RIGHTS AND DUTIES

Harold Stassen said something in a speech the other day about the need in this country for "an increased sense of duty to produce, to keep pace with the right to consume, whether through profits or wages, (and) of an increased sense of duty to work to parallel the right to

Probably that isn't the most popular tack to take in discusting present-day economics. It's old-fashioned talk, and some would call it reactionary. But it seems rather nice to hear semebody bring up again the all-but-forgotten relationship of rights to deties.

We 'lear a great deal today about the rights of free speech, free accembly, and free enterprise, the rights to work and bargain collectively and earn a decent wage. But it seems a long time since much has been said about the duty of doing what used to be called "an honest day's work" for that decent wage, or of turning out the best possible product for a fair and decent profit.

Maybe it is because times and the national economy have changed. There are proportionately fewer self-employed persons than in grandfather's or father's day. Consequently, there is less direct incentive and less opportunity to experience the joy of personal accomplishment in the course of earning the daily bread.

The incentives and joys are by no means absent today But there is an increasing number of workers swollowed up in big corporations, doing routine jobs of deadly sameness. Grievances, demonstrations, and strife may offer the only touches of drama in a life of occupational drabness.

Then, too, there are the workers' unions, which must produce results in order to survive and grow. And as the unions have grown strong they have emphasized an evergrowing list of workers' rights while soft-pedaling t h e parallel duties.

So we hear of unions disciplining members who, yielding to personal incentives, work too fast, produce too much, and thereby set an "exhausting" example for their fellows. We hear of requests for the same wages for 40 hours' work as were recently paid for 40 hours plus 1 more at extra pay

And maybe that wall nothe good. This country has come a long way from the 60-hour week, dingy workshops child labor, and starvation wages, and it can go farther But progress is smoothest in a friendly, reasonable atmos phere. And that is not present when duties are forgotten.

Mr. Stassen seems wise in asking that we pay a little more attention in our thinking to a reasonable balance be tween effort and compensation. Otherwise, there is dang er that a sizeable segment of a new generation might have to unlearn rather painfully the notion that society owes them a living which they feel no particular obligation to




