ILLUSION AND REALITY

The Navy has just completed tests of a ram jet engine called the "flying stovepipe" which prove, according to one engineer, that "the ram jet is a practical method of achieving high speed flight at high altitudes."

But what the engineer, the Navy and everyone else apparently forgot to mention was that the Nazis proved the "flying stovepipe" practically two years ago, when they used it to power the deadly V-1 weapon.

The recent Army Air Forces show at Wright Field unveiled some interesting new aircraft developments and promised others, such as a plane capable of supersonic speed.

But shortly afterward it was announced that a new American corporation had been licensed to build British jet propulsion and turbine aircraft engines in this country. Since our military planes, it may be assumed that they feel capable of competing with American industry for commercial jet-engine customers right in the Americans' own back yard.

These two examples tend to dispel the prevalent impression among Americans that our country leads in all phases of aviation development, as it actually does in the transport field. Obviously, that impression is not accurate, as the aviation subcommittee of the Mead National Defense Committee pointed out in a recent report.

But the Mead subcommittee finds, based on long and thorough inquiry, did not attract much attention. The report said substantially what a half-dozen other exhaustive surveys have said in the past year:

We lack a "clear and farsighted national policy in aircraft research and development."

We lack adequate facilities for that research and development.

The British government is "energetically supporting" research, and its flyers hold the world speed record for jet-propelled airplanes.

Russia has an extensive aviation research program. These things are not news to the Army and Navy or to the aircraft industry. They shouldn't be to the rest of us. Yet, though the story has been told so often that its beginning to sound like a broken record, neither the requested policy for facilities nor funds are yet at hand.

The Mead report states again the familiar fact that "actual and projected improvements in aircraft and missiles threaten to dissipate our historic natural defense." For the sake of our national safety until peace is secure, a way should be found to impress Congress and the country with what we DON'T have in the way of newest-type air power.

WASHINGTON COLUMN

WASHINGTON, D. C.—(NEA)—A new probe into the growth of business monopolies in the United States is scheduled to get underway within a month before a special House subcommittee on small business. But if this investigation doesn't do more for small business than the numerous wartime efforts in this direction did, it might as well fold before it gets going.

Of all the sacred issues thought up by Congress and the economic planners, this aid to small business was the most abused. Not that the need for finding small business did not exist. It was just that nobody came up with even a half-way right answer on what to do about it.

The excuse for this newest congressional investigation is that during the war the concentration of economic power in the hands of a few firms increased alarmingly. Of course it did. Half a million filling stations and similar small businesses had to shut up shop because they couldn't find anything to sell. At the same time, a lot of big businesses got bigger because it was impossible to build 75,000 airplanes a year out behind anybody's barn.

But the war is over now. Most of the big war industries aren't doing as big a business as they were doing a year ago. Plenty of war-suspended and new small businesses have opened their doors.

On this same subject, the Senate Small Business Committee has just issued a new report on "Economic Concentration and World War II." It was prepared under the direction of John Blair and the staff of the now defunct Smaller War Plants Corporation.

To get the measure of concentration, Dr. Blair summarizes the reports of the 67 U. S. corporations which have assets of over \$100,000,000 each. He finds that from June, 1939, to June, 1945, the total assets of these corporations were more than doubled—increasing from six to 44 billion dollars.

A trend towards more mergers and greater concentration of management is noted. One-product and one-line companies are reaching out for diversification and new markets. In 1945 there were 135 major mergers recorded. In 1944 it was 207, and in 1945 it was 295.

The chairman of the House subcommittee which will investigate today's economic concentration is Estes Kefauver of Tennessee. The chairman is particularly important in this probe because he also happens to be the author of a particularly drastic anti-monopoly bill now before Congress.

What the Kefauver bill proposes is that big-business mergers which concentrate more than 5 per cent of the total sales in any field be made subject to governmental review.

The principal aim of the bill is to plug a loophole in the Clayton anti-trust law. The law now permits one corporation to buy the assets of another, although it does not permit one company to buy the capital stock of another if the effect is to lessen competition or create monopoly within an industry. Kefauver would stop that.

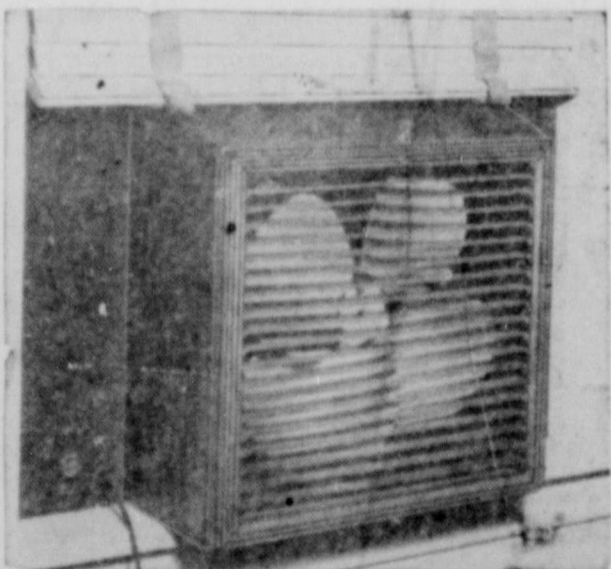

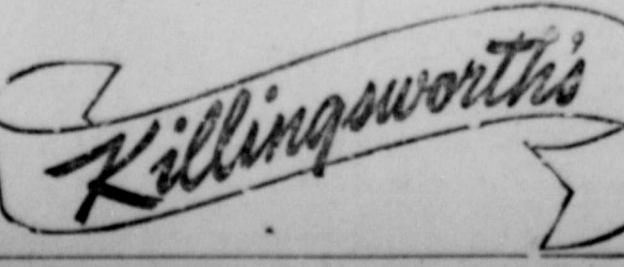

DUAL ZONES DIVIDE KOREA INTO 2 NATIONS

SEOUL (UP)—Koreans emerging from Northern Korea to the American zone have indicated that for all practical purposes Korea has now been divided into two nations, with two sets of governmental, political and economic practices.

The American occupation zone is ruled through United States Military Government, headed by Maj. Gen. Archer L. Lerch. This government was established in September, 1945, shortly after the American occupation forces landed in Korea. Lt. Gen. John R. Hodge, commander of United States forces in Korea, has said that the American plan calls for transfer of as many administrative and executive powers to Koreans as possible, as soon as they prove their ability to take them on.

This ability seems to have been proven rather well in the past few months. In an interview with United Press Lerch said he believed the Koreans were capable of taking over nearly all functions of government right now. Later he

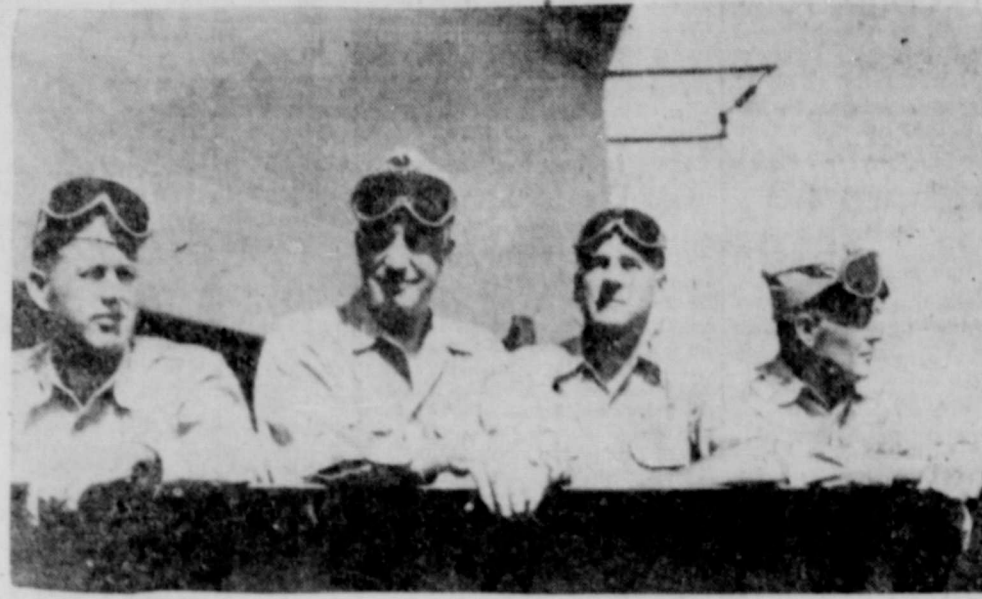
said he believed Koreans were ready for self-government and hoped they realized this soon.

Latest announcements from Military Government have indicated that this transfer of actual governmental functions is actually taking place, and rapidly. For several months there have been two directors in every bureau of the National Government, and two officials in many other important posts as well. One of these was an American officer. The other is a Korean. Now, in many of the bureaus, the Americans are acting in a purely advisory capacity, while the Korean administrators are doing all the actual work.

Gen. Hodge explained American aims in Korea early this year. He compared the Korean government to a pyramid. The Americans said, are attempting to build that pyramid from the bottom, laying a firm foundation in civil service administration so that when the Provisional and later the independent government is formed, the top government heads can be placed on the pyramid without dislodging any of the stones.

In line with Hodge's policy, Military Government has inaugurated a civil service for Korean administrative jobs. An ordinance recently was issued calling for all government employees to pass the required civil service examinations and completely eliminating the old Japanese system of appointments through the Japanese throne. Korea's civil service was organized along lines of the United States civil service and actual or-

ganization was done by American civil service heads. All jobs have been placed on a merit basis. Incumbents can keep their jobs if they can pass the examination or if their length of service and capabilities satisfy higher officials.

In the North the Soviets have an altogether different system of government. When they occupied North Korea there were existing People's Committees, organized to

take over administration of the country after the Japanese defeat. These were also existent and functioning in the American occupation zone. While the Americans declared that Military Government was the only governing body which would be recognized, the Soviets took over and made use of these committees. In many cases, according to Koreans, they replaced leaders and administrative heads, but they kept the skeleton organization intact.

This has resulted in a situation where the Soviets can say that North Korea is governed by an Interim People's Committee, while the Americans can only claim that they are building the foundation for a permanent government. The Northern Government has as its seat the city of Pyongyang, second largest in Korea and industrial capital of the country. The American government is located in Seoul, traditional capital of Korea, and American officials have taken over the National Government, while the Soviets have

taken over only government of the provinces in the North.

Communist leaders, both here and in the North, have made great capital of the supposedly "people's" government. Actually this government is hand-picked, and Koreans say that members of the Communist party have all the important posts, while anti-Communists are not allowed in administrative posts at all.

Politically the two zones run on almost opposite lines. The Americans have allowed all parties, from Communists to reactionaries to anarchists, to function unmolested. The Soviets, through the Communist-controlled peoples committee, have discouraged any but the Communist party. At present in the American zone there are 15 registered parties, five of them in the Soviet zone. In the Soviet zone the only known groups are the Communists, leftist People's Party, and Democratic party, which has moved headquarters to Seoul because "political and social changes since January have hindered activities

in North Korea."

In the economic sphere as well the two zones are different. The American forces took over existing banks and currency, the Soviet's looted banks, according to Koreans, and issued their own occupation currency. In the American zone, political parties favor land reform with land being given to the small farmers. In the Soviet zone the Communist groups want land confiscated and given to the farmers.

Can't Find Home For Fire Dept.

CLEVELAND, O. (UP)—The suburban Brooklyn Village council faces a king-size problem in trying to find a place to move the fire department.

The city has been denied permission by the Civilian Production Administration to build a \$31,000 fire department garage though faced with eviction from the garage it now rents.

"We simply must have a place to keep the fire engine," Fire Chief Walter Zempke said. "Fred Cook bought the house and garage we're renting now and he's going to live in the house and use the garage."

Council Clerk John M. Coyne said that fire insurance rates in the community of 6,000 persons might be doubled if it is necessary to park the fire engine outside the village.

"There just isn't a garage for rent in the village," Coyne said.
