CAC starts transit service

Door-to-door transportation, available to the general public and free for eligible persons, has started in Castro County through Panhandle Transit, an arm of the Texas Panhandle Community Action Corporation.

"It is being contracted through the State Dept. of Highways and Public Transportation with funding through the Urban Mass Transit Administration," said Nancy Harvey, TPCAC Special Projects Director.

"Routine service will be open to the general public and especially suitable for senior citizens and handicapped persons, and will have flexible schedules in order to meet passenger needs," Harvey said.

"The service is provided cost-free to persons who are eligible for Aid to Families with Dependent Children, food stamps, Supplemental Security Income, Medicare, Job Training Partnership Act, Head Start and certain other programs," said Wannie Stevens, TPCAC coordinator in Castro County. "We'll be providing regular service for medical, shopping and essential business purposes, to go to the Senior Citizens Center and other special needs."

Persons who do not qualify under the TPCAC programs may still use the service, paying 50¢ for one-way, in-town



Hart superintendent announces retirement

Hart School Superintendent Ted Averitt has announced his retirement, effective July 1,



stepping down after 17 years with the Hart schools and 36 years as a teacher, coach and administrator.

Applications will be accepted by the Hart schools through April 1 for the job.

Averitt, prior to moving to Hart, was superintendent at Hermleigh for six years, and coached and taught in Alvord, Iowa Park, Burkburnett and Monahans.

He and his wife, Ethel, who has taught for 29 years, will be moving to Lubbock.

The Averitts' two daughters, Jan Whisenhunt and Stacy Averitt, are also involved in education, teaching at Merkel and Springlake-Earth, respectively.

Applications for the position may be made to Averitt at Box 487 in Hart.

Snook first opponent

Swiftettes seeking eighth state crown

"Eight would be great!"

That's what the sign read the Nazareth cheerleaders put together for the Swiftettes to run through Saturday night before the Swiftettes' 57-40 win over the Highland Hornets to earn their ninth trip to the state tournament in Austin since 1976.

Thursday morning at 8:30 in the Frank Erwin Special Events Center (Super Drum) in Austin, the Swiftettes begin their attempt for their eighth crown against Snook.

In the other semifinal Thursday at 10 a.m., two old Nazareth state tournament foes, Petty West Lamar (30-3) and Priddy (25-3), square off for the right to play in Saturday's finals at 9:30 a.m.

Snook lost two of their games to Dime Box during District 56 play by three points, then avenged those losses with a 46-43 win in the Region IV finals.

"Connie Cole (a 5-11 junior) and Glenda Benford (a 5-8 senior) are our two best players," said Snook coach John David Konvicka, who, with his wife, Sharon, is in his fourth year as Snook girls head coach. "We have eight or nine other people who have played a lot for us this year, and they should all get a lot of playing time."

When asked if Snook employs a press, zone, fast or slow tempo, Konvicka said, "We're not tied down to any one thing. The attack we are going to use depends on the nature of the game and the opponent's style of play."

Snook didn't mind running and pressing in their 20-point win over North Zulch in the first round of their regional tournament, or in their semifinal win, 87-39 over Agua Dulce, but slowed the tempo considerably Saturday night.

The Swiftettes will go into the state tournament with one decided advantage — their playing experience in the Super Drum. Two of the Swiftettes, Leona Gerber and LaDawn Schmucker, will be playing in their third state tournament, while the others — well, it's like a Nazareth fan said Saturday night in Levelland:

"They need to change the sign in the Super Drum to 'Home of the Texas Longhorns and Nazareth Swiftettes.' Most of these girls have been going down there over half of their lives. They ought to be used to the place by now."

On the other hand, Snook's girls haven't played in the state tournament since 1978, the last year of six-player girls basketball in Texas. Of course, that's not counting the times they've visited the Super Drum to watch the Snook boys in their annual trip to Austin.

The Swiftettes left Tuesday for the state capital, and spent the night in Brownwood after a workout. They arrived in Austin Wednesday, where they are staying at the Villa Capri.

The Swiftettes didn't work out in the Super Drum Wednesday, nor did they participate in the pre-tournament meeting on Wednesday night. The workouts and meetings have been called off because of the limited amount of school time players are allowed each school year. The school calendar had already allowed for the state tournament, with no school scheduled in Nazareth today or Friday. That means no adjustment in the school schedule.

The games will be broadcast by KDHN, 1470, beginning at 8:20 a.m. Thursday.

Candidates slim as deadline nears

The ballot is looking thin in Castro County, with local elections set for Saturday, April 6, and few filings so far.

In Dimmitt's city election, the terms of Mayor Wayne Collins, Alderman David Hays, Judge Ferne Jones and an open spot on the Board of Aldermen are up for grabs. All of the incumbents have filed, but no one has yet filed for the open position on the board.

Kellie Proffitt is the only person who has filed for one of the two positions that will be open on the Dimmitt School Board.


The terms of Board president Charles Wales and Glenn Odom are up, and neither has filed for reelection.

No one has filed for the three positions on the Plains Memorial Hospital Board. The terms of Charles Rickerd, Desi Pesina and James Welch are expiring.

No one has filed in the Hart city election, with the terms of Mayor Bill Ritter and Commissioner Jerrie Horton expiring.

Three positions will be open on the Hart school board, but

US 385 Association still alive, working

Highway Associations — remember?

Fighting each other, fighting for precious dollars for improvements, fighting for the dollars motorists spent for gas, meals, lodging, fighting to keep towns alive.

US 70 vs. US 80. US 60 vs. US 66. Small towns vs. Ike Eisenhower's Interstates.

And the dreams of the late T. A. Singer of Dimmitt, Guy Lawrence of Hereford, Harley Rhoades of Burlington, Colo., and others to build a good, international highway from Mexico to Canada through their towns, linking a common highway with numbers placed on them in hully-gully fashion to create a consistent ribbon from the Big Bend in Texas to Lake Wasquesiu in Canada.

Their dreams became the International Parks Highway Association, still known as the US 385-85 Association, and their dreams are still alive today.

A. J. Consruck is manager of the Burlington, Colo. Chamber of Commerce — 815

miles north of the southern terminus in the Big Bend National Park, 1,227 south of the end of the pavement near the Churchill River in Saskatchewan, Canada. He is trying to keep the association alive as IPHA President.

"A highway should have a personal touch," Consruck said. "It needs to have people involved. A lot of highways don't have associations anymore, and I think that's a shame."

"We're still trying to get a bridge across the Rio Grande into Mexico," Consruck said, "and the highway would run on down into Mexico. And, we'd still like to have the highway number 385 all the way to Canada. The highway joins US 85 at Deadwood, S.D., but the Numbering Committee said we couldn't change it (US 85 from Deadwood to Canada) unless we could prove it would make a difference in traffic along the highway. The provincial officials in Saskatchewan said they would change their highway to 385 if we could

change the number in North and South Dakota.

"T. A. Singer was the father of the whole deal," Consruck said. "He and Rhoades got together here in Burlington while Harley was a County Commissioner, and they spent no telling how many hours, traveling up and down the road."

"It was numbered 51 in Texas and Colorado, 29 in Nebraska, some places it had no number at all," Consruck continued. "It was still dirt in most places. They worked to get blacktop and bridges, to get the road straightened out. They worked 20 years before they could get the highway numbered 385."

Lawrence, Honorary Vice President and Special Advisor to the IPHA, remembers the

bus trip he, Singer, Rhoades and others took from Marathon, Tx. to Saskatchewan.

"We chartered the bus in 1954," Lawrence recalled. "It was still mostly just graded dirt road most of the way. There was no bridge across the Canadian River — you had to ford the river, and, if the river was running too high, you had to go around through Amarillo to get to Dalhart. I think they built the bridge in about 1958."

"We almost burned the clutch out when we were twisting and turning through the Black Hills," Lawrence said. "We traveled on 18 differently-numbered highways. We really did have a lot of fun on that trip."

Some of the dirt road traveled by Singer and Rhoades in

the late 1930's was in Castro County. According to county historian Teeny Bowden, right of way was granted in Jan., 1934, and construction began in 1939 for SH 51. Grading was completed in 1941 through the county, but, because of WW II, the roadway was not paved until 1947.

Through the efforts of the IPHA, the State Highway Dept., chaired by the late Marshall Formby of Hereford, agreed to change the numbering of SH 51 to US 385 in 1958; however, it was 1965 before the road was officially US 385.

Improvements have been made on the roadway all through the US, Lawrence said, "and you can't really see anything worth your while from an Interstate Highway. There are sure lots of interesting things on 385, though."

US 385-85 includes Big Bend National Park, where the road begins at the Panther Junction Headquarters Building; Fort Robinson, Neb., established in 1874, now a state park and historical museum, referred to as the most beautiful military post in the West; National Pine Ridge-Chadron State Park,

Neb., covering 1,500 acres; the geographical center of the country, near Belle Fourche, S.D., is bisected by 85-385; Wind Cave National Park, where strong wind currents blow in and out of the cave, and act as a barometer; the infamous Black Hills of the Dakotas, including Mt. Rushmore; and Prince Albert National Park in Northern Saskatchewan, including 1,496 sq. miles of prairies, camps and lakes.

"I didn't get to go out and enjoy the highway, the people and towns, the way I used to," Consruck said. "I've kept in touch with as many people as I could, and read a lot of papers. I'm an old coach, and I've enjoyed following your Dimmitt basketball teams through the years. I hope they keep doing well."

"This is a non-paid job (the IPHA)," Consruck added, "but I love working on it, and I'd like to see it stay alive. There are still a few places that need straightening out, and we're still dealing with a few state highway departments. They all know there's still at least one Highway Association around."

DPS still STEPping down hard on DWI

Despite numerous media reports, the Dept. of Public Safety says there is still a problem with Driving While Intoxicated, but their Selective Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP) is effectively taking DWI suspects off highways in Castro and Randall counties.

"Despite some adverse weather which hampered our operation at times, overtime troopers have still managed to remove many DWI suspects from roadways," said Capt. Bob Russell of the DPS Regional office in Amarillo. "At this point we feel STEP is proving very effective in deter-

ring DWI activity in these areas."

The DPS troopers are coming into the counties, mostly on weekends, through August in an attempt to keep persons who might be DWI suspects off the highways. The troopers receive their overtime pay through state and federal grants.

Since December, 26 DWI suspects have been arrested in Castro County by troopers working in the STEP program, while 32 have been arrested in Randall County. Those arrests are in addition to 32 arrests made in January alone by regular patrols.

"With all the publicity that has been given to the DWI crackdown, you would think a person would be reluctant to drive while impaired," said Sgt. Harold Price, STEP coordinator for Castro County, "but we're still having a problem in the county."

Next Friday, Hart elementary students will present a program at 9:30 a.m. at the Elementary Gym.

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

The Police Dept. announced its intentions to crack down on junk vehicles located within the city limits, and will be covering the city to enforce compliance.

Regulations state that it is unlawful for any person to park, place or store a junked vehicle on private or public property unless such vehicle is of historic interest and is kept out of sight within an enclosure.

"Anyone failing to comply with the law will be prosecuted," Chief Don Franklin said. "In the past few months we have had people in violation who failed to comply, and now we feel it's necessary to take stricter measures."

The police invite calls from anyone knowing the location of a junked vehicle.

A public hearing to receive oral comments from the public on the draft environmental assessment (DEA) prepared for Deaf Smith County will be held today (Thursday) from 4 to 9 p.m. in the Hereford High School.

Those previously requesting opportunity to speak at the hearing will be heard first or at specified times. Anyone present at the hearing who would like to speak, but did not preregister, may request an opportunity to speak. The moderator will determine if the time period scheduled will allow any additional speakers.

Any who are scheduled to speak are requested to bring a written copy of the comments they will present, and each presentation will be limited to 10 minutes and possibly less.

Questions may be asked only by those conducting the hearing and there will be no cross-examination of people presenting statements.

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

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
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
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Bobcats, Swifts earn regional berths




Steffens hit for 13.



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Jiggs Hudson is the driver for the local PT service. Hudson and the other drivers in the 26-county TPCAC service area have been professionally trained in defensive driving, passenger assistance techniques (including aiding handicapped persons and helping with packages and groceries), and first aid, including CPR.

ACCORDING to a Boston University scientist, there's mounting evidence that toxic waste dumps cause illness among people living nearby, reports the National Wildlife Federation. Dr. David Ozonoff found an increased incidence of nausea, fatigue, respiratory problems and headaches among residents living near a once highly toxic dump site two years after its chemical wastes had been removed.

Starting right

Fill us each morning with your constant love, so that we may sing and be glad all our life. Psalms 90:14 TEV

"I never eat breakfast," Alice said, as though that proved a badge of commendation. She prided herself on avoiding breakfast and eating nothing until lunch. She advised the rest of us to cut down to two meals a day or, even better, just one. I might have listened more seriously, but Alice weighs nearly 300 pounds.

Her theory sounded all right: don't get the appetite going in the morning and you will keep it under control all day. It sounds good, but it doesn't work.

First, people who skip breakfast are unusually hungry by noon and ready to eat all day. In a survey on the eating habits of teens, conducted a few years ago by a University of California professor, the obese tended to skip breakfast.

Second, we need the energy for the peak of the day. Even if your breakfast consists of only 200 or 300 calories, you need both protein and complex carbohydrates. If we eliminate the first meal of the day, we lose out on stepped-up metabolism by many hours and tend to overeat at dinner. We require more calories in the active part of the day when we need energy and our system is working at its best. If we do most of our eating in the evening, we tend to store up fat.

Good nutrition starts with that first meal of the day, just as good spiritual life begins in the morning.

We're at our best for the Lord when we start our morn-

ing with time devoted to praying and Bible study, our spiritual food and defense against the enemies of our soul that we'll encounter during the day.

The most important part of my day begins with the morning: a good breakfast, and a special time with Jesus Christ.

Lord Jesus, like the psalmist, help me seek you early so that I can feed my soul. Teach me, too, to enjoy a nutritious breakfast to fill my body. Amen.

March is 'Depression Glass' Month

March has been proclaimed "Depression-Era Glassware Month" in Castro County by County Judge Polly Simpson.

The Top of Texas Depression Era Glassware Club is sponsoring the special observance that will be marked by displays of the colorful glassware in various locations in Dimmitt.

Ramona Annen of Dimmitt is president of the club, which has members in Lubbock, Levelland, Plainview, Sudan, Sundown, and Brownfield, as well as Dimmitt. Delle Moore of Dimmitt is secretary of the organization.

The group organized in February of 1981, and now has about 25 members. Meetings are held in members' homes on the first Thursday of each month.

Anyone interested in joining the group or who would like to have their glassware evaluated may contact Annen at 647-4468 or Moore at 647-5464.

Annen said that she has been collecting the colored, transparent glassware for about seven years and has eleven different sets, along with several kitchen ware items. Moore has been a collector for ten years and has over 1,200 pieces.

Made primarily during the Depression years (from the late 1920's through the 1930's), the cheap-grade glassware was turned out in quantity and given away as promotional items or inducements to buy other products. It was made in colors ranging from deep royal blue and ruby red to pastel hues of amber, green, pink, blue, yellow, white and crystal. Different processes were used to melt and mold the glass, and different patterns were used to decorate it or it was left plain.

With pieces broken or lost through the years, the old glassware was reduced to only a few odd pieces in most households, and began to be valued by collectors. Prices vary depending on patterns, color, condition, and how many of each piece were made.

Moore said that a sugar bowl in the design known as Pink Mayfair is valued at about \$15, while the much rarer lids for the bowls are valued at \$850. She noted that salt and pepper shakers in a common pattern may be valued at \$40, while a rare set is priced at \$2,000.

"The special observance for the month of March is to promote the preservation and enjoyment of this glassware that is symbolic of a period in our history," Annen said.
