WAA Rejects Bids For Pipelines

WASHINGTON — War Assets Administrator Robert M. Littlejohn revealed today he has rejected all bids for the "Big Inch" and "Little Inch" pipelines because they did not guarantee "a fair price" to the government.

The two pipelines, which run from Texas to the East Coast, were offered for sale last spring. Bids from 16 corporations were opened in August.

Littlejohn told a special house committee investigating surplus property disposal that none of the bids came near to a \$112,700,000 appraiser's estimate of the value of the pipelines.

He said the 16 bidders will be given an opportunity to submit "informal bids" on a new basis within two weeks.

ONE OUT OF FIVE VETS IN GI EDUCATION

James M. Brown, Sr., Contact Representative in charge of the Eastland, Texas, VA Contact Office, which has jurisdiction over the four-county area of Eastland, Shackelford, Callahan, and Stephens counties, said that he had been informed by Tom R. Rayburn, regional manager of the VA that one out of every five veterans living in North Texas is now enrolled in college, training on the job or engaged in cooperative agriculture under the G. I. Bill.

Heavy October registration of men and women entering training for the first time were reflected in totals which show 36,135 World War II veterans now receiving some educational benefit.

Based on best estimates, the VA says it has 181,583 veterans in the 51 counties of the region eligible for training.

The upward trend of veterans wanting schooling or job training is continuing. During October 4, 769 new applications for approval were received. The training and education division of the regional office pointed out that request

Last rites for Edward Joseph Miller, 68, of Brownwood, associate justice-elect of the 11th Court of Civil Appeals at Eastland, were conducted Tuesday afternoon at 4:00 o'clock at the First Baptist church in Brownwood. The court was closed for the services.

Judge Miller died in a Brownwood hospital Monday.

He was to have succeeded Courtney Gray, also of Brownwood, on the court at Eastland. Gray was appointed by Governor Stevenson last year to fill a vacancy in the court.

Miller was born in Sabine Parish, Louisiana, and had been a farmer, rancher and teacher as well as member of the bar. He attended Simmons College and attained a degree from Sam Houston State Teachers College. He served here as judge of 35th District Court for 12 years.

Active in Boy Scout work, Miller was president of the Comanche Trail Boy Scout Council, a member of the Odd Fellow lodge and a Baptist.

Survivors are his widow, the former Miss Willie Jenkins, whom he married in 1911, and a daughter, Mrs. Anna S. Beck, Brownwood.

Commons Vote Causes Attlee Grave Concern

LONDON — Heavy abstentions by Labor Party members during the Commons vote which endorsed the government's foreign policy, 358 to 0, caused grave concern today to Prime Minister Clement Attlee and his cabinet, according to Whitehall sources.

Although Commons defeated unanimously last night an amendment critical of government policy the fact remained that somewhere between 60 and 100 Labor members refrained from voting for their own leaders.

Combat Wounded Vets Eligible For Enlistment

All partially disabled combat wounded veterans who possess or are trained in critical skills may rejoin the Army. They will be required to pass all physical tests except those pertaining to their combat incurred injury. They must be unable to take care of themselves unaided and must not expect to lose time from duty for further hospitalization.

All enlistments will be three years regular army unassigned. Any pension or other government compensation will be suspended.

Enlistment will have to be accomplished before 31 January, 1947 to retain grade held at time of discharge.

If enlistment is on or after 1 February, 1947 such enlistment must be within twenty days of discharge in order to hold grade.

There are more than 100 numbers that will qualify disabled veterans to come in under the provisions of this law and such men are advised to call at the nearest recruiting office for full information.

Konev Replaces Shukov as Soviet Ground Chief

Marshal Ivan S. Konev has been appointed commander in chief of the Soviet army ground forces succeeding Marshal Georgi K. Zhukov, the British press a n d radio reported today.

Konev's assumption of the Soviet ground force command was first reported by the United Press last July but at that time there had been no official announcement within Russia that Shukov had been relieved and that Konev had succeeded him.

Eating Peas With Knife Made Easy Long Ago

CLEVELAND (UP) — Douglas Lyons has satisfied a long-time urge to eat peas with a knife.

Lyons, an executive of the Hotel Alton, discovered a 19th century pea knife during the hotel's silver inventory. He thought it was an elaborate knitting needle.

LANDLORDS TUMULT AFTER VET PROTEST

OKLAHOMA CITY — The National Apartment Owners Association convention was thrown into tumult today by reading of an American Veterans' Committee resolution protesting the growing landlords "revolt" and comparing it with a threatened coal strike.

At least a score of delegates leaped to their feet and sought to speak at once without recognition. One unidentified delegate made himself heard above the sudden hubbub.

"I guess you know that the AVC is Communistic."

The AVC resolution had charged that striking landlords had "no less public responsibility than coal miners who strike against the government." It warned also that property owners were inviting public resentment against themselves—"instead of the government"—by locking vacant units while many begged for places to live.

Says Japs Rose In Self Defense

TOKYO — The War Crimes trial today heard the defense assert that the pre war "freezing" of Japanese assets by the United States, Great Britain and the Netherlands constituted economic warfare.

The defense tried to obtain an admission from Joseph W. Ballentine, U. S. State Department adviser, that the so-called economic and military strangulation of Japan compelled the Japanese to rise in self defense.

Soviet Amible On One Item

NEW YORK — The Soviet Union gave a go-ahead signal for early completion of the satellite peace treaties today but flashed a bright red light against any direct or indirect tinkering with her veto power in the United Nations security council.

Losses from forest fires in the United States are estimated at \$60,000,000 to \$75,000,000 with errant smokers leading the list of those responsible.

The cranberry crop this fall is more than 800,000 barrels, close to a record.

AS PERIOD OF GRACE FOR LEWIS NEARS THE DEADLINE

WASHINGTON — Increasing numbers of United Mine Workers left their jobs today as the period of grace shrank in which John L. Lewis must decide whether to risk jail or call off a national soft coal shutdown scheduled for tomorrow night.

The Solid Fuels Administration reported shortly afternoon that 72,828 of the unions 400,000 soft coal miners were idle and 272 pits shut down. SFA estimated production losses yesterday and today at 655,487 tons. Normal daily production is about 2,200,000 tons.

At the rate in which members of the AFL's UMW were walking out ahead of the deadline, it was apparent that vital bituminous production will be at a dead stop by Thursday morning unless Lewis rules otherwise.

If he does not, if he chooses instead to stand pat on his announcement of last week that the UMW would consider its contract with the government terminated by midnight Wednesday, Lewis presumably will be in contempt of a court order that he call off the shutdown. He also will be subject to possible prosecution under the Smith-Connally act.

Mrs. Mary E. Carter, for 43 years a resident of Eastland and Eastland county, died at her home in Eastland Tuesday morning at 11:30 o'clock.

Funeral services were being arranged this afternoon.

Mrs. Carter was born in Arkansas on June 9, 1871. She was a member of the Morton Valley Missionary Baptist church. She made her home at 412 Walnut Street in Eastland.

Survivors are her husband, Z. I. Carter, three sons, Luther Carter, Vernon Carter, and J. C. Carter all of Eastland, and two daughters, Mrs. J. A. Hart of Ranger and Mrs. N. S. Vandiver of Dallas.

TAXES AND NATIONAL SAFETY

It was natural that prominent Republican members of Congress, when interviewed after their party's victory, should have tried to say something newsworthy and encouraging. But their first message contained perhaps more news than encouragement.

Mr. Taft and Mr. Kuntson, future chairmen of the Senate Finance and the House Ways and Means Committees and Mr. Martin, the next Speaker of the House, all said that there will be a 20 per cent cut in personal income taxes. The consummation of that promise is devoutly to be wished, if they are sure we can afford it.

Taxes will be the first item of business when the new Congress meets, Mr. Martin promises. But as yet he has no specific economies to match the specific tax-reduction. "We will save all that we can," he says.

The present vague approach to a definite tax-cut arouses the suspicion that the national defense budget is in for another paring.

Defense is the biggest single item of our national expenditure. It seems unlikely that it is an item that would be by-passed in reducing the government income by an estimated \$3,675,000,000.

It is common knowledge that we have outstripped our major war allies in disarmament. It is likewise a familiar fact that today we cannot talk big at a diplomatic conference with an inadequate physical force to back up our words.

Yet Russia today is estimated to have an active army of 5,000,000 men, considerably more than twice our force. And Russia's armament expenditures have been cut much less.

The United States does not want to be left with the atomic bomb as its only major defense. But, given another major cut in the military budget, we may find ourselves in that situation.

The country seems to have taken calmly the announcement of the promised tax-cut and the possibility of a reduced defense budget to achieve it. That leads to the fear that Congress may again permit a lapse into defenselessness.

Every taxpayer in the country would like to see taxes reduced with safety. It may be hoped, however, that the new Congress will not take advantage of that desire.

NEW YORK--(NEA)--That Glenn (Junior) Davis ranks with the greatest athletes ever developed by the United States Military Academy was further proved when the cadet football star splintered all records in the Academy's physical efficiency tests.

Halfback Davis tallied 926 1/2 points out of a possible 1000. No other cadet has ever come close to the 900-point level.

The Army agility tests included wall-climbing under full pack, push-ups, pull-ups, rope-scaling, weight-lifting, broad-jumping, fencing, boxing and bayonet drill. Davis proved conclusively he is one of those rare specimens--truly a remarkable all-around athlete.

In his first year with Army Davis won varsity letters in football, baseball and basketball--and could have scored also in track had he elected to try. At Donita (Calif.) high school he registered 9.8 in the 100-yard dash and appeared a certain Olympic sprinter until he explained he "just didn't like running without a football under my arm."

THOUGH it may be hard for some Army football opponents to believe, many observers insist Davis is even greater on a baseball field than on the gridiron.

In the spring of 1945, when the Brooklyn Dodgers trained at nearby Bear Mountain and their Montreal farm club was sent to West Point to engage Army's president branch Rickey went along for a usual look Davis promptly put on a show which almost tumbled the fabled Dodger boss out of the stands. On a double-steal Davis went from first base to third while a late score from third base. On his very next pitch, and while the fans still rumbled over the feat, center walked home under the

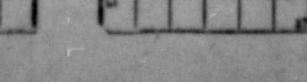
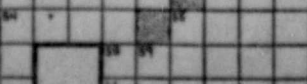
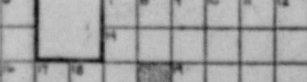
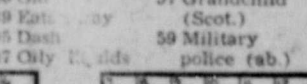
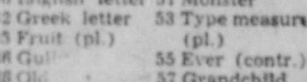
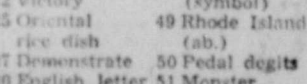
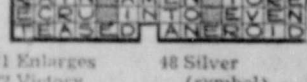
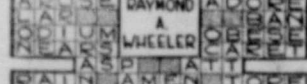
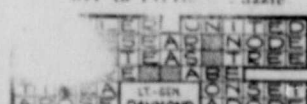

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HIROHITO PICTURED AS MEEK SAVIOR OF JAPAN

TOKYO (UP)—Fundamentally a pacifist and a "tame gentleman," Emperor Hirohito was too weak to check the aggression of Japanese fanatics. Strangely, however, it was the ruler's same meek character that led him to accept the Potsdam declaration and save Japan from total destruction.

That is the conclusion reached in a book just published. Junzo Togashi, a palace reporter for 30 years, in "His Majesty's Human Declaration," portrays Hirohito as a man of few strong convictions. His one outstanding resolve was never to function as a dictator. Hirohito was taught from boyhood to respect others' opinions, never to be rash, to be fair and trusting and eschew violent controversies.

The book is considered important because it comes from an experienced source and is the first unrestricted portrayal of the emperor since Hirohito, in the author's words, "voluntarily unlocked the gates of his sacred prison and came out to meet his people."

In the years between Hirohito's adolescence and Japan's defeat, Hirohito remained, unwilling and often to his own annoyance, a "living god." The palace circle drummed into him the theory that the emperor never should rule with a positive hand, according to the author.

It was this circle that led Japan into war and it was the emperor's "strange lot," Togashi says, that he was unable to find the courage to emerge as the only possible Japanese Strong Man who could have spared the nation from disaster.

Backward Boys Not So Dumb

LINCOLN, Neb. (UP)— The so-called large, backward boy who hovers in one grade for several years running may be brighter than many of the classmates who jibe at him.

That's what Dr. D. A. Worcester, director of the University of Nebraska educational psychology clinic, says. Ten years of experience in testing 6,000 children back his unusual viewpoint.

"Many children are labeled 'dull' in our public schools because of remediable defects," the psychologist declares. "Most common of these are speech, hearing and sight deficiencies and certain mental blocks."

Quite often, these defects show in the form of faulty reading, he says. Worcester recently found five distinct types of reading faults in tests at a small Nebraska school.

The causes were:

1. Sub-normal intelligence which made words meaningless.
2. Inability to recognize printed words used in a large conversational vocabulary.
3. Too rapid and too careless reading habit.
4. Absence of study habits because of too much help from an ambitious mother.
5. Serious speech defects retarding reading.

Shorter Hours Trend Noted In U. S. Cities

CHICAGO (UP) — Municipal employees in well over half of America's 933 cities over 10,000 population now have work weeks of less than 42 hours, the International City Managers Association reports.

A recent Dayton, O., ordinance puts all city employees on a five-day, 40-hour week, and St. Louis has established a minimum work week of 38 hours. Portland, Ore., however, recently voted against a proposed 40-hour week for most municipal workers.

Some cities are reducing the work week of firemen under pressure from organized fire-fighters. Philadelphia abandoned its two-platoon, 70-hour week organization and put firemen on a three platoon, 48-hour schedule. The change necessitated hiring 40 per cent more men.

Navy Chaplains Busy In War's One Last Year

CHICAGO (UP) — Navy chaplains conducted a total of 407,577 divine services during 1945, with 32,605,684 persons in attendance, according to the U. S. Navy Chaplains' Corps.

The corps said navy chaplains conducted 348,986 services aboard their own ships or at their own stations, and 58,591 services away from their stations. In addition, they conducted 42,186 services in civilian churches.

The attendance in 1944 totaled 37,062,428.

In addition to regular services in 1945, chaplains officiated at 12,501 marriages, and 14,951 funerals. They also performed 15,088 baptisms and accepted 13,818 servicemen and women into the church.
