Oil Notes

(Continued from page one)

Texas Pacific Coal & Oil Company have requested a special hearing on the location of the J. E. Douglass well number 2 in the Thos. Watson survey, Brownville Field, 4 1/4 miles SW of Eliasville

in Stephens County. This 4500' well is to be drilled to the Mississippi Lime and will be 330' from the East line, and 509' from the South line of this survey. It is also 660' South of their well number 1.

J. D. Sandefer, Jr., et al has changed the name and number of the G. P. Brawner No. 4 to the G. P. Brawner "B" lease well number 1 due to different mineral ownership. This well is in Section 25, Block 2, ET RR Survey, Eastland County, 10 miles NE of Rising Star. The log on record indicated that there were shows of oil at 1985, 1108, 1110, and a slight

increase at 1132 1/2. Application to shoot with 108 quarts of glycerin per foot in the sandstone formation from 1080' to 1132.5 (which is total depth) has also been received on this same well.

Total depth of the Woodley Petroleum Company's O'Connor number 1, in Section 53, Block 7, T&P Survey, Stephens County is 3392', and it potential 8 barrels in a 24 hour period with a gas-oil ratio of 1900 cubic feet per barrel of oil with a gravity of 39.6.

Wells plugged in Stephens County include the following: Texas Pacific Coal and Oil Company's Homer Lee, drilled in 1924 to a depth of 3288' in Block 5, Section 18 of the T&P survey was plugged on October 23, 1946.

Plugging of the Phillips Petroleum Company's Northwind number 1, located in Section 59, BAL Survey, Stephens County was completed October 31, 1946. Total depth of this oil well was 4607'.

L. R. Pearson of Ranger has completed the plugging of two of his wells—the H. D. Thomason in the S. H. Key Survey, Eastland County, near Carbon, and the A. S. Jackson well number 3 located in the Grigsby Survey, 4 miles South of Carbon. These wells were oil wells drilled in 1940 and 1941.

Plugging of a well drilled 6 miles west of Ranger in 1919 and 1920 has been completed. This is the G. M. Harris Brooks Heirs No. A-1 located in Blk. 4, Sec. 4, HT & C RR Survey, Eastland County. Total depth of this Boomtime well was 3535' and it has produced both gas and oil.

The G. M. Harris Brooks Heirs No. 1, located in the above mentioned block, survey, and section was also plugged. The depth of this well was 3590', and had produced from the Ranger sand.

The Cheate & Davies R. Work well number 1, in Section 476, SP RR Survey, Eastland County, 7 miles NW of Cisco has been plugged and abandoned. This well was drilled in April and May of this year to a depth of 4070 and completed as a dry hole. This well was originally drilled in 1930, and was deepened in the spring from 3903 to 4070.

Another dry hole which has recently been plugged is the L. D. Cain et al, D. S. Ray well number 2, in Sec. 5, Survey LCSL, Comanche County, 8 miles SE of Rising Star. Total depth of this well was 600'.

A hearing was to be held on November 9 to consider the application of the Phillips Petroleum Company to use its Southland well number 1, located in Section 57, BAL Survey, East Ixex Area, Stephens County, for the purpose of injecting salt water produced on offset leases to this well into the Ellenberger formation underlying the East Ixex Area of Stephens County.

Judge Offers School, Not Fines To Cure Traffic Law Breakers

LINCOLN, Neb. (UP)—Municipal Judge Edward C. Fisher, a believer in traffic education instead of "fine and forget," has pioneered an unusual method of dealing with violators.

When youngsters break traffic laws the magistrate gives them a choice of two punishments.

One is the customary fine. The other is a juvenile traffic school held twice monthly on Saturday mornings. The teen-ages (15 and under) view a safety moving picture, hear a lecture by a city official and write a 4,000 word essay on "Why I won't do it again."

Two-thirds of the youths elect the second means of paying their debt, with a little prompting from parents, who also must attend the Saturday sessions.

Fisher also gives each adult violator, except drunken and reckless drivers, the alternative of paying a fine or penance through voluntary license forfeiture, lecture attendance and essay writing.

Fisher is well known in safety circles. He recently completed a book, "People's Court," to be published next spring. The judge believes too many traffic courts are a "joke," regarded by the public "as a course of amusement or a racket to get their money."

First offenders are a myth to Fisher, "as drivers have broken the rules many times before being caught." To those who plead ignorance of traffic laws he says, "If that's an excuse, then everyone should abstain carefully from learning them."

"I never lose sight of the fact that most traffic violations are the result of thoughtlessness, not evil design," he said. "A firm, friendly attitude works better than harsh denunciation."

Cities To Tackle Labor Problems

CHICAGO (UP)—The Public Administration Clearing House reports municipal labor relations bureaus are being established in New York City and St. Louis, Mo., following creation of similar units in Toledo, O., and Louisville, Ky.

In New York, the division has been put on permanent status with a \$60,000 budget and three members. It will assist in handling relations between the city and its 150,000 employes as well as act in disputes in key industries af-

fecting public health and welfare. In St. Louis an 18-member industrial relations committee has been designated.

Louisville formed an 18-member labor mediation board a few months ago. Toledo also has 18 members on its board.
