WASHINGTON, D. C .- (NEA)-The once great Senate War Investigating Committee—the outfit that made Sen. Harry Truman famous and President—has now sunk to the lowest level.

When Truman was chairman, the committee was truly non-partisan, all its decisions were by unanimous vote, it had the confidence of the country. It was one of the healthiinfluences for honesty and efficiency in war-

After Meader assured him that the committee had subpoena powers
Army officers and that he would clear it with the War Department,
Miller came in and told his story. Meader invited him back.

THE second session was a formal hearing before five senators. This

was to be an executive session, and nothing was to be made public. But in mid-September, Sen. Owen Brewster of Maine Issued a statement blasting Senator Mead and the committee for not having taken attion on the still unnamed intelligence officer's testimony. Meader was sent to Germany for a four week's preliminary investation, on which he reported to the committee in confidence.

Subsequent events are more or less familiar. Meader's confidential report was allowed to leak out. Secretary Byrnes asked the committee not to stir things up in Germany at this time. Republican memors of the committee complied—by issuing the Meader report in full. The War Department demanded the name of the colonel involved and called him on the carpet. The whole record stinks.
