These are some of the common objections to the military professional as a non-military public servant. Yet they do not exactly fit General Marshall's case. His brilliant job in the recent war could not be divorced from consideration of civilian needs and problems. And his wide-ranging activities were far removed from those of a garrison office in peacetime.

- The General is no stranger to international conferences. He knows many of the world's statesmen. And certainly his postwar mission to China, though unsuccessful and hopelessly difficult, has been valuable diplomatic train-

One cannot predict how this experience will serve him as the No. 1 Cabinet officer. There is no background which is a required necessity for the State Department's chief. The Secretaries have come from many walks of life, and their past experiences have never served as an accurate guide to their future diplomatic performances.

- There are, however, many known qualities which General Marshall brings to his new post. He has proved himself a man of distinguished ability in organizing our strength and planning some of the greatest victories of history's greatest war. His intregrity and selfless devotion to duty are unquestioned.

As for Mr. Byrnes, we can repeat the President's "Well 'The retiring Secretary has ben a handy man to have around. Extremely able, though perhaps not brilliant he has made an excellent record in all three branches of

He is certain to be remembered best as the Secretary of State who steerd us through some extremely rough weather-and unsteady sailing. He leaves an international scene less troubled than when he came upon it.

The country owes James F. Byrnes a large debt for his Jong, arduous, devoted years of service. We wish him good luck, good health, and a well-deserved rest.

Harvard's gigantic "mechanical brain" has a new home. It is a modern, two-story structure—the first new building of the univer-sity's proposed "Science City," and houses the complex calculating machine which can solve the most intricate mathematical problems in a matter of seconds.

The machine was given to Harvard in August, 1944, by the In-Business Machines Corp., and has operated since that time under a naval contract. The machine is operated 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Some experts believe such machines may be an aid to making more accurate weather forecasts.

Dr. Vannevar Bush, president of Carnegie Institution of Washing ton and wartime director of the Office of Scientific Research and Devepolment, has been named 1946 winner of the Hoover medal, ntly awarded by four national engineering societies.

The award will be conferred on Dr. Bush Jan. 30 in New York during the winter meeting of the American Institute of Electrical engineers.






