Noisy Army Experiments Seek Fireproof Muffler

LAWRENCE, Kan. (UP)—One of the noisiest spots in the world today is a small shack on the campus of the University of Kansas. A research project for the War Department under direction of Prof. William Simpson, of the school's aeronautical engineering department, is the cause of the noise.

Constantly throughout the day, deafening sounds reverberate from the shack as research workers deliberately backfire engines for service in a quest to develop a spark and flame arresting muffler. The engines are wired to backfire violently.

"During the war, many disastrous fires were started around all types of civilian and military installations by defective mufflers," the professor said. "This project will endeavor to develop a muffler which is absolutely fireproof."

 SACRAMENTO, Cal. (UP)—California legislature has a bill before it which would give married women a new kind of suffrage—complete control over their own money.

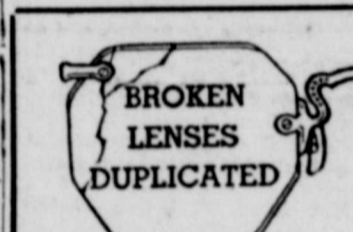
Under present state law, a husband has the absolute right to manage his wife's income. If a woman has a job, for example, her husband can claim legally he is supporting her—with her money, of course.

ted Mine Workers' intention to strike on April 1 in the nation's soft coal fields.

The UMW chieftain sent a terse 20 word letter to Secretary of Interior J. A. Krug, unconditionally withdrawing his notice of Nov. 15, 1946 which sought to terminate the Krug-Lewis agreement for government operation of the soft coal mines.

This withdrawal was one of the terms laid down by the U. S. Supreme Court in upholding the contempt of court convictions against Lewis and the United Mine Workers union.

Lewis' action apparently insured peace in the soft coal fields until June 30 at least when the government relinquishes its operation of the mines.

Claims Routine Training Purpose Of Leyte Order

WASHINGTON—The Navy said today the only purpose in sending the 27,000-ton aircraft carrier Leyte to lead a U. S. Naval force into the troubled Mediterranean waters off Greece and Turkey this spring was for "routine training."

A Navy spokesman was asked whether the Leyte was being sent to Greece and Turkey on White House orders. He repeated it was a "routine transfer."

the Junior Chamber of Commerce and the Lions Club. He told of the fine arts programs given this year and spoke of possible plans to continue these.

C. P. Pruet, finance chairman, stated that a budget of \$5,500 has been set up for the year and that this amount will be required to carry on the work as outlined.

H. P. Earnest, chairman of the military affairs committee, stated that his group is cooperating in building up the National Guard unit here and that temporary headquarters have been provided. Permanent headquarters will be established by the government when the local program has been developed to a certain degree.

H. C. Henderson, reporting for the agriculture and livestock committee, told of the soil conservation meeting planned for April 8, plans for maintaining the cotton gin in Ranger.

Speaking for the highway committee, A. J. Ratliff, stated they were doing everything possible to keep our highways as they are and to add and improve others.

In reporting for the civic committee, J. A. Bates, stated that his committee is working toward a street paving program, traffic safety program, a program of regular garbage collection, to mark the streets, assist with the public library, improve health conditions, establish lighted blocks each way from Main street on Marston, Austin and Rusk streets. He stated that they are assisting in the clean-up campaign.

T. C. Wylie, chairman of the retail trades extension committee, stated that they are working on plans to extend trade in Ranger and to create a greater interest of the trade area in Ranger buying.

Edwin George, Jr., reported for the oil and gas and farm to market road committee in the absence of David D. Pifkrell, chairman. It was stated that a number of plans are underway for farm to market roads around Ranger and that it is hoped that some of them can be definitely announced soon.

A. N. Larson, reporting for George Campbell, chairman of the membership committee, pointed to the budget as already announced and stressed the necessity of financial support of the Chamber of Commerce through purchase of memberships.

Mrs. James P. Morris, chairman of the women's division of the clean-up campaign, made announcements relative to that effort.

It was announced at the meeting that the floral decorations for the banquet tables were furnished by the Strong Floral Company and the City Floral Company.

General Tom C. Clark announced today creation in the justice department of a merger unit, to forestall industrial combines which he said threaten a "serious increase in the concentration of economic power."

Clark marshalled his anti-trust forces for a drive to block illegal corporate mergers as a House judiciary committee considered a bill to tighten existing anti-monopoly laws.

"This merger-unit is made necessary by the tremendous increase in the number of business mergers," Clark said. "It is designed to forestall the creation of a vast number of monopolies and combinations in restraint of trade by the merger device."

Clark said the unit would review mergers in the light of the



anti-trust laws and would "afford timely warning to members of the business community as to mergers which will result in illegal combinations."

The new unit will be part of the anti-trust division. Clark hoped it would prevent illegal combines "by anticipating them." He said many mergers do not violate the anti-trust act.

PUBLISHERS; EDITORS TO BE IN TEXAS APR. 10-12

MISSION, Tex., (UP)—News stories about the wonders of the lone star state will flow from Texas to all points of the nation for a week in April when newspaper publishers and editors visit the state for their 62nd annual National Editorial Association convention.

All things that are part of Texas—rodeos, barbecues, deep-sea fishing, oil wells, the King Ranch, pink grapefruit and Southern hospitality—will be waiting for the news executives.

That's straight from Joe Cook, youthful chairman of entertainment and tours for the convention and publisher of the weekly Mission Times.

"A true Texas flavor will permeate the convention in Ft. Worth April 10, 11, and 12," Cook promised. "Then we're going to give the 500 visitors a Cook's tour of Texas to be followed by air trips to Mexico City."

"We want them to carry back to their newspapers stories about

During the three-day meeting the visiting newsmen will be dined and danced at Texas twin northern cities, Fort Worth and Dallas.

After the convention ends the delegates will start on a 1,000-mile trip through east and south-east Texas, stopping at the island city of Galveston, booming Houston, ancient San Antonio, and the fertile citrus lands of the lower Rio Grande Valley.

The convention proper will be at the Texas Hotel in Ft. Worth and young Cook's official announcement says "flashy cowboy and cowgirl costumes will be in evidence." He doesn't say whether the costumes will be filled with bona fide bow-legged range riders or stoop-shouldered news writers.

Gov. Beauford Jester is expected to speak at the closing banquet Saturday night while Boyce House, Texas newspaperman, humorist and folklorist, will open the program. House, author of "Texas Brags," is down to speak about "Facts" of the lone star state.

A barbecue and rodeo are planned in Ft. Worth Saturday afternoon with Walter Humphrey, editor of the Fort Worth Press and president of the Texas Press Association, in charge of the Ft. Worth entertainment.

So that the ladies won't be bored while the men are in session, stylists from the nationally-known Neiman-Marcus store in Dallas have arranged a feminine luncheon and style show.

After the convention the 500 news executives will board special trains for a trip to the southeast tip of Texas. The Texas Press Association and the Texas Newspaper Publishers Association raised \$10,000 to help finance the tour.

First stop on the tour will be in Galveston, Sunday, April 13, where the newsmen will be guests of Humble Oil & Refining Company at a banquet.

Staying overnight at Galveston's beach hotels, the guests will be treated to boat rides in Galveston Bay, deep-sea fishing expeditions and a beach party the next day.

Tuesday morning the trains will pull into Texas' biggest city, Houston. There the NEA-ers will spend a day visiting oil fields, refineries and the San Jacinto battleground. Another banquet will be rolled out in Houston, this one under the jurisdiction of W. N. Blanton, manager of the Houston Chamber of Commerce, George Carnack, editor of the Houston Press, and Steve Wilhelm, representing Hughes Tool Company, Houston host.

An overnight train ride will take the visitors to the lush citrus country of the lower Rio Grande Valley along the Mexican border. Here Cook will take personal charge of the tour, bringing the trains to a stop at his home-town of Mission. "Down here the delegates can

get their feet in the dirt," Cook said, "and wander about the citrus orchards picking all the grapefruit they want."

Tours of packing, processing and dehydration plants will be made while the visitors are in citrus-land, he said.

The next day the tour hits the famous King Ranch where the NEA-ers will not only see the biggest ranch in the world but the race horse, Bold Venture, as well. They'll be guests of Al Kleberg, ranch manager, and J. A. Kidd, Jr., of the Kingsville Chamber of Commerce, at a steak barbecue on the ranch.

That afternoon they'll go to Corpus Christi for a boat ride in the bay and after dinner will climb back aboard the trains for an overnight ride to San Antonio. The San Antonio visit will be climaxed with a dinner in quaint La Villita, the little Spanish village reconstructed on the river banks in downtown San Antonio.

Cook figures that a large percentage of those on the tour will fly to Mexico City from San Antonio in an air-van arranged by American Airlines. Large 30-passenger planes will shuttle the group to the Mexican capital in four-hour flights. Return from Mexico City will be made to San Antonio from where the delegates will start homeward.

Prehistoric Dinosaurs Give Clue To Beginning Of Man's Evolution

LONDON (UP)—The Story of man goes back past the ice ages, the floods, the mountain-making and the emergence of continents, back to that undermined time when life itself began on earth.

More chapters of the story are missing than known. That is why scientists get extraordinarily excited over discovery of each new link. That is why they wait impatiently for a full report of discoveries by Russian scientists in the Middle Volga Valley.

For in that distant part of European Russia, Soviet paleontologists five years before the war discovered one of the most important bits of evidence in the story of man's evolution.

They found a prehistoric dinosaur cemetery, or perhaps a death trap. Literally hundreds of skeletons and thousands of bones were discovered in a mystifying puzzle preserved that an observer could even tell what the creatures had eaten and digested just before they died.

The find was important, for it filled a blank spot in the history of evolution—none of those species had been identified from that particular era before.

But most important, from a scientific point of view, was the discovery of an aboriginal mammal, a creature which showed in his bony remains that he was the turning point from reptile to

mammal.

This animal was named by his discoverer, Prof. J. A. Orlov, titanophoneus petens and he was a reptile, but he came from the stock which already showed mammal-like characteristics and from which mammals and eventually man, would come.

He was about 12 feet long and his legs were short and powerful. His claws were tremendous and so were his teeth for he lived on the giant reptiles who owned the world in that distant day. His skull was high and narrow, and the snout long, like that of a crocodile.

Most of the fossils in the bed were of the plant-eating deincochalis, cousin to titanophoneus and the principal source of his food.

The fossils were found buried very deeply and it took years for the bone hunters to dig down to them through the stone beds above. But the prize was worth the work. Prof. J. A. Efremov, of the Academy of Sciences of the USSR, reconstructed the scene as it must have been when the huge reptiles were extant.

The land must have been low-lying then, he thought. Probably it was the delta of a huge river, like the Mississippi. Into an eddy whole bodies of the dead dinosaurs would be washed. Then the titanophoneus meat-eaters would plunge into the muck and feast on the bodies of their contemporaries. Sometimes the meat-eaters would get bogged down and die there with their prey. Thus the bones of both types were found together.

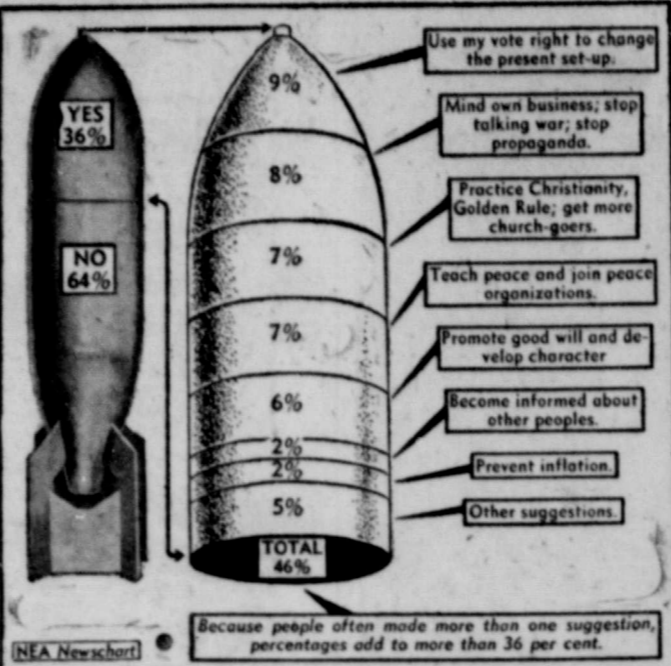
One skeleton was found with its hind legs neatly crossed, and his long tail wrapped around and buried up under his chin.

The remains include specimens of all ages, so scientists can trace the growth and development of the beasts, something that is rarely possible.

Relatives of the titanophoneus have been found in America, Africa and elsewhere in Asia. The ones in the United States are from an earlier age, hence more reptilian. Those from Africa are from a later age, hence mammalian. Titanophoneus is one of the few perfect examples in the paleontological handbook showing the mechanics of evolution.

The ocean holds 10,000,000,000 tons of gold, according to the Encyclopaedia Britannica, but no commercial profitable way has been found to extract it.

'How Can You Help Prevent War?'

Success Story From Deep South

DOTHAN, Ala. (UP)—This is an unusual kind of success story.

When Willie Reed, 39, Dothan Negro, drives his tractor proudly by, people here know they are looking at a man who deliberately broke the law to become a respectable and good citizen.

In 1931, Reed fell beneath a freight train near Albany, Ga. Both legs were severed below the knees.

Reed had always been a good worker, and Dothan white employers had found that they could always trust him with their jobs.

Minus his legs and with no way to make a living Reed turned to bootlegging. His only means of locomotion was a small wooden platform on wheels, on which he sat and pushed around by hand like Porgy, in "Porgy and Bess."

From 1931 to 1937 were hard years for the youth. An illicit business is difficult to conduct, even with full facilities.

Several times Reed was ques-

tioned by Dothan police. Some say the police may have looked the other way occasionally. But Reed always told his customers that when he got money for new artificial legs he was through with selling whiskey.

It was a long, hard pull to the \$350 goal which Reed had set for himself. But in 1937 he made it. He walked awkwardly on his new legs at first and took many a tumble. But Reed kept trying and he mastered them.

Before his accident, Reed had driven a lumber company tractor. A "whole man" again, he turned back to the lumber industry. He worked for several companies as tractor operator.

He admits that his new legs aren't as good as the original ones, "but I believe I can drive a tractor better now than I could then."

Reed said he hadn't sold any whiskey since the day he got his new legs and that he doesn't intend to.

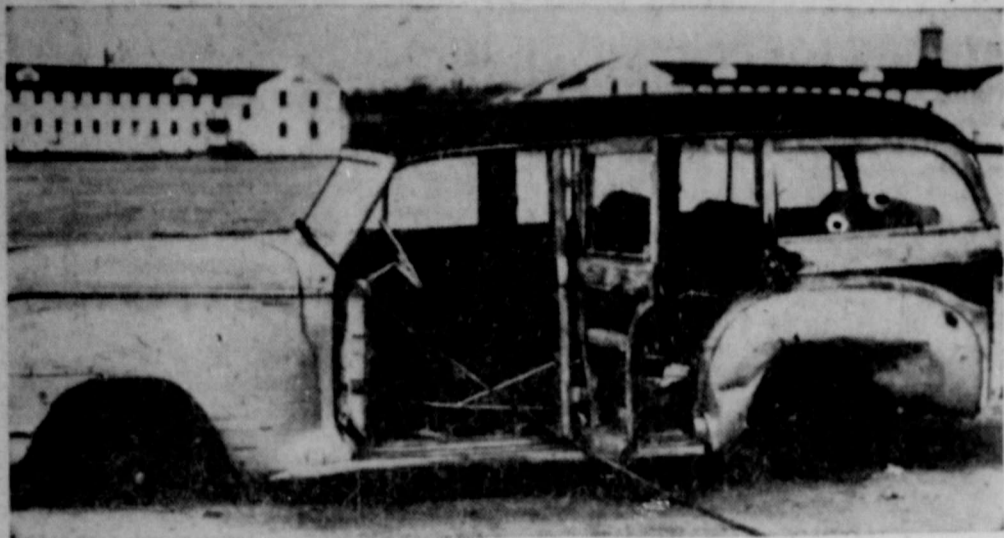

Hitler Manuscripts Go To University

PHILADELPHIA (UP)—An ex-staff sergeant has given the University of Pennsylvania two valuable manuscripts dealing with Adolf Hitler's direction of German

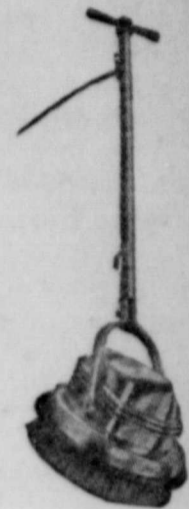

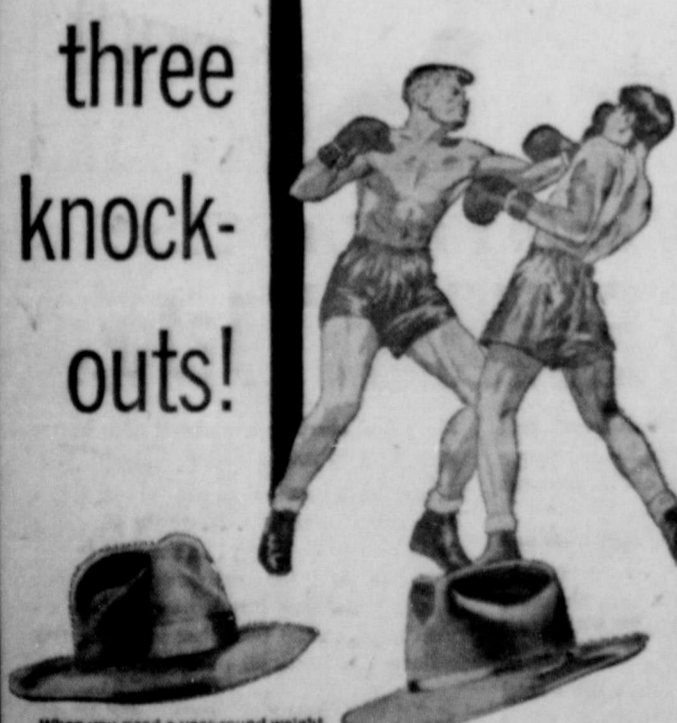
