

# Gentle rains become deluge

The weekend's gentle rains, falling on already-wet ground, turned fierce Tuesday morning and swamped parts of the county with up to five inches.

**HEAVY RAINS** created new lakes all around the county and closed some of the highways

around Dimmitt. Maintainers were out after lunch cleaning mud and debris off of the roads.

Dimmitt received 1.65 inches between 7:30 and 11 a.m. Tuesday, causing streets to flood, and created new lakes around the city.

very much to two inches around town," Lange added.

Bradley Butane in Sunnyside recorded three-fourths of an inch.

A total of three inches Monday and Tuesday were recorded at Community Grain in Frio near the old Easter school where the highway has several dips, the road was under water, but otherwise not much flooding occurred in that area.

Gary Lovelace reported 3½ inches of rain on his farm north of town to Chuck Braafladt at Dimmitt 66, Inc.

**STATE 194** two miles southeast of Dimmitt was flooded Tuesday morning with water running across the pavement and forming a lake in a nearby field.

Tuesday morning started with an eery, heavy darkness, and the dawn was three hours late. The city's street lights, controlled by photoelectric cells, didn't turn themselves off until after 9 o'clock. Many of the city's housewives "slept in," refusing to believe morning had come as the gentle rain and darkness seemed tailor-made for 40 more winks.

The gentle rainfall turned into a heavy downpour at 7:30, and by the time the rainclouds broke and drifted away at midday, they had dropped an official 2.42 inches in the city, hiking Dimmitt's 36-hour total to 3.22 inches, including .80 of an inch that fell Sunday evening.

**DIMMITT**, which suffered through the drought with only 2.96 inches during the first five months of the year, has now received an official 13.48 inches in 1971, thanks to the almost-daily rains recently. The new total is just 3.27 inches short of the annual average of 16.76.

## Classes to start Monday

Students in all three of the county's school districts will march back to school Monday and join their teachers—who already have been attending classes for a week or more.

**ALL TEACHERS** in the Dimmitt school system reported Monday. In-service training will continue through the week, with student registration scheduled for Thursday and Friday.

North and South Elementary pupils may register from 9 a.m. to noon and from 1 to 4 p.m. today (Thursday). The eighth grade is scheduled to register from 9 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. and the seventh grade from 10:30 a.m. to noon.

High school registration is also scheduled for today. Senior registration is 9 to 10:30 a.m.; juniors, 10:30 a.m. to noon; sophomores, 1 to 2:30 p.m.; and freshmen, 2:30 to 4 p.m. Anyone not able to register may come in Friday to complete the registration process.

**ALL PERSONS** eligible for free or reduced-price lunches are reminded that for their lunches to start the first day of classes, they need to sign up before school starts.

## State says 'go' on new library

The Texas State Library this week notified Jack Miller, chairman of the Castro County Library Board, that it has approved Part 1 of the formal application for state funds to help build the proposed new library here.

**MILLER SAID** that before final approval can be given, two more applications must be submitted after the architect is hired and detailed plans and specifications are submitted and approved.

A building site also will have to be chosen before the next application is due, Miller said. "Although we expected \$48,000, the State Library anticipates that we can qualify for a full \$50,000 in matching funds," Miller added.

The next step is to select an architect, and after that to determine a definite site for the library with the help of the architect, library consultants and other knowledgeable people in this area.

**WHEN THE** total cost of the building and construction site is known, a fund drive will be started for citizens to contribute the amount needed to complete the project.

Without formal solicitations, interested citizens and businesses have already contributed over \$4,000, Miller said, in addition to the initial gift of over \$100,000 by Mrs. Tylene Perry of Plainview.

## Contractor dies in freak mishap

In a freak accident last Thursday, a Lubbock contractor was killed and two Dimmitt men were injured—one seriously—when they were hit by flying sections of a sheared telephone pole.

**KILLED** was Gaylon Wayne Keeling, 37, of Lubbock, co-owner of the Diamond G Construction Co., which is headquartered in Saa Angelo. He died of head injuries at Plains Memorial Hospital at 3:30 p.m. Thursday.

Hospitalized with skull fractures and a severe concussion was Jerry Frazier, 23, of Dimmitt, an employee of Diamond G. He received emergency treatment at Plains Memorial Hospital, then was transferred to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock, where he was admitted to the intensive care unit in serious condition. However, his condition was listed as "fair" Wednesday morning.

Jim Fisher, West Texas Telephone Co. lineman, escaped with a bruised arm. He was treated and released at Plains Memorial.

**THE FATAL** mishap occurred on US 385 near Dimmitt Airport, where a telephone cable crosses the highway overhead. Keeling, whose company has been installing underground cable for West Texas Telephone Co. for the past year, was standing on the west shoulder of the highway with Frazier and Fisher. The three men were discussing ways to bury a new cable across the highway.

A new pole had been installed next to the old one to hold new connections to the cable, and Diamond G lineman "Smoky" Keese was on the new pole, waiting for the new cable to be passed up to him for connecting. Keeling, Frazier and Fisher were standing 20 to 30 feet east of the two poles.

Unnoticed by the workmen, the old cable above the pavement evidently had sagged as highline wires alongside the highway were transferred from the old pole to the new one.

starch, the white powder, is the main product, syrup which we know as Karo, different sugars to sell to candy makers and for soft drinks glucose, dextrose - five things are made there, the stuff doctors put in your arm when you are sick. The competitors who have visited the mill say "It is the plant of tomorrow, it is so modern." Mr. Olmick says there are 80 people employed mostly from Dimmitt, but the experts are Mr. Blanchard from England, several from Mexico City, and Johnnie from the Philippines. Gene Sanders, a curly-haired man from Childress, showed us the different processes. George Rush, the main chemist, explained the testing process. He had several men working. Mrs. John Kittrell is in the lab department, and Daniel Irlock helped show some of the storage tanks and water hoses everywhere. They wash the grain so many times no dirt or spray is left.

We met E. E. Stewart, one of the main guards. He wears a hard top white hat and carries a gun so don't mess around out there. A dozen girls work in the office but I will talk to them later. While out there I talked to Clayton Ellis. He and Cookie Hognett were married recently at Odell Church of Christ. Clayton has relatives there. He works in Plainview. He is the son of Gene and Dorothy Ellis.



## Economic structure of county analyzed in new Census report

Employment in Texas totaled 2,984,536 in March, 1970, a 2½ percent increase from the March 1969 figure, according to a report issued this week by the Bureau of the Census, US Dept. of Commerce.

TAXABLE payrolls in the first quarter of 1970 totaled \$4.5 billion, eight percent higher than in the comparable quarter of 1969.

Harris County had the largest employment, 630,227, an increase of 5.9 percent from the first quarter of 1969.

The report, "County Business Patterns, 1970, Texas," is one of a series of annual reports providing county-by-county and


state first quarter economic data. It presents data by detailed industry classification on quarter taxable payrolls, and the number and size (by employment) of reporting units for private, non-farm business firms reported under the Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA).

Information in the report is based principally on records of the Social Security Administration, supplemented by a special survey of multi-unit companies. About three-fourths of all employees in the US are covered by the report series. Not covered are government employees, self-employed persons, farm workers, those employed in domestic service and certain transportation workers.

BECAUSE of the detailed nature of the data for each county, the reports are useful to business for analyzing market potential, measuring the effectiveness of sales and advertising programs, setting sales quotas and budgets, and analyzing the industrial structure of regions. They are also useful to governmental units for administration and planning.

Copies of the report, "County Business Patterns, 1970, Texas," are available for \$2 from the Superintendent of Documents, US Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C., 20402, or from Dept. of Commerce field offices in major cities.

Published information by county and by industry also will be available at cost on punch-cards and computer tapes. Inquiries should be addressed to Chief, General Economic Statistics Division, Bureau of the Census, Washington, D.C. 20233.

### ASCS notes

## Set-aside requirements for 1972 are outlined

In 1972 the following requirements will be necessary regarding set-aside acreage:

1. PRODUCTIVITY of designated acreage shall be at least equal to the average of the other cropland on the farm normally used for crops. In determining the productivity of set-aside, comparison shall be made with land on which program crops normally are produced.
2. In the case of blended dry-land-irrigated yields, the designated acreage must reflect the proper proportion of each.
3. The designated acreage must be cropland which under

normal conditions could have been planted to a crop for harvest in the current year.

4. The set-aside acreage should be in one field where possible and parts of fields of reasonable size and shapes should be designated only to complete set-aside requirements.

5. The set-aside acreage must be designated at time of certification.

6. Acreage used as set-aside will not be eligible for prevented or failed planting credit. This is a change from 1971.

### MAJOR 1972 PROGRAM CHANGES

1. National domestic wheat allotment for 1972 is 19.7 million acres, same as 1971.
2. Required set-aside equal to 83 percent of the 1972 farm domestic allotment.
3. Price support loans at the national average of \$1.25 per bushel as previously announced.
4. Barley will be included as a feed grain in 1972.
5. Substitution of feed grain and soybean acreage as wheat is authorized if needed to protect loss of allotment.

### RURAL ENVIRONMENTAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

Requests for cost-sharing under the Rural Environmental Assistance Program will be accepted Sept. 21 through Sept. 24 for conservation practices to be carried out by Dec. 31, 1971. You must make application for assistance before starting a practice in order to earn cost-sharing.

### Highway use tax deadline Aug. 31

When Congress passed the Interstate Highway plan, it set up a system to help pay for the nationwide network of highways. They imposed a highway use tax on large trucks, truck-tractors, and buses.

THE INTERNAL Revenue Service have issued a reminder to truck owners that Aug. 31 is the deadline for filing their Form 2290 and paying the highway use tax for the fiscal year which began July 1, 1971.

If you are not sure as to whether your truck is big enough to put you in a taxable category, IRS can send you Publication 349, Federal Use Tax on Trucks, Truck-Tractors and Buses. Write to Internal Revenue Service, 1100 Commerce Street, Dallas, 75202.

Termining the National Legislative Conference in Minneapolis "the most important conference for state leaders to be held this year," Mutscher said he was pleased to have a number of the Texas House members taking advantage of the opportunity to learn ways for more effective and responsive state government.



The policy is designed for children who are unable to pay full price for school lunches. Applications may be made by filling in the forms sent home in a letter to the parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school.

Applications for lunches may be submitted any time during the school year. Information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility.

Under the provisions of the policy, the principal will review the applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the local official, he may request either orally or in writing for a hearing to appeal the decision. Ted Averitt, superintendent,

has been designated as the hearing official. Hearing procedures are outlined in the policy.

The policy also provides that there will be no identification or discrimination against any student unable to pay the full cost of a lunch.

A complete copy of the policy is on file in each school and in the office of the superintendent where it may be reviewed by any interested patron.

Have you ever heard of wampum money? It was the first medium of exchange in the New England colonies. Wampum was simply various shells of different colors ground to the size of a grain of corn. Each shell had a hole drilled through it for stringing on leather thongs. The General Court of Massachusetts authorized wampum as legal tender in 1637. It ordered "that wampum should be passed at 6 a penny for any sum under 12d." The shell money was legal until 1661. In 1662, the same General Court authorized the coinage of New England's first standard metallic currency. They established a mint and issued the silver New England shillings, and fractional denominations. The design was simple and invited counterfeiting. ged on the van of a passing freight truck, and the force snapped the old pole in two places, sending sections of it hurtling through the air and into the three men standing on the highway's edge.

Keeling was hit in the back of the head and was thrown into Fisher, who was sent flying across the highway shoulder and onto the pavement. Frazier was hit in the cheek and forehead, receiving multiple fractures of the skull and jawbones.

The freak accident occurred so quickly that those on the scene were unable later to reconstruct it fully.

**SERGIO RAMIREZ** of Hereford, driver of the Merchants Fast Freight van truck, said he did not notice the cable or the men along the highway as he drove northward out of Dimmitt, since there were no warning flags out.

Keese, who was on the new pole, told West Texas Telephone Co. officials that he felt a sudden vibration as the relay wires between the old and new poles snapped, that he heard the sound of ripping lumber, and that the next sight he saw was the three men's bodies hurtling through the air. None of the workmen apparently noticed the passing truck, he was quoted as saying.

Reeford Burrous, construction supervisor for West Texas Telephone Co., said the pole evidently was not snapped directly by the pull of the truck against the cable, but by a backlash after the cable slipped off the van and whipped the opposite direction.

"IT WAS a three-quarter-inch cable with a steel support strand, and it didn't break," Burrous said. "It caught the top right corner of the van and was carried down the highway, then it apparently slipped off the truck and backlashed. I think the backlash was what snapped the pole and flung it across the road. The truck was going north, but the part of the pole that was still in the ground was angling south after the accident."

**FUNERAL** services for Keeling were held at 10 a.m. Saturday in Resthaven-Singleton-Wilson Funeral Home Chapel of Lubbock, with Dr. Hardy Clemons, pastor of the Second Baptist Church, officiating. Burial was in Lubbock's Resthaven Memorial Park.

Keeling and his family had lived in Lubbock 2½ years. In addition to owning the Diamond G Construction Co., he was the owner of the Miss Seventeen Dress Shop in Monterey Center. He is survived by his wife, Shirley, a son, Tip Layne, and a daughter, Gaywynne Diane, both of the home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Keeling of San Angelo; four brothers, Aubrey J. and Julian Howard of Texarkana, Ronald Lee of Los Angeles and Jackie Lynn of San Angelo; and three sisters, Mrs. Jeri Hood of Turkey, Mrs. Lela Fern Conner of San Angelo and Mrs. Patricia Ann Neating of Iowa.

**Help available for drug abusers and delinquents**

The Central Plains Comprehensive Community Mental Health-Mental Retardation Center in Plainview will establish a regional treatment center for juvenile delinquency and drug abuse with a grant approved Friday by Gov. Preston Smith.

THE CENTER'S service area includes Castro and eight other counties. The award, \$196,480, comes from the Criminal Justice Council, which oversees statewide law enforcement planning and administers funds from the US Department of Justice for crime control projects in Texas.

It will be matched by a local in-kind contribution valued at \$80,047.

Adjudicated delinquents from the nine-county region served by the MH-MR Center will be accepted into the program, which is geared to drug abuse and its residual health problems.

JUVENILES will be admitted into the day hospital and will have individual and group therapy under supervision of the staff psychiatrist.

Extensive use of volunteers and community services hopefully will increase the chances of returning the child from his antisocial behavior into the norms of society by working with him in his own home area.

Counties served by the center include Castro, Bailey, Briscoe, Floyd, Hale, Lamb, Motley, Parmer and Swisher.

The award was among 39 action grant applications and one for a planning grant considered by the Criminal Justice Council at its monthly meeting. Applications totaled \$3,455,547.

**City calls for paving requests**

The city commission voted Monday night to have another paving program next spring, and City Manager E. B. Noble said anyone with paving requests should sign up at the city hall.

"NEW PAVING must adjoint old paving, and must be the full width of the street, meaning that property owners on both sides of the street must agree to participate in the paving project," Noble said.

"The city constructs the paving and pays 10 percent of the cost, with property owners paying 90 percent. Property owners' cost during this summer's program was approximately \$6.50 per front foot," Noble said.

"The owner of a lot 50 feet wide would pay approximately \$325 for his paving. The city can arrange for four equal payments over a four-year period," he added.

This summer's paving project included 30 blocks of sealcoating and eight blocks of new paving.

A Dimmitt family's life was turned topsy-turvy on Friday the 13th when a 16-year-old youth shot himself with his target rifle and his mother wrecked the family car while rushing him to the hospital.

WOUNDED in the shooting accident was Bobby Lee Bossett. He told police and hospital officials that he was cleaning his 22 rifle in his room about 7:30 p.m. when it discharged, wounding him in the right shoulder. The long-rifle slug went through his body, exiting from the back below the right shoulder blade.

His mother, Mrs. B. C. Bossett, was rushing him to Plains Memorial Hospital when her car collided with a 1971 Ford pickup driven by Donnie Nelson at the intersection of Bedford and Broadway.

When city police arrived at the accident scene, they thought at first that Bossett had been hurt in the collision. But when they learned from the distraught mother that the youth was suffering from a gunshot wound, they took him to the hospital's emergency entrance in a patrol car. Mrs. Bossett was later cited for running a red light. Bossett was released from the hospital Tuesday morning.

DeVANey checked out of Parkland Hospital last week and is now an out-patient, going in for daily checkups and three-a-week physical therapy sessions.

"The doctors Tuesday were just tickled to death with all the tests," he said. "The kidney is just functioning wonderfully. I'm getting stronger every day."

He said his feet and hands, which had lost their feeling since he had both kidneys removed last year, "are still bad, but they're beginning to come back."

HE IS NO longer taking the revolutionary new anti-rejection serum, which is believed to have been a major factor in the success of his kidney transplant.

"I had a real bad reaction to it—I guess I nearly went under awhile—and had to quit taking it," he said. However, he is now taking an anti-rejection pill which apparently is working satisfactorily.

**Free or reduced-price lunches available in all county schools**

Students from large or low-income families may be eligible for free or reduced-price lunches in all of the county schools this fall.

SUPERINTENDENTS J. M. Slavik of Nazareth, Charlie White of Dimmitt and Ted Averitt of Hart announced a free and reduced-price lunch policy for school children unable to pay the full price.

Eligibility determinations are made on a family basis. That is, all the children in the same family attending schools under the jurisdiction of the same school food authority are to receive the same benefits—a free lunch or a reduced-price lunch, not some a free lunch and some a reduced-price lunch.

Families falling within the adopted scales or those suffering from unusual circumstances or hardships are urged to apply for free or reduced price lunches for their children. They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school.

APPLICATIONS may be submitted any time during the school year. The form itself is simple to complete and requests information needed to determine economic need based on the income and number of persons in the family, and any unusual circumstances or hardships which affect the family's ability to pay for school lunches. Under the provisions of the

policy, Supt. Slavik in Nazareth, Elmer Berryhill in Dimmitt and the individual school principals in Hart will review applications and determine eligibility.

IF A PARENT is dissatisfied with the ruling of his local school official, he may make a request either orally or in writing for a hearing to appeal the decision. Sister Mary Hawkins at Nazareth High School, Supt. White at Dimmitt High School and Supt. Averitt at Hart High School have been designated as the hearing officials for their school systems.

The policy also provides that there will be no identification or discrimination against any student unable to pay the full price of a lunch.

A complete copy of the policy is on file in each school and in the offices of the superintendents of Nazareth, Dimmitt and Hart schools, where it may be reviewed by any interested person.

**Johnston's plane wins top trophy**

The "Spirit of Pueblo," classic Vultee V-1A plane rebuilt by Harold Johnston, formerly of Dimmitt, won the grand championship over 807 other antique planes at the Kokosh, Wis., Air Show last week.

THE BIG single-engine cabin plane, originally owned by William Randolph Hearst, competed against antique planes from throughout the US, Canada and other countries in the big Wisconsin air show.

Johnston, the son of Mrs. Pearl Mae Johnston of Dimmitt, completed his two-year rebuilding project on the plane this year in his auto repair shop in Pueblo, Colo. The classic old luxury plane drew a crowd here recently when Johnston landed it at Dimmitt Airport en route home from Killeen, and treated relatives and friends here to short rides over the city.

Johnston reported that he flew the 490 miles from Pueblo to Kokosh in four hours against a headwind.

Is your child's study area ready?

Eyestrain can be reduced if the student has a good study lamp. A well-chosen lamp can combat glare, extreme contrast, shadows and inadequate lighting.

The Better Light Better Sight Bureau says increased wattage merely multiplies the problems of glare, shadows and contrast.

a certification tag which means the lamp has passed rigid tests and then been rechecked locally.

Suggestions for better lighting on the study desk include: 1. Have a flat work surface about 24 inches deep and 36 inches wide.

2. Put the desk against a light wall—never face a window.

3. Use a straight-back armless chair.

4. Choose a light-hue, non-glossy top—it reduces glare and contrast. A large ink blotter can do this if the desk top is dark.

Be sure to leave on the room light. This balances the lighting in the room and reduces contrasts.
