## HISTORY OF STAGE ON PARADE IN UNIQUE HARVARD MUSEUM

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (UP)—

The world's largest and finest collection on the history of the English speaking stage from opera and ballet to burlesque is crammed into three rooms at Harvard University, where the careers of Eddie Cantor and Jenny Lind rest side by side on a shelf.

Seventeenth century playbills, foolscap scrolls from Shakespearean tragedies and the programs of "Abie's Irish Rose" and "Tobacco Road" hold spots of equal prominence on the walls.

The history-laden collection literally includes millions of items and documents from the world of grease paint and footlights. There are sections dealing with the history of ballet, burlesque, vaudeville, opera, minstrelsy and the legitimate stage.

There are theatre tickets from the 1850s, prompt books and playbills from the earliest Gilbert and Sullivan operettas and from London's Drury Lane and Covent Garden Theatres. There are programs from the first New York theatre on Nassau Street and the first Boston stage, which was on Tremont Street.

Artists such as Cornelia Otis Skinner, who uses the museum in gathering references for her books rub elbows there with typical patrons from the tenth row, center aisle, whose sole ticket to a theatre is an occasional ticket.

The world's greatest collection of theatrical memories was started in 1903 when the famed actor, John Drew, presented his library of theatrical books and mementoes to Harvard.

Since then, widely known collectors such as Robert Gould Shaw have kept a steady flood of valuable material flowing in. Among the curios are eighteenth century notices soliciting the services of "respectable young men as actors" and a "RULES TO PERFORMERS" card recovered from the famous show boat "Princess" which requests the ladies of the cast "please not to go in bathing while there are strangers about."

There is an Elizabethan handbill apologizing for the absence of the leading lady and containing an intricate and complete diagnosis of the illness which prevented her performance.

INDIAN TRIBES TO PROTEST WHITE MAN'S RIVER DAM

ELEOWOODS, N. D. (U. P.) — The Arikaree, Gros Ventre and Mandan Indians aren't likely to go on the warpath — they claim they never have fought the white man. But they can, and may, go to court. They are serving notice that they will not stand for the biggest and key project in the Missouri River Basin development program — the construction of the Garrison dam, about 50 miles above Bismark, N. D. The Indians on the Fort Berthold reservation — now generally known as the Three Affiliated Tribes — say the treaty into which they entered with the United States at Ft. Laramie in 1851 is one Indian treaty which must not be abrogated again. First, Indians spokesman say, they will go to the United States Supreme Court. They say the treaty has been broken twice already and point to a judgment by the U. S. court of claims in their favor as proof.

The treaty gave the 3 tribes something over 12,500,000 acres of land. In 1870, they say, their land was reduced to less than 8,000,000 acres and in 1880 was slashed to less than 1,200,000 acres. They accepted a court of claims judgment on the previous slashes, but insist that the treaty still is binding. And they are determined that they will not be moved from their present and ancestral homes on the Missouri River bottoms and around Elbowoods for any dam.

The Garrison dam would inundate about 275,000 acres of land they have left — the only bottomland remaining to them. Congress has stipulated that the actual construction of the dam may not start until the Indians have agreed to relocation on land that is acceptable to them. The army engineers were given only until January 1, 1947, to find such suitable land. So far the Indians have rejected three informal suggestions, and they claim they will reject any other offers. They say they will not move even if comparable bottomland is found for them, because they regard the homes of their ancestors and their burying grounds as sacred.

River project is unfair to the Indians. They assert, for instance, that four proposed dams in the Dakotas are carefully located above the white communities of Yankton, Chamberlain, and Pierre, S. D., and Bismark, N.D.

To make their argument stronger, they point out that the height of the Garrison dam was reduced when it became apparent that part of Williston, N. D., would be endangered by a reservoir level 1,850 feet above sea level.

The Red Men say the 2,000-population Indian community on the Fort Berthold reservation is just as large as some of the white communities protected by the original plan.

The Indians even offer an alternative to the construction of the Garrison dam.

They say a smaller dam further upstream would be cheaper and would furnish most of the benefits claimed for the gigantic Garrison project. They offer the testimony of Daniel C. Walsler, a Washington, D. C., engineer, to back up their contention.

They point to their ancestors who aided, instead of fighting, the white man — to Tsa-Ca-Ca Wea who guided Lewis and Clark in their exploration of the West, and they ask, "Do we deserve to be driven from our homes?"

Mail requesting replacement parts for the once-famed Hudson apple parer still is received by Mrs. Charles Hudson, widow of a manufacturer who produced parers for more than 50 years.

At the peak of the paring business, Hudson sold about 50,000 machines annually. His successor carried on until 1938.

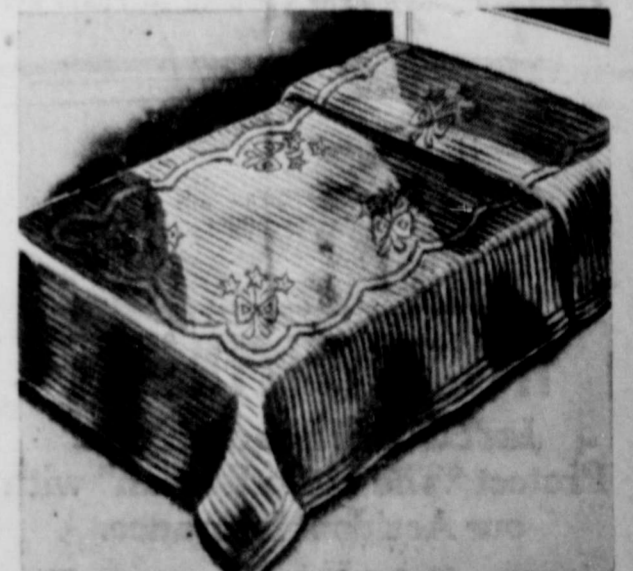

### Texas-Mexico Border Fence Is Suggested

AUSTIN, Tex. (UP)—A cattle-proof fence along the entire border between Texas and Mexico 1,207 miles, has been recommended by C. H. Cavens, Texas state auditor and efficiency expert.

Incidentally, the fence would be useful against bootleggers. The recommendation came because two Mexican bootleggers brought 150 quarts of liquor across the Rio Grande into Texas to sell. They put the liquor on

three horses. The horses turned out to be infested with cattle ticks.

Tick infestation spread over 765,810 acres of southwest Texas ranchland in four counties and resulted in quarantine for 24,950 head of livestock.

The official state report recommended an appropriation annually to the state's livestock sanitary commission to meet such situations until the fence is erected.

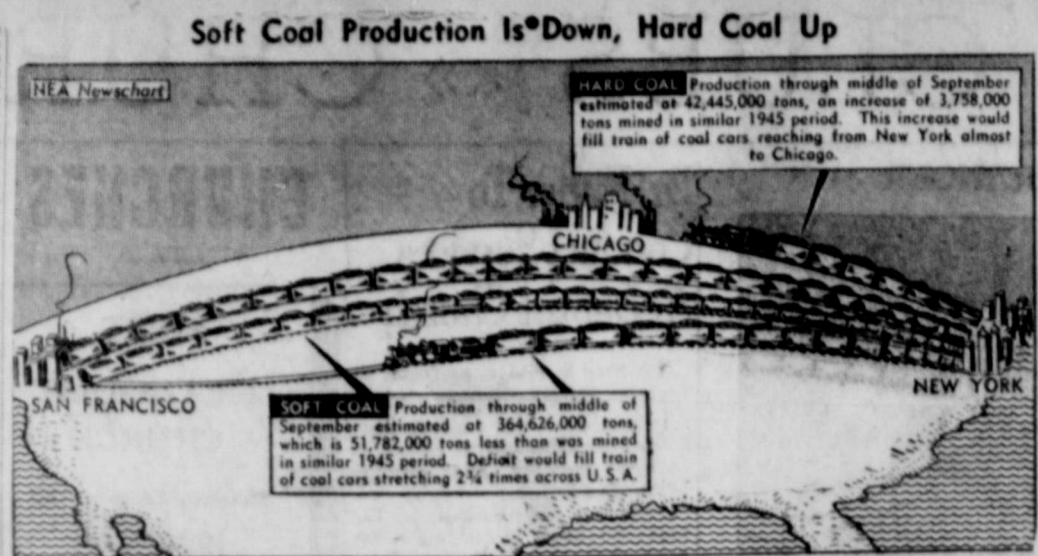

## Hidden Records Of Nazis List DP Cheaters

FRANKFURT, Germany, (UP)—The existence of a large, intact set of Nazi records which list every voluntary immigrant to Ger-

many from Poland, Latvia, Lithuania and Estonia from 1938 till 1945 has been disclosed by the Displaced Persons section of the American army.

The records formerly belonged to the Nazi EWZ (central immigrant's society). They are so carefully documented that even so-called Aryans were graded into five classifications, ranging from perfect to poor. Each prospective immigrant, whose family tree for several generations was painstakingly recorded, was graded as to his Aryanism.

Since the army started screening all displaced person camps in the American occupation zone, officials report that the EWZ records have accounted for more than 20 per cent of the 35,000 evictions from DP camps. After screening of DP's is completed, the EWZ files will be made available to all legitimate immigrant societies or allied agencies seeking war criminals.

It is understood here that the French government is particularly interested in the files, since they believe that many of the "Aryans" moved into Normandy during the German occupation are listed there.

One of the major ruses now encountered by the seven-man staff handling the files is that of Balts and Poles who voluntarily became German citizens during the heyday of the Nazis, and patriotically had their name on the EWZ card Germanized. Many of these persons now attempt to live in DP camps, claiming they were forcibly removed from their homelands.

They have by now changed their names back to the original Balt or Polish spelling. File experts said they must check each name spelling five different ways to insure that names carried on DP cards and the EWZ card are the same.

## CIVIL AIRPORTS MAY USE FIDO AGAINST FOGS

ARCATA, Cal. (UP)—Commercial airlines soon may be able to maintain 24-hour schedules and land planes in safety at fog-bound airports as the result of experiments carried out at the Landing Aids Experiment Station here.

Through continuous research at the cost of \$1,000,000 a year, the Navy has developed FIDO—the war-time method of burning away fog—into a comparatively inexpensive process which will end a loss of more than \$1,700,000 annually suffered by airlines through cancellation of flights because of "ceiling zero" visibility.

FIDO is not a new process. First developed by the British, it was

used in the later stages of the war in Europe to land bombers. But the cost was prohibitive, running approximately \$5,000 a plane. Here, however, through substitution of inexpensive fuel oil for high octane gasoline and use of a high-pressure system of burning, the cost of FIDO has been reduced to approximately \$15 a minute.

At this fog-bound field, which station officers claim is the foggiest in the United States, FIDO was demonstrated publicly recently.

A fog bank approximately 500 feet thick rolled in over the field. At a signal from Robert L. Champion, formerly navy commander who now heads the station, FIDO went into action.

Fuel pumped into atomizing nozzles under 1,500 pounds pressure was ignited electrically by remote control from the landing tower. Flames soared skyward around the field and the fog literally melted away.

Within a few minutes, stars were visible overhead and a plane piloted by Capt. Charles Grimes glided easily into a landing.

Champion said the goal of putting FIDO in nationwide use at commercial fields was "not far off." While he said the cost of operating FIDO still was too expensive for continuous commercial use, he expected greater reduction through less expensive fuels and changes in equipment.

The station here is jointly operated by United Air Lines, in cooperation with army, navy and civilian agencies.
