Last rites for Mrs. Henrietta Elizabeth Brown of San Antonio were held Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the Morris Funeral Chapel with Rev. David C. Ham and Rev. Wallace N. Dunson officiating. Interment was in the Evergreen cemetery.

Mrs. Brown died in Ranger Wednesday, May 1. She was born in Meridian, Mississippi, May 10, 1864 and came to Texas with her family shortly after the civil war, settling in Cameron County. She had recently been making her home in San Antonio with her daughter, Mrs. H. Elizabeth Bennett.

Survivors are the daughter, Mrs. Bennett, and two sons, Calvin Brown of Ranger and William G. Brown of Dallas; the following grandchildren: Raymond E. Brown, Sgt. William H. Brown, Mrs. Roy Plumley, all of Ranger, Mrs. Kenneth Ambrose of Big Spring, Calvin Earl Brown of Sherman, Robert Edward Brown of Memphis, Tennessee, and Lt. Comdr. G. W. Brown, stationed in Guam. Nine great grandchildren also survive.

### N. E. GRISHAM IN DISTRICT ATT'Y RACE

N. E. Grisham, Eastland attorney, announces he is a candidate for Criminal District Attorney in the forthcoming election subject to the action of the Democratic Primary next July.

Grisham moved to Eastland in 1919 and has lived in Eastland practically all his life with the exception of the time spent away in school and in the army. He practiced law with his father, the late E. N. Grisham, for five years prior to his entry into the army, having enlisted as a private, and was assigned to the 90th Infantry Division in 1942, and was separated from the service January 22 of this year.

He is 32 years of age, married to the former Sybil Holder, and has two children, a daughter, Ann, and a son, Bob. He is a university graduate. They live on their farm one mile north of Eastland.

Grisham states that he will make a formal announcement later, but that in view of the requests from friends over the county who have asked him to run for the office he feels that he should offer his services. He stated: "I have never sought public office before, and when I am elected your District Attorney I will do my duty, as under my oath, I am directed to do, in upholding the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas."

### BLOODY FIGHT BEING WAGED TO OVERCOME CONVICTS

SAN FRANCISCO (UP) — Six explosions shook Alcatraz Island in rapid succession today as a band of desperate Alcatraz prison convicts who had seized a gun arsenal in the bloodiest fight for freedom ever made at the nation's most impregnable prison.

Just before noon in Washington federal prisons director James A. Bennett, announced today that the remaining rioters at the prison had been isolated and it's only a matter of time now before the whole situation will be brought under control.

Warden James A. Johnson issued a terse order to "shell them out" early today, 18 hours after the break for freedom began. Shortly afterwards a new barrage of tear gas and smoke shells whistled through the barred windows of the prison's main cell-block and exploded inside. The crime-hardened convicts—possibly as many as 16—apparently were prepared for a "fight to the finish" inside the cell block.

At least two guards were dead. One was killed in the early rioting. The second died before 8 a. m. At the Marine Hospital, where he was taken last night, fourteen other guards were wounded, several of them having been shot in cold blood after the convicts captured them yesterday.

William A. Miller, deputy Warden, was the second guard to die. Prison authorities earlier identified the first man killed as Harold B. Pites, a guard who killed one convict and wounded another in a 1938 attempted break.

Four prison officials who were trapped in the cellblock when the riot started were rescued. They were wounded and weak from loss of blood. They had lain on the floor more than seven hours feigning death to escape the convicts' bullets, before their rescue shortly before midnight. A fifth escaped uninjured.

### 41 Of Inch Of Rain Falls On Thursday Nite

Ranger got a total of .41 of an inch of rain Thursday night, according to the Times rain gauge when measured this morning.

Some hail fell along with the rain but not sufficient to cause any damage. However, heavy hail were reported at Olden and Butler camp, west of Ranger.

Residents of Olden reported that there was heavy damage to fruit trees and gardens and some property damage.

Thursday's rain was the first for May. April had a total fall of 1.91 and a total of 1.21 fell in March, bringing to a total for the three months 3.53 inches.

The cold wave which moved into Texas Thursday, preceded the rain here, hitting town late Thursday afternoon.

### PREMIER BUYS TEXAS, PACIFIC OIL PIPELINE

David D. Pickrell, superintendent for the Ranger division of the Premier Oil Refining Company today announced the purchase of approximately 96 miles of Texas Pacific Coal and Oil Company's pipeline.

The main line runs from Hill Top station on the Brazos to Mingo and is 36 miles long. About 60 miles of gathering line draw oil from Stephens, Young and Palo Pinto counties. The line gathers about 30,000 barrels of oil a month.

Pickrell stated that his company has been taking the oil from the line for sometime but is taking over the operation of the line. A consideration of more than \$100,000 was involved.

Sylvester Dayson president of the Premier and Pickrell and E. O. Mitchell, J. Roby Penn and C. E. Yeager of Ft. Worth, the latter three representing the T. P. negotiated the transaction.

### Drive For Cancer Control Funds Is Extended, May 20

Mrs. A. H. Johnson of Eastland, County Chairman for the 1946 campaign to raise funds for use of the Texas Division of the American Cancer Society, has received notice that the campaign will be extended to May 20.

The goal for Eastland County, Mrs. Johnson points out, is \$1,250. The national quota is \$12,000,000 while the quota for Texas is \$43,000, sixty per cent of which will be retained in the State for a thorough educational program having for its purpose the spreading of the information that cancer can be cured in its early stages and for the setting up of diagnostic and treatment centers where necessary.

### BOB BURKETT, GAME WARDEN, TRANSFERRED

Bob Burkett, State Game Warden for District No. 27, composed of Callahan, Stephens, Shackelford, Erath and Eastland counties, has been transferred, effective May 1, to District No. 64, composed of Brazoria, Fort Bend and Galveston counties. He will be stationed at Angleton and will be captain of the 64th district force.

### CITY TRUCK AVAILABLE FOR TRASH PICK UP

A. L. Stiles sanitation commissioner, announced today that the city has purchased a truck for collection of garbage in the residential section of the town.

Stiles stated that at the present they will follow the plan of having garbage picked up when residents call and request it. He stated that the service will be available to all and may be had by calling 78.

A charge of 50 cents a barrel will be the fee for the present and the city is eager for residents to take advantage of the service in order to help keep the town clean.

Stiles stated that he is starting out in earnest to clean up the town and urges the people to cooperate in the effort.

And all because she said "guts," just like that and plenty loud, too, during House debate on the bill to extend the draft.

### MAY BE FORCED TO LIFT MEAT PRICE CONTROL

WASHINGTON (UP) — The mounting official anger at the meat black market today increased possibilities that the government may abandon price controls on meat.

The Senate agriculture committee, in a report blasting government controls, late yesterday recommended immediate removal of all price restrictions and subsidies on livestock and meat.

At the same time President Truman told a news conference that controls would be lifted if it became necessary to order to control the black market.

The Senate committee termed the meat black market "scandalous" and said "government wartime controls have been in large measure responsible."

These developments came less than 24 hours after secretary of agriculture, Clinton P. Anderson, told the Senate banking committee that he would favor abandoning all meat price ceilings if the meat black market could not be controlled within 90 days.

### Denton Courthouse Freed From Debt

DENTON, Tex., (UP) — Exactly half a century after its erection, the Denton County Courthouse is now free from debt.

The last of the refunding bonds issued in 1946, ten years after the native stone building was constructed, were retired in April.

### Marine Recruiter To Be In Ranger May 10 Thru 24

A college education under the G. I. Bill of Rights is still available to young men enlisting in the United States Marine Corps.

The advance information sent in by Pl. Sgt. Eugene L. Riffe who is scheduled to make a visit to Ranger, and be stationed in the Post Office 10 to 24 May from 8 until 10:30 each date.

Sgt. Riffe explained that the length of college education to be obtained is one year in excess of four years.

The sergeant's visit is in conjunction with the Marine Corps drive to enlist 100,000 volunteer regulars for peacetime duty in two, three or four year enlistment periods.

All men accepted for first enlistment will be transferred to San Diego, California for their initial or "boot training" and upon completion of this training they will be given a ten day furlough.

Men eligible to be enlisted are those 17-25 years old, inclusive, who have no dependents and no previous military experience. Veterans of the armed services up to 32 years of age may enlist if they have been separated from the service less than a year.

Ex-Marines, desiring to retain their former rank, must reenlist within 90 days from date of discharge, otherwise they will be re-enlisted as privates.

Men who have served 18 or more months in the wartime Merchant Marine.

### ARABS CHANT DOWN WITH BRITAIN, U. S.

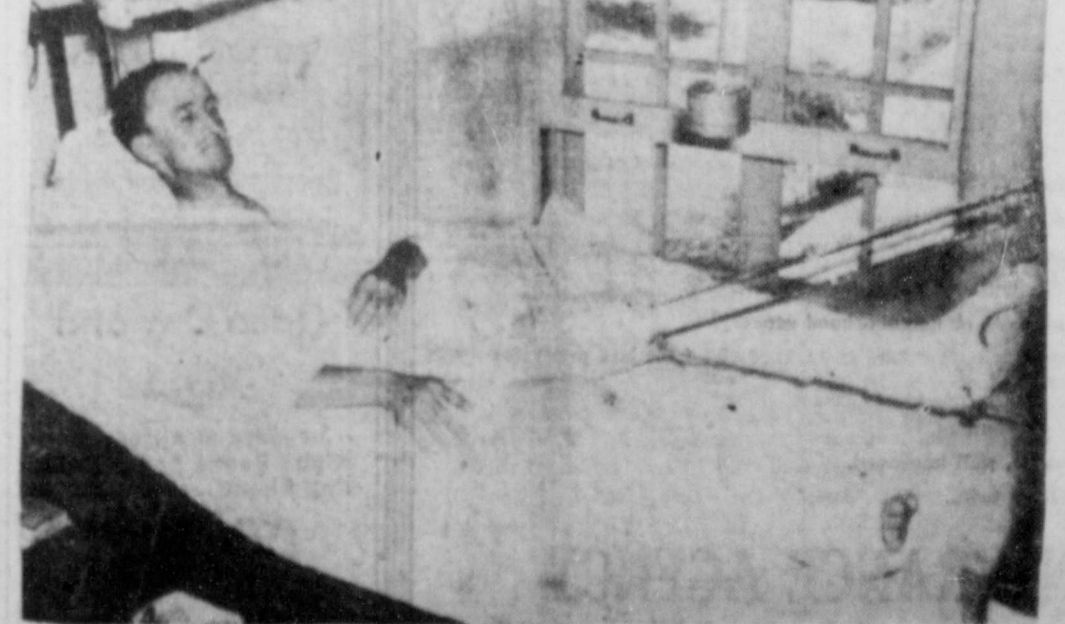
JERUSALEM (UP) — A clamoring mob of 15,000 Arabs chanting "down with Britain and America" and "shame on Atlee and Truman" spearheaded an Arabic general strike in Palestine today with a march on the old city of Jerusalem.

Leaders of the 1,000,000 Arabs on strike in protest against a British and American commission's report on Palestine urged a worldwide "holy war" against Britain and the United States.

British troops and police forces struggling to maintain order were stoned by the marching Arabs who cheered pictures of the former grand mufti whose support of Adolf Hitler caused his exile from Palestine.

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Citrus topped the agricultural field in California in 1945, with a farm value of more than \$206,000,000, almost double the value of grapes, which were in second place.

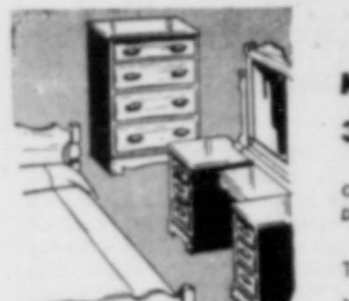

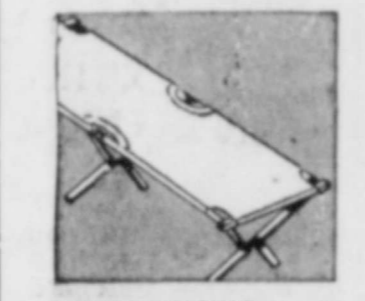

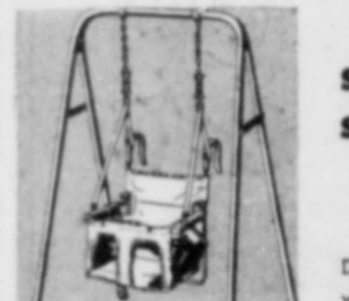

## Water Route 'Cross Florida Historic Idea

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (UP)—Treasure-seeking Spaniards 400 years ago, colonizing British in the 18th century and Americans with an eye to commerce ever since have sought a water route across Florida.

A total of 19 different routes have been proposed through the state from the Atlantic Ocean to the Gulf of Mexico.

According to Dr. Carita D. Curse of the Florida Academy of Sciences, who told an engineering group here that all nations which have controlled Florida wanted a cross-state waterway, no other project in the nation's history has had so many surveys made of it.

Indians told the Spaniards of a water route, but they apparently were thinking of trips by canoe after heavy rains had flooded the interior swampland. The Spanish explorers, who well knew the dangerous waters around the tip of Florida, sent three expeditions looking for the Indian waterway.

The English made many printings of water route maps that they captured from the Spanish, but they were too busy fighting wars to carry out any plans they may have had for finding or making a canal.

After the War of 1812, American interest began. Secretary of War John C. Calhoun ordered a survey of the canal route.

Since then, the history of the water route, which began with a search for a natural waterway and continued with plans for a ship canal, has centered on the construction of a barge canal across
