.

"The ammunition used in training our soldiers to win the war was designed to kill our enemies," Gen. Maris said. "Now the war is over, it would be a great tragedy for the want of timely warning to lose a single life of our own people."

Thousands of duds of all types and sizes have been found in sweeps of the former ranges by expert demolition teams of the ordnance department. But undoubtedly some are too deeply imbedded in the earth to be detected. Later they may be uncovered by heavy, eroding rains.

## Army Bakeries Forecast Vast Saving In Wheat

CHICAGO (UP) — The Chicago Quartermaster Corps estimates that Army bakeries will "save" enough grain wheat during 1946 to bake a 262,000-mile ribbon of bread, one-half inch thick and four and a half inches wide.

Col. E. D. Ellis, depot commander, said that use of 80 per cent extraction wheat by Army bakers would save 18,967,794 pounds of cleaned grain wheat by the end of the year. That's enough wheat to make 22,000,000 one-pound loaves, Ellis said.
