Vet Disability Pensions To Be Increased 20%

Twenty per cent increases in disability pensions or compensation payments to World War I and II veterans will be reflected in checks mailed Sept. 30 to 31,000 beneficiaries in North Texas, the Veterans Administration has announced.

The increase was voted by the 79th Congress effective Sept. 1. The VA Regional office in Dallas estimated the average veteran or dependent is receiving \$46 monthly and that the higher payment will raise his check to \$55.20.

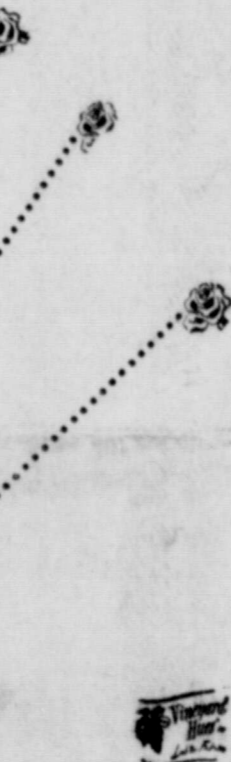

URGES GIRLS TO ENROLL IN NURSING CLASS

In a final appeal for student nurses for the state's 37 accredited schools of nursing, Miss Lucy Harris of Fort Worth, president of the Texas League of Nursing Education, Thursday urged girls between ages 17 and 25 years who might qualify to enroll at their nearest hospital before Fall classes close Oct. 1.

Miss Harris termed a recent intensive campaign for student nurses conducted by six statewide organizations as "extremely successful" for the brief period involved. But pointed out that openings still are available and asked that prospective students who could not enroll before the Oct. 1 deadline consider making application for new classes beginning in February.

Success of the campaign was attributed directly to the "splendid support of press and radio of Texas, ministers, physicians, hospitals, and civic organizations as well as certain business establishments which were extremely generous with advertising contributions."

The drive was launched after nearly one-fourth of the nation's hospital beds were closed by a shortage of nurses and after Texas enrollments of students had dropped from an annual average of 1,500 to 500. It was undertaken by the Texas League of Nursing Education in cooperation with the Texas Hospital Association, the State Medical Association, the Texas Graduate Nurses Association, the Texas State Board of Nurse Examiners, and the State Organization for Public Health Nursing.

Thomas won fourth place with his registered Palond China gilt in the Sears Cow-Sow-Hen County show in September, 1945. The prize for 4th place was one hundred baby chicks, or fifty turkey eggs or twenty five poult. Thomas chose one hundred white Leghorn chicks. When these chicks arrived on January 28, 1946, from the Demko Poultry Farm at Stephenville, there were one hundred chicks in the box and all were alive and healthy.

Through proper care, feeding and hard work, Thomas raised all of these chicks except two which were accidentally stepped on by a cow when they were twenty days old. None were lost due to disease.

Twenty three of the cockerels and seventeen of the cull pullets were eaten at home and twenty five cockerels were sold. Thirty five of the best pullets have been kept for laying hens for one of his next years projects. This demonstration made Thomas a net profit of \$34.80 after all expenses were paid.

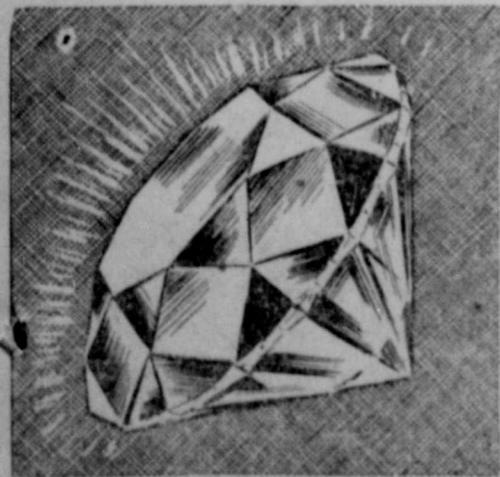
