E. N. Dusenbery of the C & C Construction Co., Oklahoma, which is dismantling some buildings at the camp said:

"The WAA has been in Camp Barkeley for the past two weeks taking inventory, getting ready for the sale. The army owns the buildings, and that's part of the U. S. government."

The land on which the camp is situated belongs to a group of stockholders here.

During an open forum discussion, it was brought out that the buildings will be sold at the ceiling price of second-hand lumber—about \$40 a thousand feet—less the estimated cost of dismantling—about \$25 a thousand.

The telegram—dispatched following the meeting, by the steering committee: "Morgan Lewis, WAA, Dallas—West Central Texas as veterans in mass meeting in Abilene, Oct. 30 request WAA to make Camp Barkeley available for sale to veterans for housing beginning not earlier than Nov. 8 nor later than Nov. 15. Further request that a portion of Camp Barkeley be stockpiled by WAA for sale to veterans with limited finances who desire to buy small quantities of these materials for purpose of building or repairing their homes."

NHA Expoditer McCaules said that when WAA takes over the disposal of the surplus camp buildings, four consecutive periods of activity will take place:

- 1. An advertising period of 10 days.
2. Ten days during which cities, counties and other political subdivisions may buy exclusively for building veterans' homes.
3. Fifteen days in which individual veterans with IH priorities may purchase.
4. A period in which anybody can buy if he will certify that he is to sell the materials to holders of IH priorities.

Test Proves Men Smarter Than Women

ABILENE, Tex., (UP) — The age-old question about whether men or women are smartest was brought up at Hardin-Simmons university recently — the winners being the men, of course.

In intelligence tests taken by freshmen entrants, 12 of the highest 15 marks were made by men. Of the men, seven are veterans.

British Invent Terylene Fabric Claimed Superior To Nylon

By Edwin Roth United Press Staff Correspondent MANCHESTER, England —

(UP)—Terylene, a new synthetic textile fabric resembling nylon, but claimed to be both stronger and cheaper, will revolutionize the British textile industry and is expected to give employment to hundreds of thousands of workers, according to British newspaper.

This all-British discovery is to be developed jointly by the Calico Printers' Association and the Imperial Chemical industries, and the shares of both companies rose when the discovery was announced.

Up to now, the greatest secrecy has surrounded the development of what is said to be one of the greatest textile inventions for years.

The fibre was discovered by the Manchester Calico Printers' Association research team, headed by J. R. Winfield and Dr. E. T. Dickson. A substance called terephthalic acid is the basis of the discovery.

The chemists first knew that their work was successful when the new fiber in its early stages resisted a great deal of heat and proved its practical possibilities as a fabric, since it could be ironed.

"We had to perfect a colorless mobile liquid and the greatest difficulty was in achieving purity," said Dr. Dickson. "Finally, when a glass rod was dipped into it, the liquid streaming from it formed into a solid fiber as it cooled. You could take this and extend it five times to its original length."

Terylene is still in its experimental stages, but the scientists are satisfied that they have completed their work. The practical possibilities now will have to be explored by textile manufacturers, who are hoping eventually

to flood the world market with this British product.

Experts claim that terylene can be made up into many different kinds of yarns which can be woven and knitted into fabrics of great beauty and strength. They claim the material to be highly resistant to light and heat, mould and bacteria-proof and able to be washed, ironed and steam-pressed without damage.

A spokesman of the I.C.I. said that small quantities of the new fiber, which is fine and silky, have been produced in the company's spinning units.

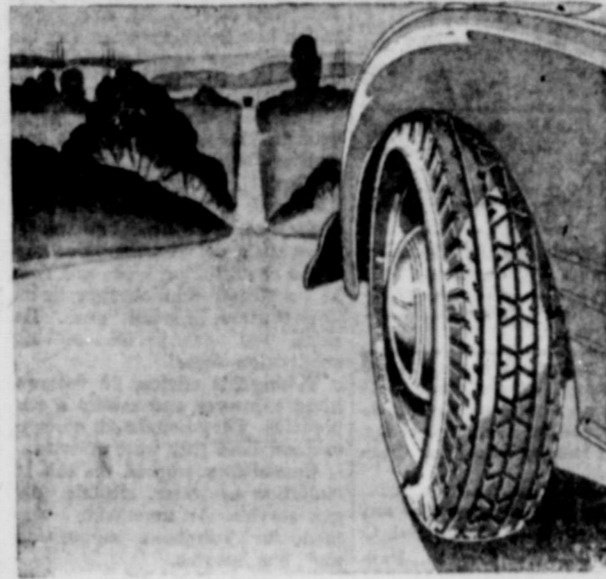

Town of Good Children Proves Boon To Vets

The former servicemen noticed the juvenile courthouse was empty. Inquiry disclosed that it hadn't been in use in three years. A petition to the county board of supervisors brought them the right to use the building. After necessary repairs and alterations, the veterans and their families moved in.

I. Q. Juke Box Tells How Smart You Are

CLEVELAND (U.P.)—Something new in juke box ideas has made its appearance here. It has the regulation nickle slot, but instead of music, the customer gets five questions flashed on a screen. It's up to him to answer

them and determine what the machine rates him in intelligence—dope, genius or something in between. The juke box times the customer, scores him and then shows the score on a big red indicator. The machine was adopted from the navy, which had used it to teach aircraft identification.

CANADA WANTS BRASS TACKS, HOT AIR APART

FLUSHING, N. Y. (U.P.)—Canada wants to separate the brass tacks from the hot air in the United Nations General Assembly and keep the delegates of 51 nations from bogging down every time the body meets. Canadian proposals for limiting debate, parceling out work to carefully selected committees and generally streamlining procedure of the world's largest international body will come up for discussion—unlimited—in the current Assembly session.

Delegates of some other countries, most of them weary veterans of the prolonged Paris peace conference, were behind most of the Canadian suggestions and had a few of their own to toss at the UN delegates. But there were others who resented any attempt to limit such hallowed diplomatic pastimes as irrelevant oratory and speech-making for the folks back home.

Therefore, it looks as though the Canadian proposals are in for a long and strong debate. "That's what always happens when someone suggests changing procedure," a member of the UN secretariat commented somewhat sadly. He said the UN staff was particularly anxious to avoid any subjects which might keep the delegates in session beyond Dec. 7.

Canada wants the Assembly to limit debate on certain items. Taking a leaf from the rule book of the United States Congress, the Canadians propose that diplomats who want to speak longer than the rules allow be permitted to extend their remarks in the Assembly's verbatim record.

L. S. St. Laurent, Canadian secretary of state for external affairs, proposed formally that the Canadian streamlining proposals be placed on the Assembly's calendar of business. He said the Assembly would be successfully only if top ranking diplomats took part in its sessions. And, he added, top-ranking diplomats won't participate if the meetings grind on endlessly and keep them away from home and their other tasks.

NTSC Expects 3,500 Exes For Big Homecoming

DENTON, Tex. (U.P.)—North Texas State College is pointing toward homecoming day when more than 3,500 "exes" are expected in the college's largest homecoming in its history.

The celebration, scheduled for Nov. 23, will include the NTSC East Texas State College football game, and a barbecue and stage show for former students. Two 15-piece orchestras, furnished by orchestra director Floyd Graham, will play at the men's and women's gymnasiums to accommodate an expected overflow. Special events have been planned by fraternities, sororities and campus organizations.

Anthropology Proposed As Aid To World Peace

DENVER, Col. (U.P.)—A study of anthropology has been prescribed by a Denver college professor as one of the best means of preparing the world citizenry for a lasting peace.

Dr. Edward P. Hall, of the Denver University department of anthropology, said, "If the leaders of all governing powers of the world were anthropologists, there would never be another war." He argued that anthropology would broaden understanding of social processes and enable political representatives and diplomats to talk to each other peacefully.

"Knowledge of anthropology decreases group tension because if people know each other and understand each other they can never hate each other," Dr. Hall explained.

Hardin-Simmons Getting World Wide Publicity

ABILENE, Tex. (U.P.)—Hardin-Simmons University is getting free world-wide publicity. A film short, taken on the university campus in 1942, was recently shown in Scotland, according to a letter received at H-S from a Scot.

The picture was incorporated into a feature on unusual occupations. \$600 Goes With Wind But He Got It Back

LYNCHBURG, Va. (U.P.)—Edward Goldstein is convinced of at least one thing about Lynchburg—its citizens are honest.

A quick gust of wind blew \$600 in bills from Goldstein's hand on a downtown street, and he watched helplessly as the bills fluttered in the breeze down a block-long stretch. To his surprise, a crowd of children who scurried after the money brought it all back but \$10. "I would have been satisfied with \$150," Goldstein said.

Workers Get Housing Break BERNE, Ind. (U.P.)—A Bern garment firm has bought an 11-room house to alleviate the housing shortage among employees. The firm plans to remodel the house into a dormitory for women employees.

Sneeze Lands Miss Back In Bonham Hospital

BONHAM, Tex. (U.P.)—A sneeze sent Ruth Harris to the hospital. It was not necessarily the violence of the sneeze but when it occurred—just after the rural girl's return home from a hospital where she had undergone a tonsilectomy. Bleeding resulted and a trip back to the hospital was necessary.

Mirrors And Bananas To Lure Monkeys

CHICAGO (U.P.)—Brookfield's 200 attendants are hoping mirrors, bananas and an "electric eye" will get their monkeys into winter quarters this year. Director Robert Bean has devised a trap which he believes will save a lot of vocabulary and footwork. It is a two-compartment box, furnished with mirrors and a banana. The monkeys, fascinated by either, will enter the box. An electric eye device will snap shut the entrance and open the door into a smaller compartment. Then the monkeys, minus outdoor freedom, but happily clutching a banana, will go into winter quarters.

112-Year Old Cherry Tree Has Bountiful Crop

MADISONVILLE, Ky. (U.P.)—Thomas H. Mitchell, farmer boasts of the most remarkable cherry tree in the United States. The tree, said to be 112 years old, is believed to be growing on an old Indian burial mound. The tree is 50 feet high, has a limb spread of 24 feet from trunk to tip, and still bears a bountiful crop annually. In one year Mitchell gathered and sold 4,000 gallons of cherries.

Boston's Hotcha Burlesque Hits Century Mark, Going Good

BOSTON (UP)—One hundred years ago tomorrow the Old Howard Theater opened its doors for a career that won it international renown as a burlesque house where there "is always something doing from 9 a. m. to 11 p. m."

It's the girls who get the billing at the Howard as they dance and strip in acts described as "uncontrolled, daring, different," or as "star-startling." The comedians are secondary, and last week, for instance, were billed only as "Stinky and Shorty."

The war brought increased fame to the Old Howard. Long known to Harvard students, the Howard drew thousands of soldiers and sailors from nearby Scollay Square to see its "30—gorgeous girls—30."

Despite its present status as a low-priced palace of chorines, the Howard once was host to grand opera. Also, some of the theater's great have trod its boards, including Edwin Forrest, Charlotte Cushman, Fannie Brice, Sophie Tucker, Bert Lahr, and John Wilkes Booth, assassin of Abraham Lincoln.

The Old Howard also was the scene of the first American performance of "Camille" and it was there that John L. Sullivan delighted the audience with mock-heros after winning the heavyweight championship of the world.

Maggie Cline drew as many cheers with her "Throw Him Down, McCluskey," as Gypsy Rose Lee and Ann Corio did by throwing down their clothes.

The theater was built on the site of a Millerite Temple where a group of fanatics gathered on the

roof in nightgowns waiting for a signal to ascend into heaven. The first theater burned within three months of its opening. The second—and present one—was built in 90 days and opened Oct. 13, 1846.

The 101st season in the present building opens Monday with a swivel-tipped star named Scarlet Kelley. As usual, The Watch and Ward Society will be checking up to see that "lewd exhibitions" don't take place.

THE GOOD ROADS AMENDMENT

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is the third in a series of four articles written by Representative L. R. Pearson for the purpose of explaining to the readers of the Times the four constitutional amendments which will be voted upon in the coming November elections.

House Joint Resolution No. 49 is the basis of this amendment. It will appear in Place 3 on the November 5th ballot. This proposed amendment, if adopted, would "freeze" all of the State Highway funds, and earmark them for road construction, and prevent their use for any other purpose.

Stated differently and succinctly, this amendment, if adopted, will freeze such funds for the purposes to which they are now devoted under existing law, and the Legislature could not divert same to any other use.

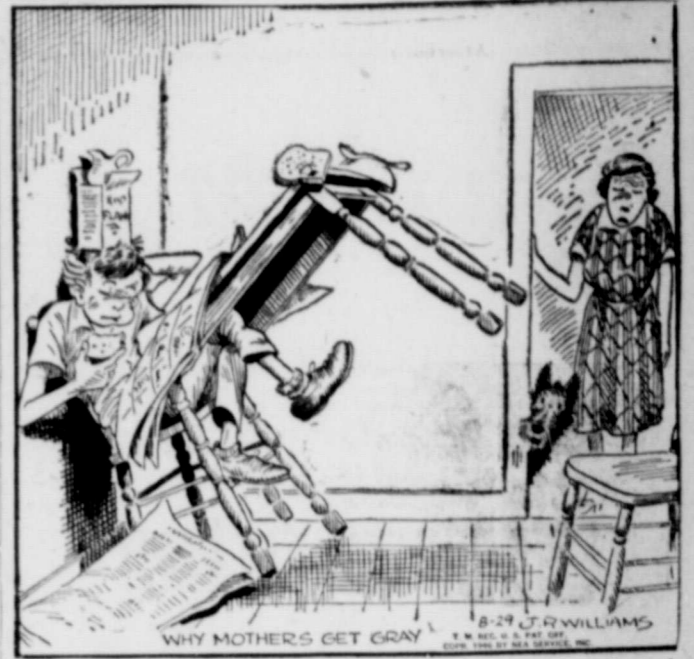

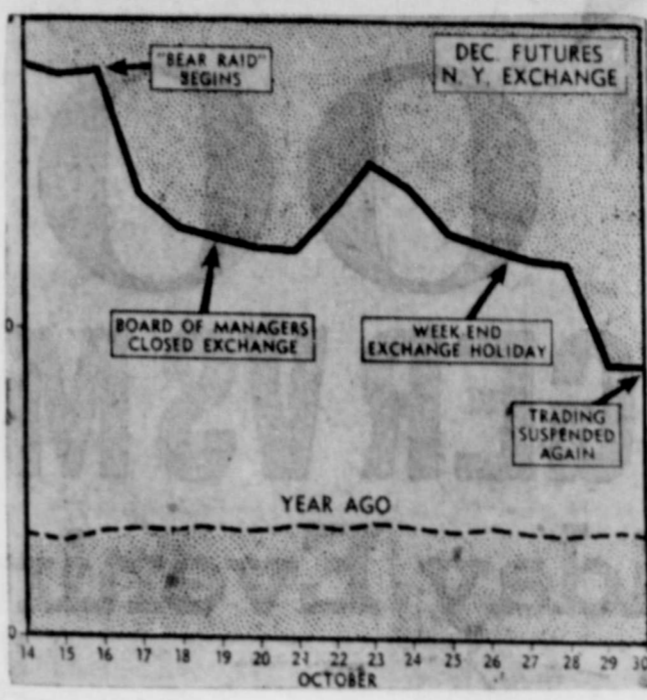
