WASHINGTON COLUMN

WASHINGTON, D. C.—(NEA)—An organized drive by the oil and gas industries to prevent the Federal Power Commission from assuming complete control over production and gathering of natural gas has opened in Washington.

Under the industry's new proposals, rate-making powers of the FPC over production and sale of natural gas going into interstate commerce would be limited in such a way that the commission would have to allow gas companies to pay higher field prices for gas consumers. Under present procedure FPC will allow gas companies to pay the going field price only if the gas is purchased from other companies "at arm's length."

Another possible outcome of the industry's drive against the commission would be that any national plan for conservation of America's estimated 200 trillion cubic feet of gas reserves—a 50-year supply at current rates of consumption—would be made virtually impossible since all production and final distribution controls would be left to state public utilities authorities.

Vehicle by which the oil and gas industries hope to put these curbs on FPC authority is a series of amendments to the Natural Gas Act of 1938 being sponsored by congressmen.

REAL backers of the legislation, however, are the Independent Natural Gas Assn., the Independent Petroleum Assn., and the American Petroleum Institute, trade associations which represent practically all U. S. oil and gas interests lobbying for its passage.

Points at issue are pretty technical for the average consumer who cooks or heats with gas, but a little background will show why the industry wants its amendments rushed through now.

In September, 1944, the commission ordered a national investigation of natural gas reserves, their expected life for industrial, commercial and domestic use, and their competition with other fuels.

Hearings got under way a year later and ended last August. First section of the report was issued in January, and four more sections were issued early in March. This is about half the report, which won't be completed for another two or three months. It is the Federal Power Commission's belief that any recommendations made in the Natural Gas Act should await completion of the report.

No sooner has the first section of the preliminary draft of the report been issued for comment than William R. Boyd, president of the Petroleum Institute, and spokesman for the independent gas and petroleum groups, served notice on FPC Chairman Nelson Lee Smith that they thought the Natural Gas Act should be amended immediately.

WHAT the industry really fears is that the FPC will take over control of the end use of natural gas, as well as its production and gathering. There are about 425,000 U. S. oil wells. Nearly all produce some gas, and about 40 per cent of the natural gas now consumed is produced in such wells.

Under FPC regulations, whenever the gas from an oil well gets into interstate commerce, the oil producer may be declared a natural gas producer. All natural gas producers in interstate commerce must keep books under FPC accounting methods. And sale price of their gas may be limited to a 4 1/2 per cent return on the depreciated original cost of the producing well.

Here is the real heart of what the oil and gas companies don't like. They don't want to be forced to keep books as the FPC directs, and they don't want their profits limited.

The industry claims this price-fixing by the FPC has held back production, stopped exploration for new wells, and caused many well owners to flare and waste their gas, rather than sell it subject to FPC regulation.

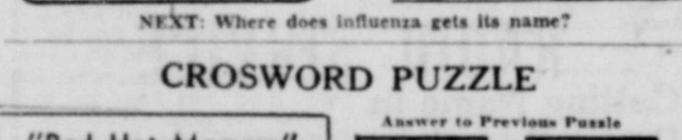



## Steel Production Slowly Nears Wartime Peaks

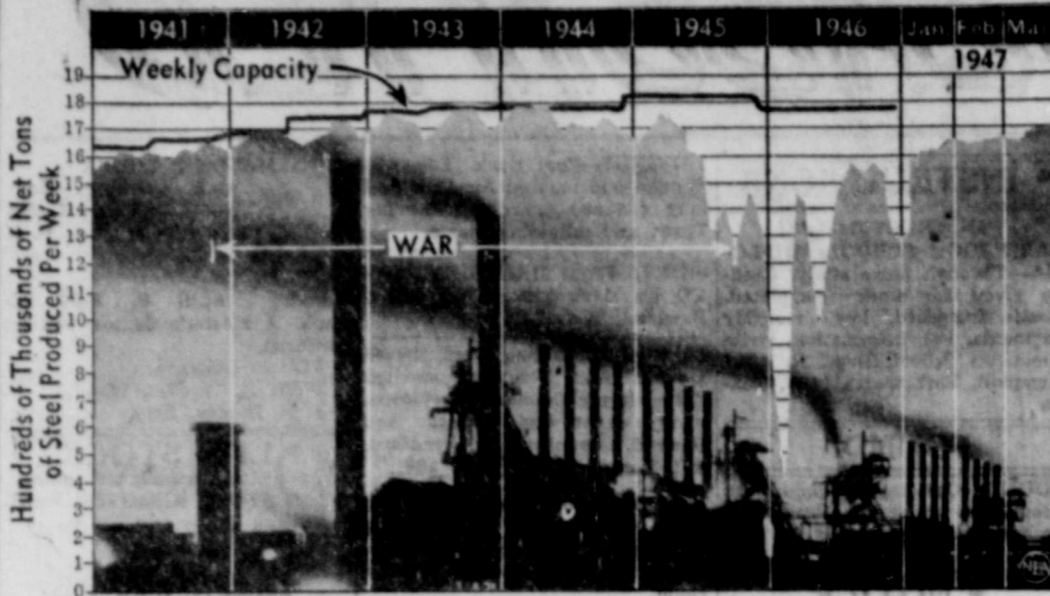


Chart above, prepared from American Iron and Steel Institute data, shows how weekly production of steel is climbing back, in 1947, from the lows it hit in 1946, when strikes and other disputes held it to only 72.5 per cent of annual capacity. During wartime months of 1945, operations averaged 83.5 per cent of capacity. Today's potential finished steel for peacetime uses is almost 16 per cent larger than in 1941.

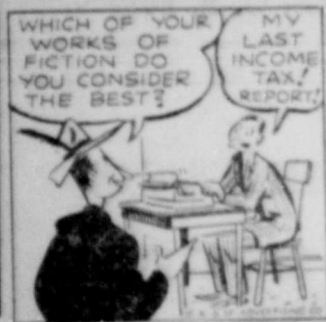
