U. S. COTTON OUTLET RESTORED IN JAPAN AS MILLS REOPEN

OSKA, Japan (UP)—Thousands of bales of American cotton are being woven into cloth in this once great spinning center as part of the Allied program to use Allied raw materials and Japanese manufacturing skills to clothe Asia's needy millions.

During the war Premier Gen. Hideki Tojo and his associates in the militarist government in control at Tokyo forced most of the great Osaka mills to scrap their spindles and convert to munitions production. Barely enough were left to provide cloth for the nation.

With the coming of V-J Day, however, Osaka spinners immediately began plans to resume cloth production and arrangements were made with the Supreme Allied Command in Tokyo to obtain cotton which is woven into cloth under strict Allied control. This correspondent visited one of the largest and most modern

of the mills engaged in the present program and found it a hive of cloth, tire cord and other needed products coming out the front. The mill, the Kaisuka Mill of the Dai Nippon Cotton Spinning Co., has been in operation intermittently for about 10 years and now has operating 75,000 spindles (160 frames.) It is producing about 26,000 bales of cotton yarn a month and 21,000 pieces of piece goods—calico, T-cloth and shirtings.

Drilling of the Phillips-South wild No. 3 will start at once. This well is 923' West of the well number 2 above mentioned, and 350' from the South line of Section 58, Depth of this well is also to be 4300'.

Clanton well number 1 in the Manning-O'Connor Field, Stephens County, with 500 gallons of acid in the Caddo Lime formation from a depth of 3399' to 3398'. Production was increased approximately 103 barrels through this action, raising it to 175 barrels.

Radio Station's Return Recalls Pearl Harbor

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—The attack on Pearl Harbor five years ago was foreshadowed by a frenzied report from the Matsun Lurline received by shortwave marine station KTK at Mussel Rock, Globe Wireless reports. The Lurline's radio operator received an SSSS message from the freighter SS Cynthia Olson: "Am being attacked by submarine." The Olson was torpedoed and sunk. A few minutes after the message was relayed to the Mussel Rock station, bombs dropped on Pearl Harbor. Now, after five years of silence, station KTK is back on the air giving 24-hour service to ships at sea.

Taxi Driving Helps Pay Bills For Professor

MINNEAPOLIS (UP)—Because his monthly paycheck of \$280 during the 10-month school year does not take care of all the bills, Karl P. Hoerschgen, English teacher, spends weekends, holidays and summer vacation driving a taxicab.
