Cotton picture looks favorable

Favorable weather so far this season points to a successful Texas cotton crop that will pay farmers their highest coton prices since 1951.

"TIGHT SUPPLIES and relatively strong demands, both domestic and export, indicate that the average 1973-74 cotton price to the farmer will be higher than in the past season even though mid-season demand will again be weak," says Charles Baker, marketing economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

'Early season cotton last year was heavily contracted to cover domestic mill needs for the last quarter of 1972. However, the anticipated large crop resulted in a weak mid-season market with prices unduly depressed. Domestic mills and foreign buyers sharpened de-1973, resulting in depletion of specialist.

The next city commission meeting is scheduled for Sept.



Range fires pose threat

As hot summer weather pro-gresses, range wildfires become a threat.

a threat.

"RANGES IN MOST areas of Texas boast plenty of vegetation due to good rainfall the past few months," says Dr. Bobby J. Ragsdale, range specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "This further increases the fire hazard. Summer rains have temporarily mer rains have temporarily slowed the hazard in some areas, but hot weather will soon dry out the vegetation.

Everyone can help in the prevention of range fires, believes the specialist. Outdoor recrea-tionists should be especially careful with campfires. Land-owners should delay the use of managed fires or otherwise should be extremely cautious with such fires

If a fire should start, organizations such as county rural fire control groups can play a key role in controlling and extinguishing the fire. "If counties have no plans for rural fire control, some should be adopted as quickly as possible," advises Ragsdale.

The fire danger exists in forests and woodlands as well as the rangeland areas of the


Fires can be extremely damaging. They destroy vegetative cover which increases the possibility of soil erosion and accelerates water run-off following rainfall. They also destroy valuable livestock feed and food and cover for wildlife and pro-



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Prospects good for waterfowlers

Texas hunters are due good waterfowl hunting over the state this fall.

CHARLES Stutzenbaker, waterfowl biologist with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, says prospects are favorable for this season's hunting.

"Range conditions over the state are generally good," he said, "and there should be enough ducks and geese on the ground to enthuse the hunters." Stutzenbaker pointed out that duck production in prairie Canada was down somewhat over

"This was related to dry conditions over the pothole nesting range," he said. "But geese, on the other hand, will be up substantially over last year's ACCORDING TO Stutzenbak-

er, mild weather in the Arctic. with a record light snowfall and early ice breakup, set up the geese for a successful nesting effort.

'Everyone realizes," he said. that local conditions on the Texas range can change quickly with a sudden dry spell or too much rain making the birds hard to find.

"We are looking at the prospect of such a condition now that could really hurt the early teal hunt," he said. "The second rice crop may be short and too late to hold the birds when they arrive on the Tex-

as coast. "This condition is a result of heavy rains and delayed rice planting this summer," he said






