### FCC BACKS PLEA FOR GROWTH OF FM RADIO

WASHINGTON (UP).— Frequency modulation, popularly known as FM, has been called the "open door" to a new era in radio. Boosters of FM are conducting a busy drive to see that it gets a break.

FM is merely a way of sending out sound over the air so that almost every trace of static is eliminated. Neither a heavy thunder shower nor a loud electric razor will interfere with an FM program. A station has to have special sending apparatus to broadcast the FM way and the household has to have a set built for FM reception.

With nearly 1,000 ordinary stations in operation, the air waves set aside for the standard type of broadcasting are crowded almost to the limit. There is still space for more low-powered stations, particularly if they are to broadcast only in the daytime.

For FM, however, the door is still wide open, except in a few large cities. Even in the cities, the FCC has withheld every fifth channel for veterans and other late comers to the field of broadcasting. These will be available for at least a year.

Although FM has not forged ahead at the rate predicted by many, those familiar with its peculiar problems see daylight ahead. Since reconversion began, it has been suggested that radio set manufacturers have tried to sell as many "old-fashioned" sets as possible before the public wakes up to the changes wrought by FM.

Some broadcasters have allegedly poached FM to retain their present profitable operation of standard stations.

Sen. Glen H. Taylor, D., Idaho, recently asked the Justice Department for a formal investigation to determine whether there is a conspiracy to impede FM's development.

To illustrate the situation in the FM retail trade, acting chairman Charles R. Denny told a sadly humorous story of how he and another commissioner went into a Washington shop and asked to see an FM set. The clerk told them, "We won't have those for years. You know FM is only in the experimental stage."

From those who realize that FM has actually "arrived" the commission has received pleas to do something to encourage the manufacture of FM receivers. Early this year the commission asked the leading producers how many radio receiving sets they expected

to produce in 1946. About 85 companies estimated that 22,000,000 sets would reach the market, this year, of which only 1,800,000 would receive FM programs.

Latest industry figures show 8,000,000 sets produced since the war. An industry source hazarded a "sheer guess" that something under 100,000 of these were wired for FM reception.

Attacking the problem from another angle, the FCC recently sought to speed up construction work on FM stations by questioning all those with permits on how the building was coming along. It urged broadcasters to employ whatever equipment is handy and get on the air as soon as possible. If work on a station lags unduly, the commission said it would consider canceling the permit.

All difficulties notwithstanding, some 340 FM stations are now being built. There are 40 in operation. In addition, the FCC has told 260 more applicants they can go ahead as soon as their program and engineering details have been approved. About 350 FM applications remain pending before the commission.

Sgt. Fuller is being replaced by M-Sgt. E. E. Elmore, who is a very capable army man of 17 years experience. Sgt. Fuller is confident that Sgt. Elmore will find the people in the Eastland recruiting district as cooperative as they were when he was stationed here.

### 91st Grand Jury No Bills Lane In Fatal Accident

The 91st district court grand jury in its final report last week to Judge Geo. L. Daynesport, reported 13 indictments—10 felonies and three misdemeanors—returned.

Among the felony indictments were assault with intent to murder charged against Homer Calloway, A. J. Maxwell, Jimmy Newcome, Arthur Lee Archer and Mervin Brandstetter, of Cisco and vicinity, all indicted in connection with the shooting of H. O. Woodward of Cisco at his home the night of August 22, last. All parties are in custody.

Two other felony indictments were against Jack McKee and Edward Mellor, California youths picked up here and indicted by the grand jury on charges of burglary. McKee and Mellor entered pleas of guilty and were sentenced to two years in the State penitentiary. Officers will deliver them to the penitentiary authorities this week.

The grand jury found no bill against Geo. L. Lane, charged by complaint with negligent homicide in connection with the accidental death of Miss Hazel Coats of Cisco on Highway 80 between Eastland and Cisco on July 13.

### Hull's Condition Still Very Grave

WASHINGTON (UP).—The Navy reported today that former Secretary of State Cordell Hull spent a more restful night than usual, but that his condition was still grave.

A bulletin offered little encouragement as Hull fought a grim but apparently losing battle for his life at the nearby Bethesda, Md., Naval Hospital.

### Cargo Plane Converted Into Business

### EIGHT DEAD IN GASOLINE PLANT BLAST

MARCUS HOOK, Pa. (UP).—The death toll rose to eight today in the fire and explosions which swept through part of the Sun Oil Company's \$13,000,000 cracking plant, the world's largest aviation gasoline refinery, last night.

Nearly 200 others were injured. Twenty fire companies from surrounding communities fought the blaze for four hours, before it was brought under control. Small fires still were burning this morning.

The first blast was touched off early last night when a packing blew out of an equalization pump, igniting alcoholic fumes, a company spokesman reported. The muffled explosion sent flames racing through the plants maze of huge tubes, steel framework and cylindrical metal towers. The flames leaped 150 feet in the air and were visible for miles, attracting hundreds of motorists who jammed highways leading to the plant, hampering the work of firemen and policemen.

### Lone Star Safety Director Speaks At Lion Meeting

A. W. Breeland of Dallas, safety director for the Lone Star Gas and Lone Star Producing Companies, was the guest speaker at the Lions Club meeting Thursday at noon at the Ghobson Hotel.

Breeland stressed the necessity of practicing safety in driving automobiles, quoting statistics to show the increase in accidents resulting from careless and drunk driving. Breeland was introduced by John Bates, superintendent of the Lone Star Producing Company, Ranger District.

### More Hashing Over Of The Meat Shortage

WASHINGTON (UP).—The Agriculture Department took a long look at the meat situation today and told housewives they may as well resign themselves to shortages well into next spring and summer.

Consumers also were warned to prepare for a new round of meat price increases no later than January—and again in April.

### PA. TEACHERS STRIKE FOR HIGHER WAGES

More than 682,500 persons were idle today as the result of labor disputes ranging from the nationwide shipping walkout to a strike of school teachers at Wilkes-Barre, Pa.

Both the teachers and the maritime strikers demanded higher pay. So did workers in most of the other strikes.

Of the 682,500 idle, only 112,850 were involved directly in walkouts. Most of the others were laid off as a result of the shipping strike and the Pittsburgh power tie-up.

The government, in an attempt to end the four-day maritime strike, called west coast shipowners to Washington to participate in negotiations.

The ranks of Pittsburgh power strikers were split by a "revolt" against the leadership of President George L. Mueller of the Independent Union of Power Workers.

### Would Remove Price Controls On Newsprint

WASHINGTON (UP).—A congressional committee sent President Truman a recommendation today urging "prompt" removal of OPA price controls on newsprint.

The recommendation was voted unanimously by the House Interstate Commerce subcommittee, investigating newsprint shortages. The action was taken after two days of hearings.

### OPA Grants More Higher Prices

WASHINGTON (UP).—OPA opened the way today for higher laundry and dry cleaning prices, jacked up the price of bedspreads and metal beds six per cent and removed all controls from household brooms.

In an order effective October 9, OPA authorized its field offices to raise ceilings on laundry-dry cleaning services were found necessary to cover rising costs. It did not indicate how large the increases might be.

### LEAVE ONLY U. S., SOVIET ZONES OPEN TO OUTCASTS

NUERNBERG, (UP).— Both the French and British commands today announced that they would not permit the trio of acquitted Nazis, Hjalmar Schacht, Hans Fritzsche and Franz Von Papen, to enter their zones of occupation.

The decision of the French and British left only the Russian and American zones as possible residence for the trio and it was doubted that they would desire to enter the Soviet zone.

The decision of the British and French authorities appeared to leave the problem of what is to become of the acquitted Nazis squarely on the doorstep of U. S. military authorities where it has been since their acquittal Tuesday.

Appeals of the convicted Nazis were sent to the Allied Control Council in Berlin today as the hangman was reported preparing to do his work, on Oct. 16 or before.

The French, American authorities said, refused to admit any of the trio to their zone. The British refusal applied specifically to Schacht and Fritzsche since Von Papen had not asked to enter their zone.

The three still were here in the Nuernberg jail uncertain as ever as to where they would go. German officials had not abandoned hope that they would be permitted to arrest them and try them under denazification procedure.

An official source said that "segregation" of the convicted prisoners had been carried out. This was taken to mean that those condemned to death have been separated from those who received prison terms.

### Mine Workers Start New Drive On Wage Contract

ATLANTIC CITY (UP).—Charging United Mine Workers started a new drive for higher wages today by adopting wage contract proposals which asked for increased pay but did not set a specific amount.

By a standing vote, the more than 2,500 delegates to the union's biennial convention approved a report of its wage scale committee setting forth contract proposals, including one for "increase in wages and reduction in hours," which were identical in form to those handed to the bituminous mine owners last March 12.

### Superfortress Off On Non-Stop Flight To Cairo

HICKAM FIELD, Hawaii (UP).—The Army Superfortress "Panusan Dreamboat" took off today on a proposed 10,000 mile non-stop flight over the North Pole to Cairo, Egypt.

The big B-29, weighing 74 tons and carrying 13,000 gallons of gasoline and a 10-man crew, roared off the 13,000-foot combined runways of Hickam Field and John Rodgers Airport at 5:53 a. m. Hawaii time.
