#### NONE TOO SOON

Resumption of drafting for the armed forces comes none too soon. Conscriptnion never should have been suspended It will take a long time to repair the damage done by the summer vacation decreed by a short-sighted Congress.

Too rapid demobilization, coupled with dilatory replacement, already have weakened all three of our fighting services to a degree that, in these unsettled days, is very disturbing. We have weakened ourselves so much that we have sadly decreased our effectivness as a force for lasting world peace.

A year ago we had the most powerful army in the world with the possible exception of Russia's, well-organized, well-trained, well-armed Today we have an emaciated skeleton. It would take months, if indeed a year would suffice, to make the remains into an effective fighting force

Even now we have the most powerful navy, in ships and weapons, that the world ever has known. But it is manned by bell-bottomed landlubbers who, in frightful numbers, don't know fore from aft or port from starboard, and TROY, N.Y. (UP) - Some farm they can gather in another cropwhose morale is very low.

We have more and better fighters and bombers than any other nation could throw into the air. Yet we can't even operate an efficient peacetime military transport service because we lack men to keep those few planes in saf flying condition.

Finally, it announced that the Corps of Engineers had let contracts for seven new veterans' hospitals, at a cost of 38 million dollars.


