U. S. DOUBTFUL OF TRIESTE AGREEMENTS

NEW YORK — The United States will watch direct negotiations between Italy and Yugoslavia with a skeptical eye and examine any agreements they reach on Trieste or their border more carefully, it was learned today.

American officials said their attitude toward direct Italo-Yugoslav negotiations was the same as expressed by Secretary of State James B. Byrnes a week ago when he did not discourage and at the same time expressed no display of enthusiasm when the subject first was raised by Yugoslavia.

Since then, these officials point out, the Russians and other members of the Big Four have reached almost complete agreement on plans for internationalizing Trieste. Just as it took unanimous Big Four agreement to reach such a stage, it also will take a unanimous decision to change any of the plans.

U.S. DEMANDS SHOWDOWN ON ARMY SIZES AND LOCATIONS

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y. — The United States demanded today in the United Nations that world powers publish the location and size of all their armed forces at home and abroad after the Soviets had agreed to reveal its troop dispositions outside Russia.

Sen. Tom Connally, D. Tex., answered an unusually conciliatory speech by Soviet Foreign Minister Vyacheslav M. Molotov with a table-thumping demand that Russia report fully on its "troops in active service throughout the world, wherever they're stationed, whether in Russia proper or in border states, or any place else on earth."

Connally squared off with Molotov at a meeting of the General Assembly's political and security committee.

The Soviet foreign minister proposed that the powers publish the location and strength of armed forces and air and naval bases in both friendly and former enemy territory. He said Russia and the United States should sponsor the suggestion jointly.

Molotov said the question of troops at home should be considered in the general problem of disarmament, which will come up in the same committee soon.

Survivors are her husband, Z. J. Carter of Eastland; three sons, Lester, Vernon and J. C., all of Eastland; two daughters, Mrs. J. A. Hart of Ralcer and Mrs. N. S. Vandiver of Dallas; and two sisters, Mrs. W. R. Matthews of Hereford and Mrs. T. F. Overstreet of Ardmore, Oklahoma. Pallbearers will be grandsons of the deceased.

Garrett, 72, who died Monday at his home in the Flatwoods community, six miles southeast of Eastland, were held at 3:30 p.m. Tuesday at the First Baptist church in Eastland. Rev. Fred H. Porter, pastor of the Eastland church and Rev. Seba Kirkpatrick, pastor of the Methodist church at Carbon, officiated. Interment was at Gorman.

Survivors include his wife, the former Miss Ella Williams whom he married on September 21, 1898, and the following children, brothers and sisters: Children—Clyde Garrett, Olden; Joe Vern Garrett, Gorman; Dorris Garrett, Pasadena, Texas; Mrs. Willie May Hendricks, Eastland; and Kenneth Garrett, Eastland. Virgil Harmon Garrett was born June 26, 1874, near Grapevine in Tarrant county, Texas, the son of W. V. and Sallie Garrett, who came to Texas from Mississippi. When he was two years old his parents moved to Eastland county settling at Jewell. They later moved to Gorman where his father served for many years as Justice of the Peace and as County Commissioner.

Converted early in life the deceased joined the Baptist church and was a member at Jewell when the church there was disbanded. At the time of his passing he was a member of the Baptist Church at Kokomo in Eastland county.

A resident of Eastland county for 70 years, Garrett witnessed this section develop from a pioneer country of a few scattered settlements to its present position as the home of some 30,000 people profitably engaged in various occupations. He was a farmer by occupation.

Materials For Vet Apartment Now Arriving

City officials stated this morning that the building which was secured from Camp Berkeley is now arriving and will be reconstructed as rapidly as possible.

The building will be placed on the lot at the corner of Elm and South Marston Street and will, when completed, be four apartments for rent to veterans.

The building is partially torn down at the camp and rebuilt here on the site. Plumbing and fixtures have already arrived.

The building was secured through the war surplus program and will be for rent to veterans and their families, only.

SS OFFICIAL TO BE HERE ON THURSDAY

A representative of the Abilene Social Security Administration office will be at the Ranger Retail Merchants Association office on Thursday, November 21, at 3:00 p.m., for the purpose of assisting with claims to be filed by survivors of World War II veterans who died after leaving the service. In all cases where a World War II veteran has died after discharge the nearest relative should call to discuss possible payments under the 1946 amendments to the Social Security Act. The representative will also be at the Retail Merchants Association in Breckenridge on Wednesday, November 20, at 2:30 p.m.

Under these amendments social security payments may be made even though the veteran died several years ago, and regardless of whether he had ever worked under social security. For these special payments to be made, however, the veteran must have died within three years after discharge; if the discharge was dishonorable the new law does not make the family eligible.

Families of veterans who have died under the above conditions should contact the Social Security Administration now even if they have previously checked on the social security record of the veteran. The law provides that retroactive payments to the date of death may be made if monthly payments are due; in order to receive these back payments, however, the family must file claim with the Social Security Administration not later than February 10, 1947. Where monthly benefits for a lump-sum payment have already been made because of the veteran's death it is possible that the new amendment may increase the amount of such payments.

All persons wishing to make application under this new law should call promptly at the time shown above.

GOVERNMENT EXPECTS LAST MINUTE ACT TO HALT STRIKE

WASHINGTON — As the zero hour drew nearer for a scheduled soft coal shutdown at midnight, government officials believed today that John L. Lewis will act before the deadline to prevent a mass walkout of 400,000 United Mine workers.

They based their belief on the fact that the UMW chieftain must do something soon to free himself of liability to contempt action. Contempt action is possible if he defies a federal court order that he calls off the threatened shutdown.

Some support to the viewpoint of government officials was seen in a report that Lewis was in a huddle with UMW attorneys to decide what to do. With nearly 120,000 miners already idle in premature walkouts, Lewis would have to act fast to keep them from being joined at midnight by the remaining 280,000.

Meanwhile, the government was planning its strategy for dealing with a national coal strike in the event Lewis stands pat on a contract termination order issued last week after an unsuccessful attempt to reopen wage-hour negotiations with the government.

The war department announced it was ready to send troops to the coal fields to protect any miners who may heed the government's request that they stay on the job. The government's action in obtaining a temporary restraining order against Lewis drew fire from a quarter normally unfriendly to the UMW president. In convention at Atlantic City, the Congress of Industrial Organizations, which Lewis founded and later left to return to the American Federation of Labor, adopted a resolution condemning the government.

WASHINGTON COLUMN

WASHINGTON, D. C.—(NEA)—How Tennessee's Senators Kenneth McKellar and Tom Stewart try to throw their weight around for the benefit of their particular friends, with apparent disregard for the Federal Administrative Procedures Act, is revealed by a couple of letters which have just come to light.

The affair goes back to 1940, when two free radio channels became available in the Nashville area, then served by three stations. Five applications were filed with FCC for allocation of the channels.

The war held up decision, and a sixth application was received in 1944. Hearings were held last December, and on Aug. 6 the commission published its proposed decision.

In brief, one channel was given to Murfreesboro, Tenn., about 30 miles from Nashville, because Murfreesboro had no local station. The second channel went to A. G. Beaman and T. F. Baker, Jr.

When the Tennessee senators learned about this, they promptly went to work.

McKellar was the first to swing into action, with a letter to Acting FCC Chairman Charles R. Denny which said, among other things: "It seems that your office takes pleasure in turning down our recommendations. Senator Stewart and I were together in all of these recommendations. Of course, you know all about Tennessee and we know nothing. Very frankly, Mr. Denny, I resent very much your action in the matter."

Four days later Senator Stewart chimed in, with a letter saying: "I would like for you and the other members of your commission to know that this is about the most contemptible deal I have ever had perpetrated on me since I have been in Washington. It was nothing more than an effort to embarrass my good friend and colleague, Senator McKellar, since the award you made was to a man who had assisted in the fight to defeat Senator McKellar in his campaign for re-nomination to the United States Senate. I suppose it will be your policy in the future to always penalize our friends."

It is generally agreed that the two senators had a perfect right to make their recommendations to the commission. But their subsequent protests are indefensible.

Last June, Congress passed the Federal Administration Procedures Act, which President Truman signed. The law provides, among other things, for the conduct of federal agency hearings by disinterested examiners, protected by civil service from political pressure.

So in spite of protests from the Tennessee senators, FCC went ahead with its proposal, making the award of the two frequencies on Oct. 9. It became final Oct. 20.

Says CIO Fights For Justice For Every Worker

Armed Soldiers Patrol Street After Explosion

GREENVILLE, S.C. — Armed soldiers today patrolled littered streets where 10 persons were killed and over 150 injured here last night when exploding propane gas demolished a block-long laundry and wrecked or damaged every building in the vicinity.

The troops from the Greenville Army Air Base were ordered to the scene to prevent looting from stores and houses that were shattered by the terrific blast.

British Offices In Jerusalem Blasted Today

JERUSALEM — A heavy explosion shattered the building occupied by the income tax and press censorship offices in Jerusalem this afternoon.

There was no immediate report on casualties.

The explosion occurred in the center of the so-called "British Fortress" area at mid-day—two circumstances which made the attack unprecedented.

New Democratic Chairman Sought

WASHINGTON — The Democratic National Committee was operating today without a chairman for all practical purposes and the question before President Truman was who should succeed 43-year-old Robert E. Hannegan in that job.

Mr. Truman may have to look for a new postmaster general, also. Announcement that Hannegan had been ordered to take a complete rest was accompanied by word from his associates that he was expected to resign the committee chairmanship shortly.

15 Arrested In Stuttgart Blasts

FRANKFURT — The Army announced today that 15 SS men and Hitler Youth had been arrested for the recent bombings in the Stuttgart area.

Army officials said an organized gang of 15 were seized at Stuttgart last night as they prepared for their fourth bombing of demoralization offices in recent weeks.

Snowstorm Halts Rescue Efforts

PARIS — A swirling snowstorm today hid a U. S. Army plane which had been lying helpless on a French Alpine plateau for more than 24 hours, posing a new threat to the safety of the 11 persons aboard, including a general and three generals wives.

Bicycle Santa Into Trouble

INDIANAPOLIS (UP) — It's some time until Christmas, but an Indianapolis youth has been playing Santa Claus anyway.

Because he felt sorry for penniless small boys, 22-year-old James Stoltz presented "a number of them" with stolen bicycles.

In all he said he stole about 17 bicycles over a three-month period. Police charged him with vagrancy.

EXPLAINS STEPS ON HOW TO ENTER VET HOSPITALS

For the benefit of the 200,000 World War II veterans living in North Texas who may want to get into a VA hospital now or at some future time, the Eastland Veterans Administration Contact Office answered these questions:

1. How application may be made;
- (2) How hospitalization can be arranged in an emergency;
- (3) What provision must be made for transportation expense, and
- (4) For what veterans is outpatient treatment furnished by the VA.

James M. Brown, Sr., Contact Representative said these are the rules governing hospitalization and treatment by VA physicians at its clinics:

Application for hospital treatment (VA Form P-10) is available at the Eastland contact office or from Mr. A. D. Modisett, Contact Representative and should be forwarded by the veteran or his closest relative to the nearest VA Regional Office.

In emergency cases, said Mr. Brown the contact representative or the private physician who does the examination on the P-10 form should call the chief medical officer of the Regional VA office who will arrange for hospitalization.

The VA now has hospitals in North Texas in McKinney and Dallas and Bonham. If found eligible and bed space is available, the veteran will be promptly notified. If admission cannot be authorized, the veteran will be informed and the reason stated.

Under certain conditions, emergency hospitalization is granted.

Before proceeding to a VA hospital, veterans were urged to communicate with the nearest hospital by telephone or telegraph and request authority for admission and transportation, if necessary. Prior authority is required by the VA for travel before any transportation expenses can be collected.

If admission to a hospital has been approved, the expense of transportation is furnished when the applicant is being hospitalized for a disease or injury incurred in service. Return transportation is allowed when the patient is discharged. If the veteran enters a hospital for an injury or disorder not traceable to service, his transportation is paid if the applicant is unable to defray the expense.

Out-patient treatment is furnished veterans whose disabilities

are connected with military duty. This embraces medical, dental and surgical treatment for their service-connected ailments. Treatment may be given at the VA Regional office clinic, or be authorized to be given by a physician or dentist where the applicant lives. Requests for such treatment should be made to the VA Regional Office in Dallas.

Veterans who get authority to report for out-patient treatment may be furnished transportation and necessary meal and lodging requests.

Wives, children and other dependents of veterans are not authorized to receive medical treatment at a VA hospital or clinic. For more detailed information, Mr. Brown urged veterans to see Mr. Modisett, Contact Representative, when he comes to Ranger each Saturday morning from 9:00 to 12:00 noon at the Post Office.

The arsenal's gauge laboratory, termed a "palace of precision," has the best measuring equipment produced by American industry. It is fortified with special devices for the entertainment program.

During the war the arsenal supplied over 600,000 gauges to ordnance inspectors at the 1,500 or more plants throughout the United States that produced ammunition components.

To the necessary cornerstones of musical career-building, rare talent, musicianship, ambition, and perseverance, Carroll Glenn adds another—the sympathetic guidance of a wise mother, who saw in her daughter the elements of greatness, and carefully nurtured them. Acclaimed by critics and public for the musical perception and understanding of her performance, this top-ranking woman violinist looks back to her not-so-long-ago childhood, and acknowledges her good fortune in having so understanding a mother.

Many a young artist has had to struggle, not only against the skeptical attitude of the critical world, but against opposition at home, but Carroll Glenn, who will appear in Eastland on November 27th remembers how her mother, herself a violinist, was always there with the right word to dispel any discouragement.

Before she was four Miss Glenn had her own violin, a "Stradivarius Model" purchased at Sears Roebuck, and when she displayed an amazing aptitude for making even its toy strings sing, her mother thought she saw signs of a real talent. Before Carroll had entered the first grade, her mother graduated her to an eight-size violin and gave her daily lessons. The little girl was soon playing for neighborhood festivities and by the time she was eleven, had won every music contest in her part of the country.

While she appreciated and fostered her daughter's talent, Mrs. Glenn was equally anxious that she have the interests and amusements of an average youngster. As any mother of a musical child knows, it is no mean accomplishment to regulate work, play, and rest so that no undue strain may affect the development of mind and body. To inject the spirit of fun into daily lessons and practice sessions, the mother invented musical games to try to make Carroll Glenn's early study a pleasure instead of the chore it might have become. No compromise with excellence was allowed, however, and Mrs. Glenn remains to this day one of her daughter's most exacting critics.
