## Senate Group Would Give OPA Year

If seems that Pass The Biscuits Pappy O'Daniel really started something in Texas politics when he launched his hand-wagon campaign for governor of Texas.

In every race, some candidate has cooked up some spectacular way of attracting attention and according to Gordon K. Shearer, United Press staff correspondent at Austin, "Texas is headed pell mell for another spectacular governor's race."

Here's the way Shearer has described it:  
"Candidate Jerry Sadler has announced a tour with players and singers from the 'Grand Old Opry' troupe; Candidate Bradford Jester already has had Texas' first Hollywood—John Pales—sing at his campaign opening, and candidate Casp March is calling his crowds with a cowhorn.

But that doesn't exhaust the possibilities—not by a long shot. In a pinch, Gr. Homer Price Rainey can pep up his contemplated campaign for governor by doing some volunteer pitching at baseball games. He used to hurl them for Galveston in the Texas league and, which might be useful in politics, he could throw a mean curve.

When Gov. C. R. Stevenson steps into the race, as he now seems headed to do after first refusing, he might put on a movie. That would require no training, for the lanky man who today is governor opened the first movie in his home town of Junction. He worked at a bank daytimes and turned the crank in his picture show at nights.

"I got so tired of turning that crank, I have never been a movie fan," he admitted recently.  
Governor Stevenson's scarce attendance at movies as a spectator probably explains why he experienced one of his most embarrassing moments at a Cattleman's Convention in Fort Worth a few years ago.

Stevenson was seated in a box at the horse show which is a part of the convention attractions. A group came into the box. Among them was a beautiful woman who was seated next to the governor and introduced as "Miss Lamour."  
Governor Stevenson bowed. As the show progressed, courtesy called for some attempt at conversation.

"Are you from Fort Worth?" inquired the Governor.  
"No, Hollywood," was the reply, with some apparent surprise at the question.  
The situation was not improved a bit when the governor asked if she were in pictures.

When the Texas governor was turning the crank at Junction, the day of Dorothy and the sarong had not arrived.  
Attorney General Grover Sellers, who is said to have the highest degree that East Texas way of coaxing votes, may be seen in a big hat and chape by the time he gets back from his first campaign tour. For he chose a trail through the cow country to El Paso and back for his initial trip.

Lt. Gov. John Lee Smith, still making "non-political" speeches, is coasting along on the wave of irritation caused by the country's strikes. His big problem is when the wave rest will be reached. If too soon, he may be caught in a backwash or undertow.

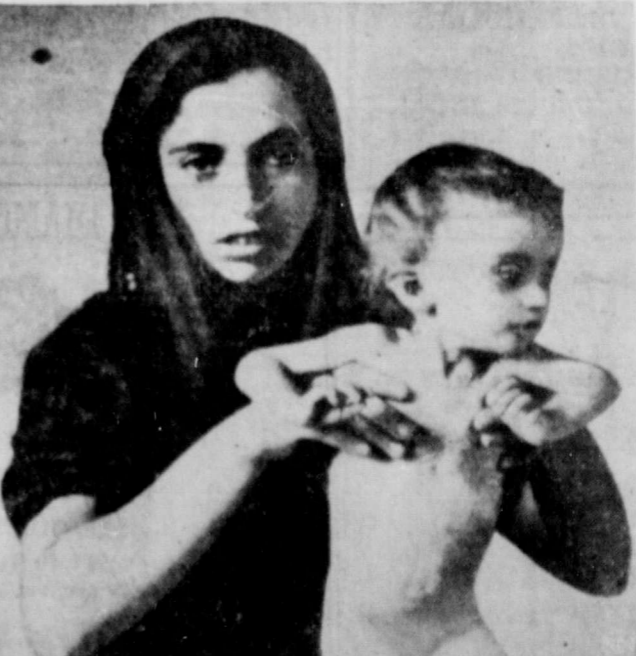
### Defeat Of Loan Would Lead To Economic War

### Railroad Fans Have Fun With Model Trains

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (UP)—Almost every kid at one time or another decides he's going to be a railroad engineer when he grows up.

Most folks lost that ambition when they grow older. But a group of Springfield residents who cling to the idea actually are running their own railroads these days.

The railroads—of the model type—are located in basements and attics of members of the Capital City Model Railroaders.

The club was organized in 1940 by 10 local business and professional men who wanted to be railroaders in their boyhood.

When they exhibit a complete model railroad at the Illinois state fair in 1946, they even drove a miniature spike into the road bed to celebrate its completion.

They also break down into other fields of specialty. For example there are some who simply build trains, and some who simply operate others stop at track work, and a few only design models.

Then there are the extremists who confine themselves to such things as passenger cars, or freight cars, or engines. But the orthodox ambition is to be an all-around model railroader proficient in all phases of the hobby.

One of the six was found guilty of the murder of a 19 year old boy—and a pair of boots led to conviction and execution. The father of the slain youth testified that his son and the defendant had left Texas together for Indian Territory and that some time before the departure, he gave his son a pair of boots. At the same time, the father bought himself a pair exactly like those he bought the boy. The heel of the son's left boot came off and he put it back on with three horse-shoe nails. The defendant was wearing in the courtroom a pair of boots just like those that the slain man's father had on. The left boot was removed from the prisoner's foot and in the heel were three horse-shoe nails. And so the pair of boots sent the man to the gallows.

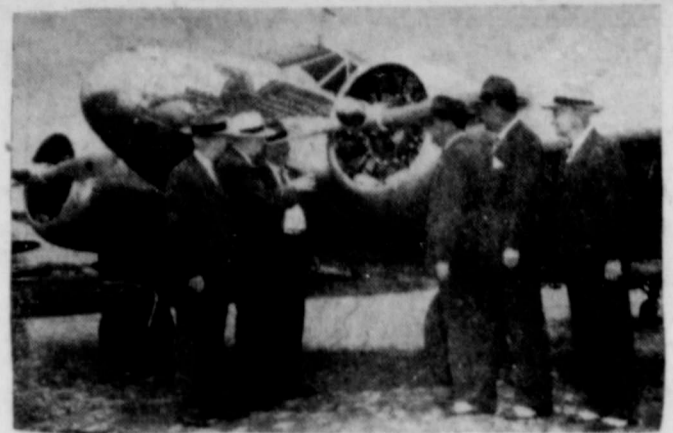

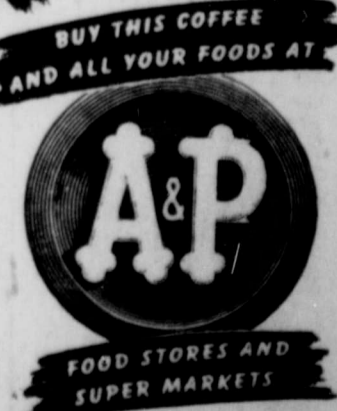

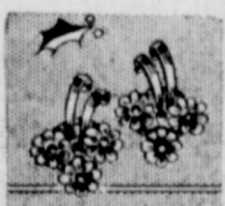
