There is, of course, no radio precedent for this unprecedented event except that for almost every public spectacle that Loes on the air, from the world series to the Metropolitan Opera, the networks usually find somebody who is happy to lay a wad of fancy money on the line for the privilege of incerting a commercial plug before, during, and after.

Co why not Operation Crossroads? The actual program will be of short duration, but its Crossley and Hooper ratings should be terrific. The government probably could sell the broadcast rights fo renough to pay for half a destroyer, at least-provided there is any use for destroyers after the broadcast is iver.

For there is an element of surprise in Operation Crossroads which, for the prospective sponsor, should make the broadcasts rights double attractive. The dramatic, no less than the atomic, impact promises to be tremendous ..

No one, for example, knows whether the microphone nearest the explosion will be able to bring the big blowoff to the ears of the waiting wrld. It's a question whether sound waves will be able to outrun atomic disintegration to the waiting instrument.

No one knows whether the bomb will blow that ancient and honorable institution, the Navy right off the pages of history, or whether it will alter the conception of naval power and its uses to the point of being unrecognizable.

CHARLOTTE AMALIE, St. Thomas, Virgin Islands—(NEA)—
Hopes soar here these days in the land which Herbert Hoover
once called "America's Poorhouse." For the first time, the 26,000 inhabitants of the Virgin Islands—90 per cent of whom are colored—

have a Negro governor. He is Judge William H. Hastie, inaugurated to the office on the bandstand of Emancipation Park in the presence of Secretary of the Interior Julius A. Krug himself.

In the parade of automobiles through the nar-row streets of this old Danish town, at the cocktail party reception for 500 or more of the islands' leading citizens in Government House, at the banquet that night in Bluebeard's Castle overlooking the harbor, in demonstrations next day on St. Croix Island—nobody looked much at big Secretary Krug.

Edson All eyes were on the new Governor Hastle. What they saw was a lean six-footer of 42. He had been an honor man at Harvard Law School, dean of Howard University Law School, wartime adviser to Secretary Stimson on race relations, and the first Negro to be named a federal judge, serving from 1937 to 1939 here at Charlotte Amalie.

IT may be hard to tell about these things without arousing a lot of senseless prejudices, though that shouldn't be. Stories that, when President Truman nominated Hastie for the governorship, all the old white families prepared to move out, aren't so

American government of the Islands—under the Navy from 1917 to 1931, under the Interior Department since then—has, been nothing to brag about. If the islands haven't exactly been kicked around, they have been unduly neglected and exploited. All these simple, kindly people want now is jet a little better enderstanding in Washington, just a little bit better standard of living, just a half-way ecent break in their struggle for existence.

That's where Governor Hastie comes in. All the native people look

to him to pass a miracle and establish the millennium, quick. For that reason, the troubles that Governor Hastie will encounter will come more from his own people, who expect too much, than from the whites, who expect too little.

IN whatever degree he fails, critics will probably say. "What else could you hope for?", to whatever degree he succeeds, it may be said. "See what happens when Negroes are given a chance."
Governor Hastie has a few whites at the top to help him. Morris De Castro, who is government secretary, is one of these. Another is Walter Taylor, who has been commissioner of St. Croix for years. A third is Roy Gordon, president of the council, who came back to the islands in 1938 to form the Progressive Guide, the islands' one and only political party.

It is such a little government, but, oh, so important to the natives, who place such pathetic faith in it. If the great United States can't give these tiny isles a decent local, native democracy, what hope is there for the other islands which the Army and Navy want for bases.



## **Out Our Wav**

WASHINGTON, D. etroactive change in Navy honorable discharge qualifications will permit many discharged enlisted personnel now holding other types of discharge certificates to obtain honorable discharges, the Navy Department has announced.

"Proficiency in rating" requirements for honorable discharge have been reduced from 3.0 to 2.75. The reduction is retroactive to and including December 7 1941. (Under the Navy's system of grading, 4.0 represents 100 per cent; hence, the reduction is from a required mark of 75 per

cent to 68,75 per cent.)
This change affects any individual discharged from the Navy on or after December 7, 1941, whose proficiency rating is 2.75 or above, and who was not grant-ed an honorable discharge for the sole reason that this mark was below the former 3.0 standard. Discharged personnel in this

category may return their present certificates to the Board of Review, Discharges and Dismissals, Department, Washington 25, D. C., accompanied by written request for honorable discharge certificate. Their service records will be examined by the Board and each individual will be advised of the action taken.




