## Lewis Orders Miners Back To Work

### Coal Strike Threatens Philadelphia's Electric Power



Philadelphia's source of electric power is in danger of being cut off if the present coal strike continues. The top photo shows the normal stockpile of coal which the Philadelphia Electric Co., keeps at Petty's Island, in the Delaware River. This stockpile usually averages 258,000 tons. The bottom photo shows the same stockpile at Petty's Island, which has been depleted to 46,000 tons. ### DISTRICT TO CO-OPERATE IN SOIL CONSERVATION PROGRAM

The Palo Pinto Soil Conservation District Supervisors met in a special session Tuesday, May 7, 1946, to select entries for the "Save the Soil and Save Texas Achievement Program" sponsored by the Fort Worth Press. The program will recognize outstanding achievements in soil conservation in a thirty county north and north west Texas area, which includes thirteen Soil Conservation Districts. Various firms have donated \$3000.00 to be given as prizes as follows: \$1000.00 to the District that has completed the highest percent of the conservation practices that have been planned; \$1000.00 to the Conservation Group that has completed the highest percent of the conservation practices planned; \$500.00 to the man who has done the most to promote soil conservation, not necessarily a farmer; and \$500.00 to High School and Junior High School students that write the best essay on soil conservation. A plaque will be given to the farmer within each District that has the most outstanding conservation program in operation on his farm. Certificates will be presented to each District Coordinator that has completed and has in operation at present the conservation plan on his farm within the thirteen Districts.

The Palo Pinto Soil Conservation District Supervisors visited each farm that was eligible for the Plaque or Certificate. To have a complete conservation plan, the

pasture land must be properly stocked, the cultivated land must have had a legume crop planted on the entire acreage within the last three years; a complete terrace system with protected outlets, all retired land established to a permanent grass, strip cropping when needed, and other conservation practices that are necessary, depending on the farm. Winners in the Contest will be announced by the Board of Supervisors later in the month. Supervisors making the tour were: Leslie H. Hagman, George W. Stewart, Rado Jeffries, and O. H. Gayler.

### E. M. Threatt Is Candidate For Representative

E. M. Threatt, Sr., of Eastland has filed as a candidate for State Representative of District 108 composed only of Eastland county. "I will, if elected, oppose any increase in the pay of members of the Legislature; oppose any increase in present taxes on real estate, and will favor a law that will give the vote to boys and girls 18 years of age," Threatt said.

Threatt, who has resided in Eastland county for many years, made the race for State Representative from this district eight years ago. For the past five years he has been engaged in construction work for the government, working as a steam fitting foreman.

### CLAY PRODUCT PLANT GOES TO EASTLAND

A business deal was being consummated here this week between citizens of Eastland, the City of Eastland and J. W. Cline and associates of Dallas, whereby the latter will build and operate here a plant for the making of Haidite from Eastland county clays. The plant will be located on land secured from the City of Eastland just northwest of town and adjacent to the Texas & Pacific railroad.

### Admit Part Of Germany May Be In Nazi Hands

LONDON (UP) — John R. Hynd, chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster, admitted in the House of Commons today that "It is possible there are areas in Germany in which Nazis are in control."

William Shappard, conservative, charged that 400,575 displaced persons were coming about the British zone, "robbing other people and committing assault and battery on the civilian population."

### BURGLARS HIT EASTLAND AND RANGER IN NITE

Burglars struck in Eastland and Ranger sometime during Thursday night or early Friday morning, entering the Dr. Pepper Bottling Company in Ranger and the Coca Cola Bottling Plant, Warren Motor Company and McGraw Motor Company all in Eastland.

According to Sheriff John Hart a total of about \$125 was taken in the Eastland robberies. Total amount taken from the Dr. Pepper plant has not been determined but it is feared that it will run into several thousand dollars.

Entrance to the Dr. Pepper plant was made through a side window and foot prints were found in the soft dirt beneath the window. The Dr. Pepper safe knob was knocked off and contents taken out. Papers, cash drawers and other items were shoved back under the safe and tentacles thrown on the floor. It is believed the robbers worked the safe was closed after being looted, so that the robbery would not be evident to anyone looking through the window. It has not yet been determined if a vault inside the safe was robbed, however the knob to the vault door was found outside the safe.

Further examination of the safe is awaiting arrival of fingerprint experts and after prints have been taken from the safe it will be gone into to determine exact loss to the company, which M. L. King, owner of the plant, stated might be several thousand dollars.

Entrance to the Warren Motor Company where \$15 dollars was taken from a cash drawer, was gained by prying off the lock of a door. At the McGraw Motor Company where about \$115 was taken from the safe after the knob had been knocked off, entrance to the building was made through a window.

The burglars entered the Coca Cola plant through one of the large iron gates but did not secure any loot. The knob on the gate was knocked off, but tear gas attachments apparently drove them away.

### Committee Votes To Extend Draft Up To July 1

WASHINGTON (UP) — The House military affairs committee today approved legislation to extend the draft law until July 1.

Committee chairman, Andrew J. May, D., Ky., said he would ask consent of the House to bring the measure to the floor later today. If that fails, he said, the Senate-approved measure will be brought up Monday.

The committee in less than 20 minutes approved the stop-gap measure for floor action.

The Senate yesterday hastily passed the legislation which extends the draft for 30 days from the present expiration date of May 15.

May declined to give the committee vote, but said it was not unanimous.

### Says Promotions After Charges Had Been Filed

WASHINGTON (UP) — A Senate committee was told today that two Navy captains were promoted to rear admirals after a Navy investigation disclosed that they had permitted organized gambling to be carried on in a Navy-supervised civilian recreation hall at Pearl Harbor.

Rear Adm. Austin R. Doyle, deputy inspector general of the Navy named the officers as Rear Adm. H. W. Payne, USN, a n d Rear Adm. C. O. Kell, USN.

### HOUSE GROUP WOULD OUTLAW LEWIS DEMANDS

WASHINGTON (UP) — A House judiciary subcommittee today agreed to approve a bill aimed at outlawing the tonnage royalty demands of United Mine Workers Chief John L. Lewis.

The House subcommittee's decision came as the Senate also prepared to consider labor legislation in the heat of anger at the coal strike. When it completes work on the British loan, set for late today, the Senate will take up anti-strike bills.

House subcommittee members said their formal approval of the proposed legislation would not come before Tuesday, when they will meet again to study a final draft of the bill.

They said the committee had agreed to combine the anti-royalty bill of Rep. Willis Robertson, D., Va., and a bill by Rep. Howard W. Smith, D., Va., which would apply the principles of the recently named Anti-Petrillo law to all forms of commerce, instead of just to radio.

### Says Sinking Of Athenia Honest Nazi Mistake

NUERNBERG (UP) — Grand Admiral Karl Doenitz testified today that the U-boat sinking of the British liner Athenia on the first day of the Anglo-American war was an "honest mistake."

The Athenia was mistaken by sea raiders for an auxiliary cruiser and was torpedoed, Doenitz said. More than 100 lives were lost. The Nazis seized the opportunity for propaganda claims that the British sank their own steamer in a bid for an Anti-Nazi swing by the United States.

### Piano Recitals To Be Given On Friday, Saturday

The piano department of the Ranger Junior College and High School will present students in two recitals at the High School auditorium.

The recitals will be given Friday and Saturday nights at 8:15 o'clock and the public is invited to attend. Solo and duo-piano numbers will be featured on the program.

### Late Bulletins

ROME (UP) — The Italian cabinet today accepted Humbert II as King of Italy, but only after tossing off the traditional designation "by the grace of God and will of the nation."

PARIS (UP) — Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin today accused Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov of trying to block the holding of a peace conference.

### Four Given Fellowships For Cancer Research

AUSTIN, Texas — Two men and two women have been awarded Rosalie B. Hite pre-doctoral fellowships for cancer research, amounting to \$1200 each, Dean A. P. Brogan of the University of Texas graduate school announced today.

The recipients of the fellowships who will begin their work next September are: Ernest Beerstecher of Detroit, Mich., who is working toward his Ph.D. degree at the University of Texas; Miss Anna V. Davidson of St. Anthony, Idaho, a senior student at Brigham Young University, Provo, Utah; Miss Jennie Teoberg of Ridgefield, Wash., a senior student at Grinnell College, Grinnell, Iowa, and William E. Norris, Jr., of Nixon, Texas, a graduate student at the University of Texas.

The pre-doctoral fellowships of \$100 a month each were provided through the bequest of Miss Rosalie B. Hite of Houston who died in 1945. In her will she provided that the income from her real estate holdings be used by the University to establish fellowships for cancer research.

Work under the fellowships was done at the main University in Austin, the Medical Branch at Galveston or the M.D. Anderson hospital for cancer research in Houston.

### Veterans Get Third Of Company's Jobs

NEW YORK (UP) — Veterans hold jobs in American Can Co. at the rate of nearly one veteran for every two other workers, Carl H. Black executive vice president, announced after a survey of the company's veterans' program revealed nearly 7,000 veterans among the 25,500 people working in the company's plants across the United States and Canada.

Nearly 3,000 of those veterans are former regular employees who had left to enter the service, Mr. Black said, and of that number 615, or nearly one out of every five that have returned, have been placed in higher ranking jobs than the ones they left to go to war.

When supplies and increased facilities are available the company expects a total employment rate of about 20 per cent over the present level, according to Mr. Black. He said this will be more than enough to provide jobs for the nearly 3,000 former regular employees yet to return from the services.

### After Helping Him They Pinch Him

AUSTIN (UP) — State Police believe there is a time to be gentle and a time to get tough.

Last Sunday night an Austin man was injured in an automobile collision. Three highway patrolmen called out by the accident solicited to blood transfusion for him. Monday they filed a charge of driving while intoxicated against him.

According to Col. R. L. Emsay, Wyoming state selective service director, Wyoming had the lowest number of physical rejections in the nation during wartime drafting.

### STOLEN CAR RECOVERED; ANOTHER LOST

Chief George Murphy stated today that one stolen car has been recovered in Ranger and police are on the search for one stolen Wednesday night from in front of the Ranger General Hospital.

Thursday night, policemen became suspicious of a driver of a car and started following the car. The driver became alarmed and led the police on a wild chase. Finally the driver struck a telephone pole and as he did the car door came open. He fled from the scene.

The police confiscated the car and later learned that it had been stolen at Dublin about midnight and belonged to Clarence Hillman. The local police got the car back at 7:30 a. m.

They yesterday night when Mrs. Fannie Ford visited with her son at the Ranger General Hospital. Her car was taken to the hospital and recovered.

### Seeks Truck Nos. To Learn Source Of His Meat

AUSTIN (UP) — State Highway Department offices were flooded by repeated inquiries from a citizen for a list of the truck numbers assigned to each county in the state. He wrote several times in the last few weeks and finally made a personal call.

"We can't understand why you are so interested in truck license numbers," said one of the clerks. "Well, to tell you the truth," the man replied, "I am a meat buyer. If I have the list of truck numbers issued to each county, I can tell where the hogs brought to me for sale come from."

The department employee was still puzzled. Further explanation made it clear.

"Well, I am pretty well acquainted with what is raised in the different counties," the man said. "The hogs come from a present raising country, they are not worth as much as those from other places."

"Peanut-fed hogs, he said, will be actually fat and heavy but they won't pay out on the table—the fat cooks all out if the bacon gets as far as the stove."

### 2 WEEKS TRUCE STARTS MON.; TO REPLENISH COAL SUPPLY

WASHINGTON (UP) — President John L. Lewis of the United Mine Workers —AFL— today ordered soft coal miners back to work for two weeks beginning Monday.

His only condition was that mine operators agree to pay a retroactively any wage increase that is eventually negotiated.

Lewis said in a telegram to all local union heads—

"This action is the contribution of the UMW to our nation's economy, which is being imperiled by the rapidly and selfish greed of the coal operators and associated financial interests and by demagogues who have tried to make the public mind into a place of hysteria rather than great justice and fair treatment to the men who mine the nation's fuel."

Lewis' surprise announcement came shortly after President Truman announced the mine leader and a representative of the operators to meet with him in the White House at 4 p. m. today. Both sides accepted the invitation.

Lewis gave copies of the telegram to reporters in the presence of the 250-man policy committee, which he said had approved the truce.

"The coal to be mined during this two week period can be utilized for consumption of essential facilities and the national health and security thus safeguarded while efforts to negotiate a contract continue," Lewis said in his telegram.

### British Women To Sew Tapestry Of War Deeds

LONDON (UP) — The contribution of women during the war is to be sewn into history in a huge tapestry designed on the lines of similar historic works of art.

Members of the National Federation of Women's Institutes will stitch the story of women's wartime exploits into the tapestry. The idea is based on the famous Bayeux tapestry which was worked by Queen Matilda and her ladies at the time when William the Conqueror was invading England.

All counties in England, a n d Wales will co-operate in the project, being designed by Miss Sybil Hunt of Winchester. Each county will work on a separate section, all pieces later being assembled. A special school is being conducted to teach leading Institute workers embroidery stitches, which has been used for all embroidery in Winchester Cathedral. It incorporates only English stitches, with great emphasis on color.

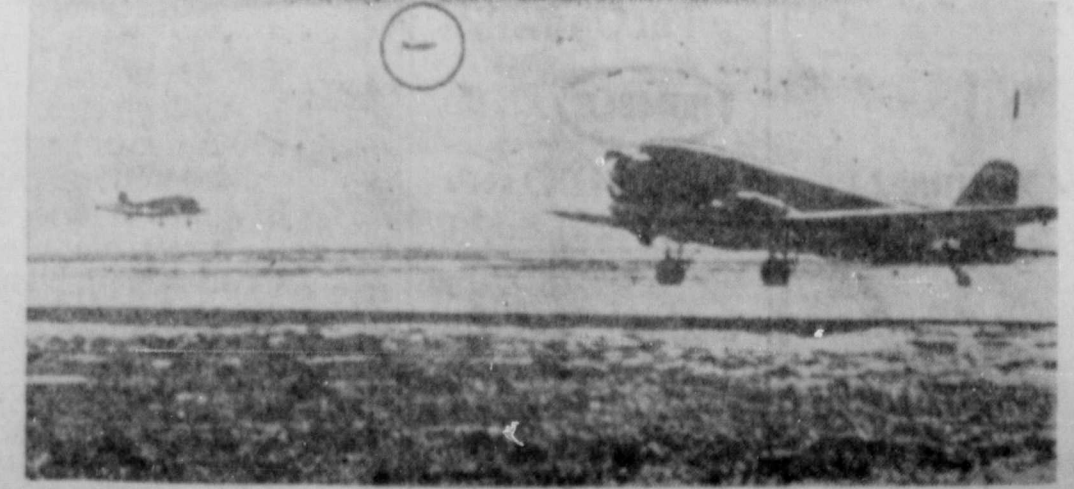
Woolen and hemp yarns are to be used in the tapestry. Upon completion, it will be offered as a gift to the nation for hanging in a public building.

Eastland Woman Named AMVET Auxiliary

One of the most outstanding and meritorious accomplishments enacted by an AMVET at their Executive Meeting in Houston, was the passing of a resolution introduced by AMVET Bob Kennedy of Brady, calling for approval of a subsidiary organization to be known as "The Amvet Auxiliary." The resolution was based upon the action of the National Convention in its first convention in Chicago. This convention approved the forming of subsidiaries and specified that they would be known as Amvet Auxiliaries. The Texas delegation was very instrumental in getting the subject before the convention and played a small part in its adoption by the parent organization.

TEST LOWLY SCRUB OAK AS TANNIN SOURCE

GAINESVILLE, Fla. (UP) — A boost for the nation's leather industry from the humble and despised scrub oak tree is predicted by research engineers at the University of Florida.

In another instance of science turning a liability into an asset, the engineers are working on a

project to get tannin—a substance used in making leather from cowhide—from the bark of the Florida scrub oak trees.

Farmers and foresters have had to use for the tree because of its encroachment upon pine land. If the university project is concluded successfully, however, the farmers will profit from their previously worthless scrub oak groves.

They'll also have a local market for cattle hides. A new Florida industry in large tanneries is foreseen by the university engineering and industrial experiment station, which needs only additional funds now to carry out a simple factory tannery operation.

The university research engineers explain that chestnut wood, up to now the nation's chief domestic source of tannin, has all but disappeared because of a plant disease that is destroying American chestnut trees. The leather industry has thus been forced to depend largely on imports. And, of course, the war made tannin supplies even scarcer.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has contracted with the university experiment station for processing of 200 tons of scrub oak bark to establish the value of the tannin-developing project. A highly mechanized process for which machinery has been designed will be necessary to remove the bark from the trees. For the tests, the Florida state board of control has released \$2,500 and the state lines that business interests which will profit from the project will contribute the remainder of an estimated total of \$20,000 needed. Except for the leaves and the stumps, all the tree will be utilized in processing—the wood for pulp and the bark for tannin.

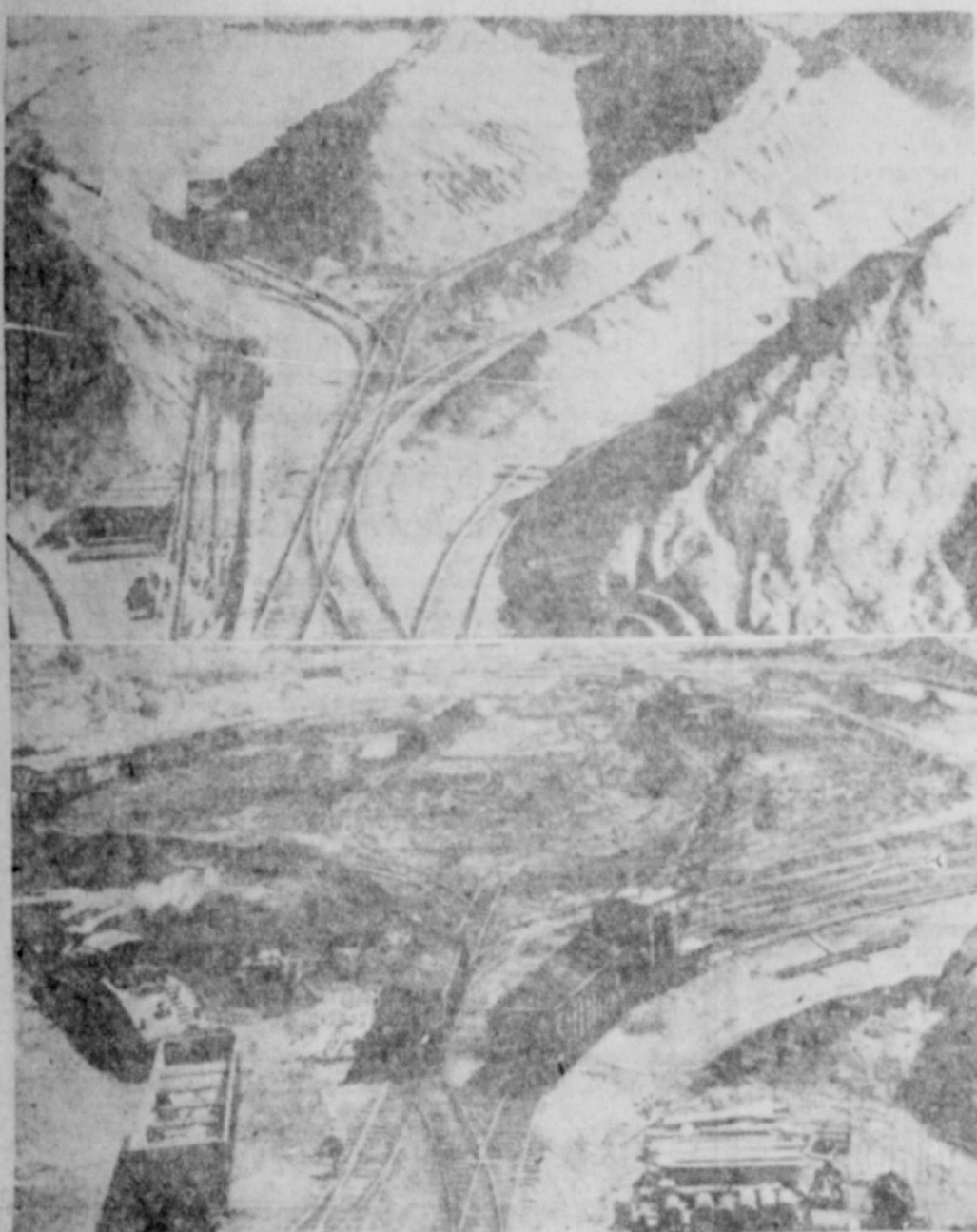

### CLAY PRODUCT PLANT GOES TO EASTLAND

A business deal was being consummated here this week between citizens of Eastland, the City of Eastland and J. W. Cline and associates of Dallas, whereby the latter will build and operate here a plant for the making of Haidite from Eastland county clays. The plant will start for the immediate start of construction work on the plant which will cost approximately \$100,000. It will employ some 35 people to start, all but about five or six skilled employees, will be from Eastland and vicinity. Haidite is made by a patented process and is secured by heating certain types of clays found here in an almost inexhaustible quantities and is used instead of sand and gravel in making concrete. It is said to be very fine material and greatly in demand.

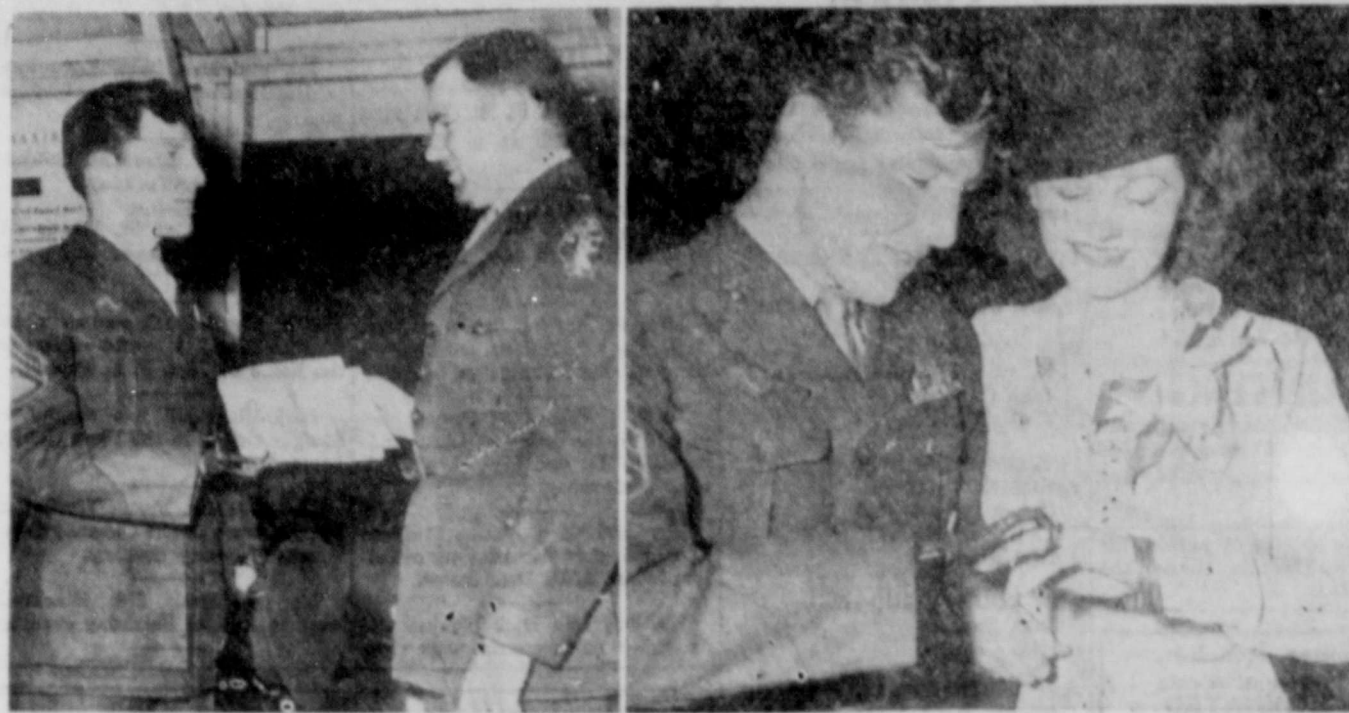
