Loriot was adopted by New Orleansians at Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's request. Steps are

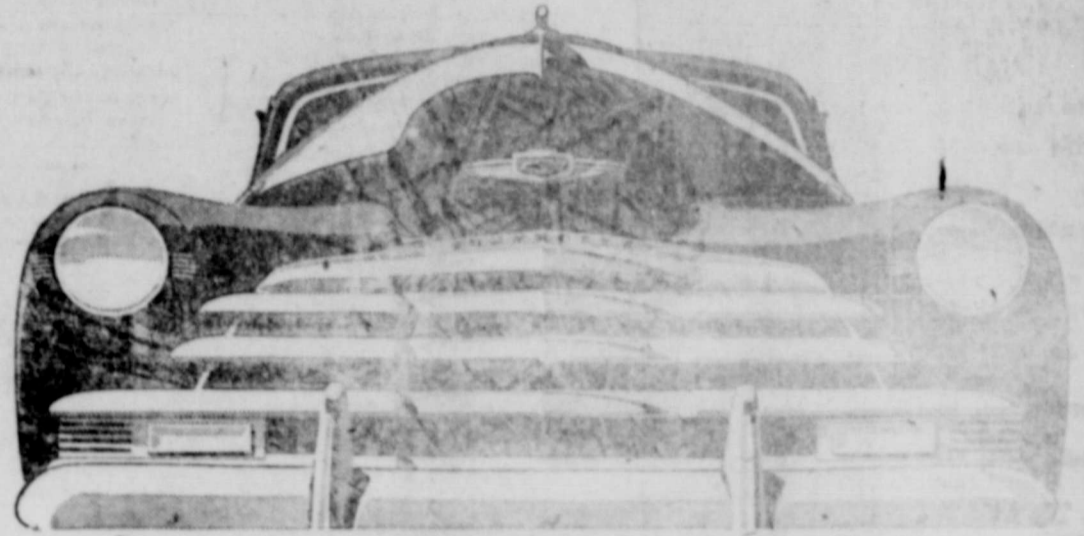
being taken to establish a center for medical care, nursery schools, milk-feeding programs, and facilities for clothing needy residents.

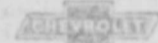

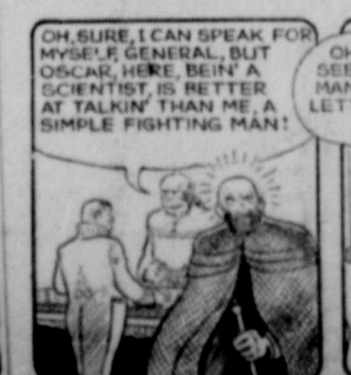

holder will not have to stand in line at ticket windows or counters. A telephone call to any Texas and Pacific ticket office will be all that is necessary to purchase rail tickets and Pullman accommodations. Tickets and reservations will be delivered to the buyer's home, office or directly to him on the train. If a trip does not involve Pullman accommodations, the credit card holder need only board the train, present his credit card to the conductor and receive his ticket.

The credit card may be used also in Texas and Pacific diners and restaurants for the purchase of meals and other services. Charges for excess baggage, too, will be covered by the credit card.

Credit cards will be issued, upon application, to financially responsible individuals, firms and corporations. Statements will be rendered on the first of the month for charges incurred during the preceding month.

Garden Lore

By Ethel Brooks Gilmore No doubt the heavy frozes killed a large percentage of volunteer larkspur and poppies, but it is not too late to replant.

One of the most effective uses of larkspur and poppies I have ever seen was, a back ground of blue larkspur which provided a perfect back drop for double pink poppies.

Another combination which was beautiful was white larkspur used as a foil for crimson poppies.

Care should be used in planting. Finely worked soil and shallow planting secures the best results.

Also it is time to plant sweet peas. Make a ditch six inches deep and place an inch of well-rotted manure in the bottom; then fill in with three inches of soil which has been well worked. Then plant your seed 2 inches deep and press the soil down firmly.

Sweet peas when blooming should be cut frequently to keep them from forming seed pods

which sap the plants. This method prolongs their blooming season.

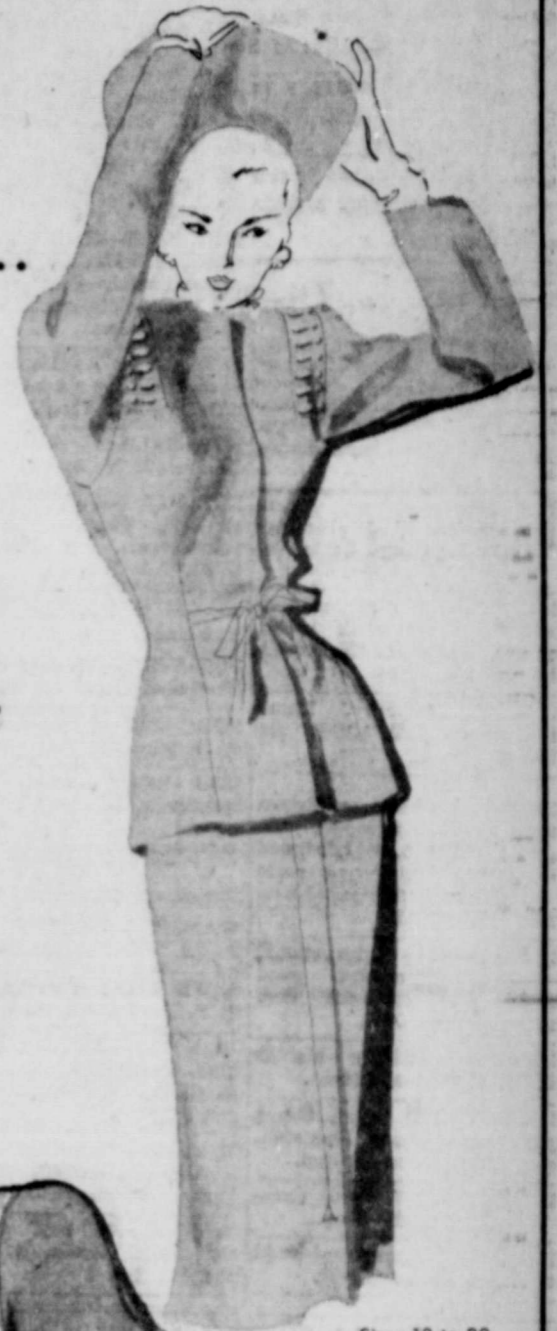

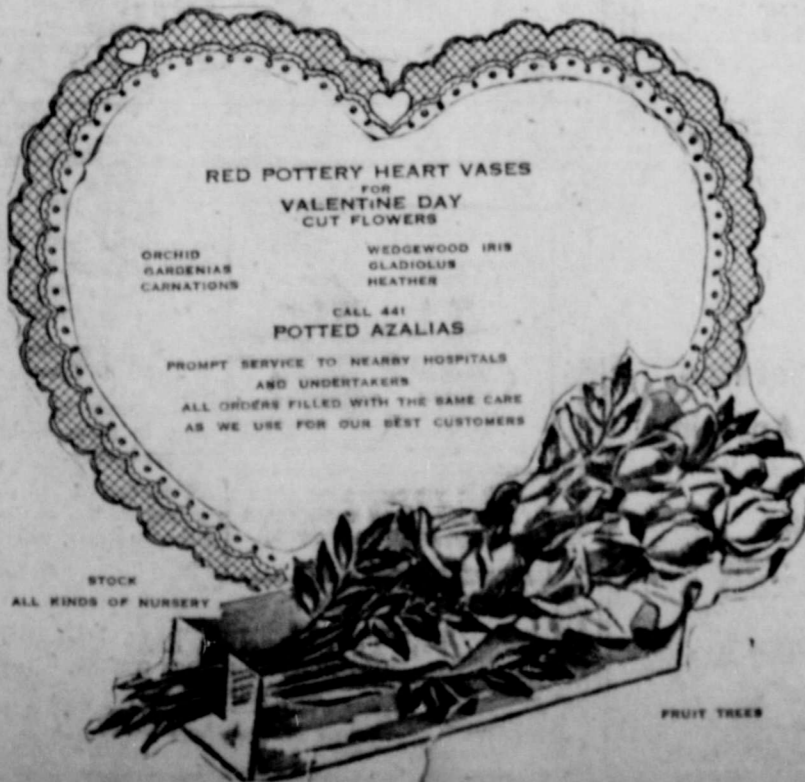

Local Committee Set Up To Aid Student Movement

Rev. Claude P. Jones has announced the appointment of the following committee to lead the Ranger First Methodist church in cooperation with the Methodist Student Movement which is attempting to set up student centers on 13 state college campuses in Texas.

Dr. P. M. Kuykendall, A. J. Rowell, L. R. Pearson, Dr. G. C. Henderson and J. E. Matthews. A contribution of \$650 is sought for the state fund from the Ranger church.

Rev. Jones explained that the objectives of the move have been listed as follows:

1. To lead students to become followers of Jesus Christ and into a vital personal relationship with God.
2. To develop a supporting group of students and faculty on each campus, in which individuals will mutually strengthen one another in Christian living.
3. To enlist and train students for lay and professional leadership in the church.
4. To help create a new order (the Kingdom of God) embodying Christian ideals and conserving the highest human values.

In seeking to achieve these objectives there is carried on in connection with the local churches serving the campuses of the country a varied program of recreation, worship, counseling, religious discussion or forums, religious activities and training for future church leadership. Outstanding speakers from over the State and Nation are also annually brought in to address students and annual state-wide and regional conferences are conducted for religious inspiration and training. In Texas in three institutions Bible Courses are being offered for which students receive credit on their degrees and these have an annual enrollment of around 600.

The Wesley Foundation phase of the Methodist Student Movement in Texas was begun by the establishment of the Wesley Bible Chair at the University of Texas in 1916 and is now being carried on through provision for full time workers at the University of Texas, A&M College, A&I College at Lubbock, Texas College for Women at Denton as well as at the five State Teachers Colleges at Denton, Commerse, Huntsville, Nacogdoches and San Marcos. In addition some form of help is being given to the promotion of religious programs upon three other State schools and four church school campuses. Where full time workers are provided, they are reaching around 60 per cent of their constituency. They also report during this past year 50 young men and women in their groups who have dedicated themselves to the ministry or some form of Christian work.

Winant Coming To Texas In Interest Of Christian Move

DALLAS, Feb. 15 — John G. Winant, fresh from a Presidential mission to England, is scheduled to make appearances in five Southwestern cities in connection with the 1947 observance of American Brotherhood Week sponsored by the National Conference of Christians and Jews February 16-23.

Shortly after reporting to President Truman on his confidential mission to England, the wartime ambassador to Great Britain will fly to Texas. Mr. Winant, national chairman of the American Brotherhood Week celebrations, will appear in Ft. Worth February 16, in Beaumont and Houston February 17, and in Shreveport and Dallas February 18. The topic of his message will be "Brotherhood — Pattern for Peace."

Following his Southwestern swing, he will go to St. Louis, Louisville, Detroit and Des Moines.

Bigotry, prejudice and hatred, three world public enemies, have been called the targets of the 1947 Brotherhood Week observance by Alf M. Landon of Topeka, Kansas former presidential candidate now serving as chairman of the observance in seven and one-half states of the Southwestern division of the National Conference of Christians and Jews with headquarters offices in Dallas.

Throughout the area, teams of

interfaith speakers representing the Protestant, Catholic and Jewish faiths, will appear before school and college gatherings, civic clubs and other groups to speak in behalf of tolerance and understanding between religious and racial groups of America.

First Automobile Traced To 1875

BOSTON (UP)—A 96-year-old Back Bay man is credited by the Massachusetts Council of Automobile Old Timers as the builder of what may have been the nation's first automobile.

George A. Long constructed a charcoal-burning motor vehicle at Northfield in 1875, consisting of a chassis on wooden wheels with a fifth wheel in front for steering and a solid axle to which the driving wheels were keyed.

He got his idea from an army camp in New Hampshire where he saw a steam boiler and visualized steam as the source of propulsion for his vehicle.

The Long car was sold to a railroad which replaced the wooden wheels with train wheels and used the vehicle to carry newspapers to Keene, N.H.

Patents were obtained by Long in 1883 on a two-speed, 300-pound "team road vehicle" which made

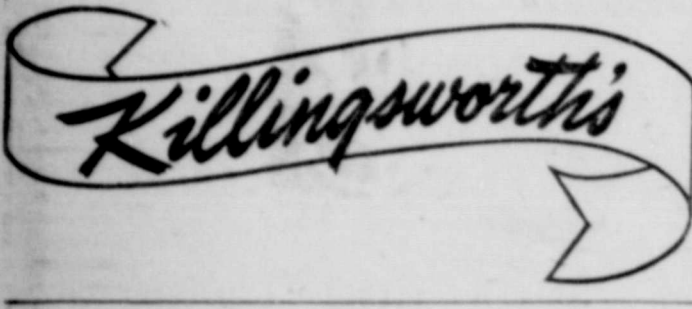
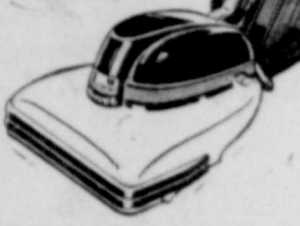

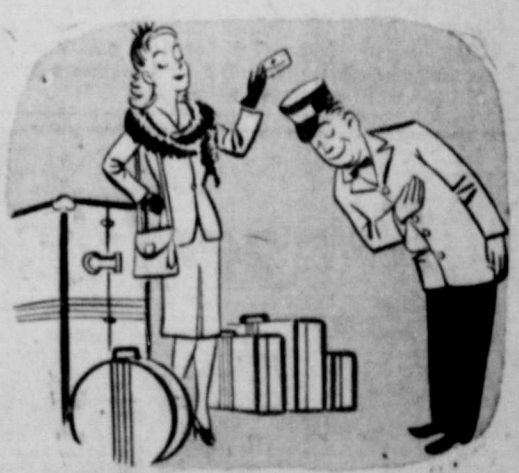
