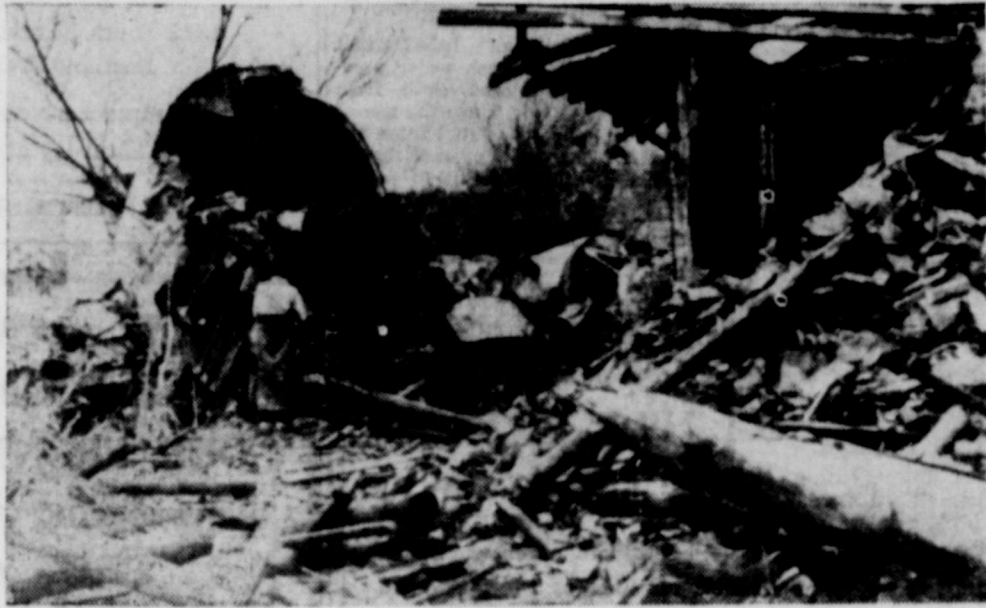

### Hearing On Leon Watershed Work Set For Jan. 8th

Col. Griffith of the Army Engineers will conduct a hearing at 10:30 a. m. January 8, in the district courtroom in Comanche relative to improvements to the middle and upper watershed of the Leon River.

In view of this hearing it is suggested that some months ago representatives from Gatesville, Hamilton, Dublin, Gustine, Comanche, De Leon, Eastland and Ranger, representing five counties, perfected an organization to promote improvements on this part of the Leon River watershed.

Following a series of meetings, and consultation with the engineers, a program for improvements in this territory was submitted to the Galveston office of Army Engineers.

The program of this group was a multiple program calling for flood control, conservation of water for municipal water supply, and soil conservation.

In support of this program it was submitted that in the middle and upper Leon valley there are thousands of acres of agricultural land of highest potential value that is now practically of no value on account of frequent overflows. This land is especially adapted to the production of corn, grain sorghums, wheat, oats, and alfalfa. These grain crops are especially needed to balance the crops of the lighter soils of the adjacent upland farms. The products from these protected valley lands would materially reduce the amount of grain and hay feed which the feeders and stockmen find it necessary to ship in order to have a balanced ration.

In further support it was suggested that in this middle and upper watershed there is no usable, adequate underground water supply. In this territory there are six good towns that must go to the Leon River or some of its major tributaries if they are to have an adequate and dependable municipal water supply. Individually these towns are not financially able to build dams on the Leon River or its major tributaries that would stand the flow of these streams and impound and hold water for a municipal supply.

In conclusion it is submitted: first, that the Federal Government, under the supervision of its Army service forces, is constructing flood control dams throughout the United States; second, that located on the Leon River in the middle and upper drainage area there are three sites where flood water could be impounded that would insure an abundant municipal water supply for all six towns, and insure flood control for the Leon valley from Eastland to below Gatesville.

This group is convinced that the program they offer is sound economically, socially, and worthy of most serious consideration.

In the next five years 160,000 farms per year will become available for sale or rent, the U. S. Department of Agriculture has predicted.

### COLD LINGERS WITH MERCURY AROUND 20

1946 in Ranger ended on a frigid note as the three day old norther continued its grip with temperatures still hovering around the 20 mark.

On the last day of the year the mercury climbed only 24 degrees with a minimum for the day set at 17 degrees and 19 degrees registered at 8:00 a. m. today.

A four inch snow which fell Tuesday was unmelted and sleet was falling during mid-morning today. Precipitation from the snow measured .55 of an inch at 8:00 o'clock this morning.

Hospitals reported that they had received no accident cases despite the dangers involved in travel and the hazards presented in the ice covered streets and sidewalks.

Busses were reported to be running on schedule and train schedules were still a little slow.

WASHINGTON — Spare stamp 53 in ration book four will become good today for five pounds of sugar amid indications that 1947 will bring more sugar for consumers.

Although sugar rationing is expected to last for some time, agriculture department officials predicted that consumer sugar allotments this year would be boosted at least 15 pounds over 1946.

### Earl Conner Bows Out As Eastland County Attorney

Earl Conner, Jr., who served the citizens of Eastland county for 10 years as their Criminal District Attorney, retired January 1, surrendering the post to Everett Grisham, World War II veteran and a practicing attorney in Eastland and elsewhere for a number of years, elected at the last election. Conner, who was elected for five successive terms, did not offer for re-election.

No man holding the post that Conner held for so long and who did his duty, could be expected not to accumulate the ill will of some. Yet Conner perhaps retired one of the most popular ex-officials that Eastland county has ever had.

Before being elected Eastland County attorney in 1927, Conner had been engaged in the practice of law in Eastland for five years and he will go back to that practice, and will again become a member of the firm of Conner & Conner, the senior member of which is his father, Earl Conner, Sr., a veteran lawyer of 45 years experience who enjoys the coveted reputation of being one of the leading and outstanding members of the Texas Bar.

As he bowed out of the office he had held so long Conner said: "Upon retiring from the office of County Attorney I desire to thank the citizens of this county for their confidence and co-operation while I served them in that capacity. I shall always feel grateful for the honor bestowed upon me. I wish them all a Happy and Prosperous New Year."

### Republicans Map Oust-Bilbo Strategies

WASHINGTON — Senate Republicans were expected today to pursue their attempt to oust Sen. Theodore G. Bilbo, D. Miss., without awaiting the outcome of a Justice Department investigation of Bilbo's affairs.

The Justice Department disclosed last night that it had been investigating the Bilbo matter for some time. A spokesman said all phases of the case were being covered.

Meanwhile, the Senate Republican steering committee scheduled a special holiday meeting for today to outline Oust-Bilbo strategy.

The committee agreed unanimously to recommend that Bilbo's right to a seat be challenged.

### Iron Lung To Be Demonstrated January 10-11

H. H. Hicks, exalted ruler of the Elks Lodge in Ranger, announced today that a demonstration of an iron lung will be given at Vaughn's Home and Auto Supply Store, 116 Main street on January 10 and 11.

In the morning of January 10 a demonstration of the use of the iron lung will be given at the high school auditorium.

The demonstrations are being given in connection with the drive being made by the lodge to raise funds for the purchase of an iron lung to be made available for use in Ranger and surrounding territory.

The iron lung, generally associated in the minds of the public in connection with the treatment of infantile paralysis, is used in many other ways, including revival of near drowning victims.

The public is urged and invited to attend the demonstrations.

### Vaughn's Home, And Auto Supply Business Moved

### Senator Reed To Fight For Chairmanship

WASHINGTON — Sen. Claude M. Reed, R. Kans., was reported ready to carry his fight for chairmanship of the powerful new Senate commerce committee to the entire Senate Republican membership.

The Republican committee on committees assigned the post to Sen. Wallace H. White, Jr., of Maine, who also will be majority leader. Reed's insistence that he be awarded to himself was the only apparent remaining obstacle to GOP agreement on chairmanship assignments.

### Taxicab Strike Stops Traffic In Los Angeles

SAN FRANCISCO — San Francisco's 2,000 Yellow taxicab drivers rang in the New Year with a strike at 12:01 a. m. today leaving the city's thousands of New Year Eve celebrants to wend their way home as best they could.

The strike, sanctioned by the AFL Central Labor Council after collapse of wage negotiations, left only 500 other cabs operating in the sprawling, crowd packed downtown area, and many formally clad merry makers were left hailing streetcars as their only means of transportation.

The coffee shop will continue to operate on a 24 hour basis.

Miss Claudia Fay Perdue will be manager of the hotel, replacing Latimer who had been serving in that capacity.

Mrs. Winston who has been assisting in the operation of the hotel for the past several months has purchased a business in Denver, Colorado and will leave in the near future to take over management of the business.

### Eisenhower Denies Rumor Of Statement

MIAMI, Fla. — Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's aide today confirmed that the chief of staff had denied a story quoting him as saying he would run for president in 1948 if the people wanted him to.

The aide said the general declared there was no truth in the story, when it was brought to his attention at Everglades City, Fla., at the conclusion of a fishing trip yesterday. Eisenhower is resting at an army hospital here.

### Civilian Board Takes Over Atom Bomb Controls

WASHINGTON — Five civilians directly responsible to President Truman today took over from the Army all domestic control of atomic energy, including the atomic bomb.

Chairman David Lilienthal said the five man commission would exert every effort to develop one of history's greatest scientific discoveries for the benefit of all mankind.

The transfer, he said, means that "the people of the United States are turning over to five civilians the most potent weapon of all times."

### New Set Up Will Not Use Seizure By Government

WASHINGTON — Senate Republicans were framing a legislative program today to deal with labor disputes without use of government seizure powers.

President Truman formally abandoned the seizure instrument yesterday in his proclamation terminating hostilities. One effect of the proclamation was to end immediately the president's power to seize struck mines and factories under the Smith-Connally Act.

Other provisions in the act remain in effect for six months, except for a provision barring labor unions contributions to political campaigns, however the act already was almost a dead letter.

Sen. Joseph H. Ball, R. Minn., who heads a Republican Senate group drafting labor legislation, made it clear that seizure power was not contemplated as a peace-time device.

### To Recommend Revisions In Courts Martial

WASHINGTON — The War Department will recommend a far reaching shakeup in the Army court martial system to the new Congress, a reliable Army source said today.

Among other things, the Army will recommend placing enlisted men on courts martial and removing courts martial from control of commanding officers, the source said.

A high ranking Army officer said the value of the court martial system was low at the end of the war. He thought the inclusion of enlisted men on trial panels would improve it.

### Radio Officer Of Crashed Plane Dies In Ireland

SHANNON, Erie — Dudley Hill of Alexandria, Va., radio officer of the wrecked TWA airliner Star of Cairo, died today of his injuries, raising to 13 the death toll of crash near Shannon airport Saturday morning.

Hill died at the Ennis County Infirmary, where he had been in critical condition since he was removed from the wreckage.

**WEEDS WINNING IN WAR  
 WITH MAN SAY EXPERTS**

**WASHINGTON (UP)**—Weeds  
 are spreading faster than they  
 are being destroyed, according to  
 William H. (Bill) Mercer of Am-  
 arillo, Tex., the world's largest  
 weed seed collector.

Mercer has been studying  
 weeds since the early 1900's and  
 in the intervening years has col-  
 lected more than 1,500 kinds of  
 weed seed from the worst patches  
 in this country and abroad.

Mercer outlined his reason for  
 believing weeds are beating man's  
 war against them in the current  
 issue of "Era," the monthly pub-  
 lication of the Bureau of Recla-  
 mation.

He said that few farmers test  
 their crop seed prior to planting.  
 Farmers who are careless with the  
 seed they plant may reap a har-  
 vest of weeds over a period of  
 years instead of a marketable  
 crop, he warned.

To illustrate, Mercer confounds  
 onlookers by mixing together  
 beer, maybe a little wine or, with  
 no persuasion whatever, a jolt of  
 "mountain dew."
