

U.S. VETERANS TREK TO ARCTIC FOR TEST FRIGID

SAN FRANCISCO (UP) — A group of 1,700 soldiers will get a chance to test the ultimate in rigorous climate this winter.

Many of them have slogged through the mud of Italy, sweated in the heat of South Pacific jungles or choked in the dust of Africa. They now will be part of the army's Operation Frigid—six months in the Arctic.

GI's in the operation, most of them regular army and combat veterans, will serve as guinea pigs in an experiment designed to discover how good American soldiers and equipment are in sub-zero temperatures.

Experiments will be made to determine what happens to a soldier double-timing (running) at 30 degrees below zero; standing more than two hours in freezing weather; marching more than eight hours in 40 below weather; riding in an open vehicle more than two hours with the mercury down near the bottom.

Vehicles, too, will be tested to the limit in the Arctic weather. Three new-type helicopters were part of the equipment carried by the task force when it left San Francisco port of embarkation for its jumping-off base at Anchorage, Alaska.

Other equipment to be tried out in the wintry terrain deep in Alaska include heavy and medium tanks, self-propelled guns, recoilless weapons, rifles and machine guns, supply trucks with conventional wheels, crawler-type tractors, trailers with crawler heads, "weasels" and "snowmobiles."

When the men boarded the transport Sea Star, each GI carried with him five barracks bags full of clothing and personal equipment—enough to make war-time seletees, who had only two huffy bags of clothing to contend with, shudder.

Each man carried 216 separate items, including polaroid goggles; sunburn preventive cream; anti-chap lipstick; several parkas, felt socks; various types of footgear, including mountain ski boots with rubber cleated soles, service boots, Arctic boots, overshoes, mukluk boots and felt liners; gloves which allow freedom for trigger fingers, and fur-lined caps.

Commanding the operation which was planned by Army Ground Forces, is Col. Paul A. Reichle, York, Pa., a veteran of the airborne invasion of the Netherlands.

Under his command were picked men of the 82nd Airborne Division combat engineers, an anti-aircraft battery, a tank company from the Second Armored (Hell on Wheels) Division, a meteorological detachment to study Far North weather and a ballistics section to study the behavior of weapons in sub-zero temperatures.

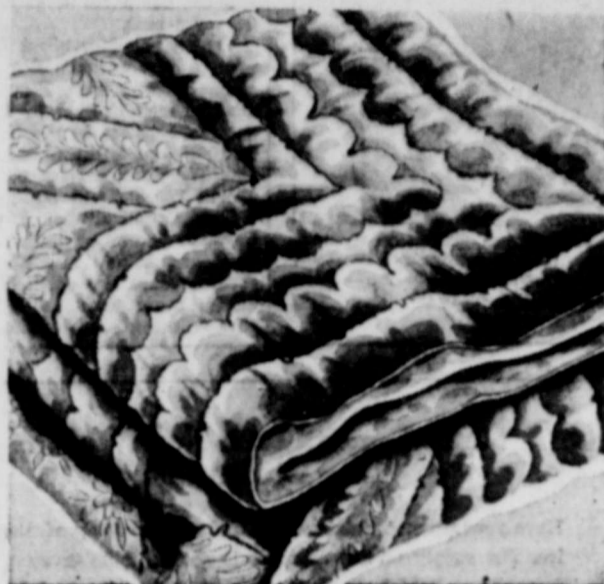
Chip Off The Old Block

Admiral Quits Pullman Fleet

CHICAGO (UP) — Bert E. Dewey, the "Admiral of the Pullman Fleet," has retired.

The 72-year-old car service superintendent, a veteran at moving troops in three wars, climaxed his 57-year career by juggling the Pullman fleet through World War II to supply beds for 37,000,000 troops.

The elderly "admiral" was kept in active service four and a half years past his normal retirement date to assist in the war job. He stepped down from his post Aug. 31 for a rest.

Dewey has supervised the movement of the nation's sleeping cars since he was named superintendent of car service in 1931. He got his baptism in moving troops in 1898 during the Spanish-American War, and carried on through World Wars I and II.

The "admiral" once provided beds for 30,000 people at a Shriner's convention in Washington several years ago when he rounded up more than 1,100 Pullman cars from an area on short notice to relieve the shortage of space.

Dewey is proud of his record in assembling presidential trains. He arranged them without mishap since the time of William McKinley.

onstrated the home uses and place of peanuts in the diet.

A REPORT on telephone progress in Texas

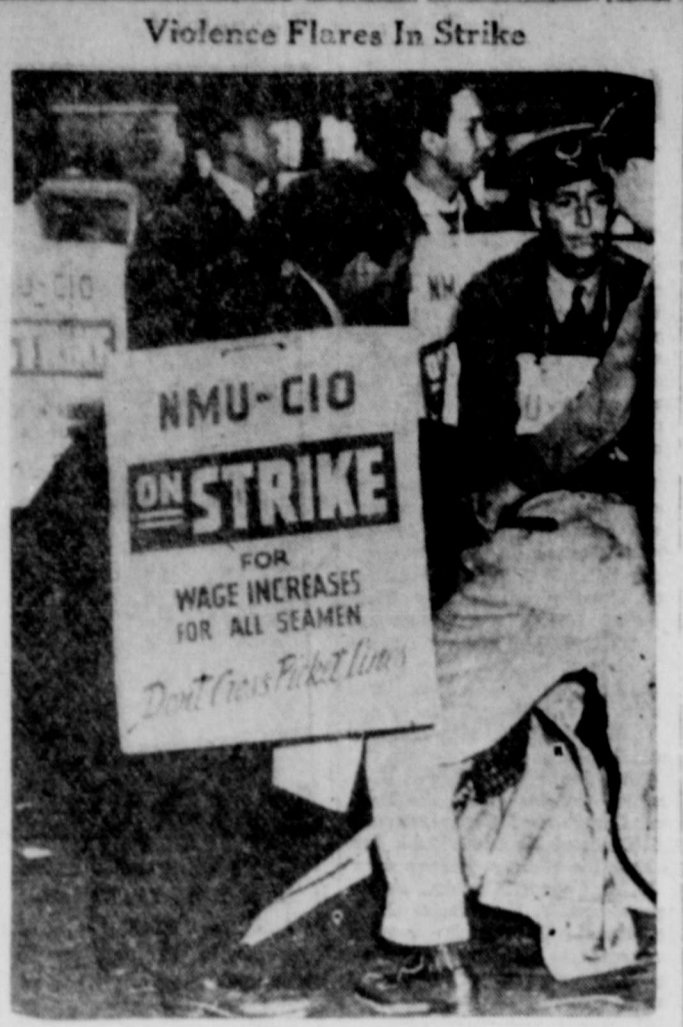

Daughter Calls Parents From Bremen, Germany

FORT WORTH, Tex., (UP) — Mr. and Mrs. Ed Marlatt and their daughter, Helen, talked to each other recently, although they are more than 5,000 miles apart.

It all happened one Sunday when the telephone jingled at the Marlatts' residence here.

"Hello, mom," came the voice from the other end. It was Helen, speaking from Bremen, Germany.

Helen Marlatt, who left Fort Worth to join the U. S. Army Graves Registration Department last March, talked about the things nearest her — the homefolks, church friends, and her impressions of post-war Germany.

"The average German," she said, "raises his own food and can produce more in a flower box than most people in this country do in a five-acre plot."

She added that American women with the GRD are accompanied by armed escorts when they venture out on the streets of Bremen.
