WARDEN, YARBROUGH GET RANGER COACHING JOBS

A. E. Crawley, chairman of the athletic committee of the board of trustees of Ranger schools, announced today that Onis Warden has been elected head high school coach and Boone Yarbrough has been named Ranger Junior College coach. The two were elected at a meeting of the board held Wednesday night.

Coach Warden who was an applicant for the position received the full endorsement of Coach Eck Curtis of the University of Texas coaching staff and a man under whom Warden played football.

Following is Coach Curtis' letter: Dear Dr. Boswell: I hope that I am not too late to say a word in favor of Onis Warden for the coaching job here. I am of the opinion that Warden will do well in that job. He has had vast experience both in playing and coaching football, and he works to keep up with the game. I consider him very sound in his football.

Of course, you know Onis well. I am sure you think, as I do, that he also has a fine character and is the kind of young man you want in charge of boys. I hope you have already hired him. Best of luck to you. Sincerely yours, Eck Curtis.

Coach Warden who was assistant to Coach Jimmie Marshall here last year had previously been named college coach. He is a graduate of Texas A & M College and coached at Clarendon and Spur before coming to Ranger as coach. During his high school days here he was an outstanding football player and during the war served in the Navy in the physical education division where he did coaching.

Coach Yarbrough is a graduate of East Texas Teachers College and has coached at Throckmorton.

Union Agreement May Bring About Phone Strike End

WASHINGTON (UP) — The 32 day old telephone strike took its biggest jump toward a settlement early today when the key long distance union ended its dispute for wage increases of from \$2 to \$5 a week.

The long lines settlement came after 10 other NFW unions and at least four independents had settled their disputes and as a back to work movement was taking shape across the nation.

Twenty-eight NFW unions still remain out but negotiations in all localities were moving forward. Most were settlements so far had followed a \$2-\$4 pattern. Long distance workers traditionally are higher paid than other telephone workers.

Formal end of the long distance strike will mean immediate resumption of normal service in cities where other local disputes are settled.

Curb War Chests WASHINGTON (UP) — The Senate voted today to put local restrictions on union welfare funds to prevent labor leaders from using them as "war chests." The vote was 48 to 46.

Sen Testifies WASHINGTON (UP) — The government, in a surprise move, today called a son of former Rep. Andrew J. May, D. Ky., to testify at his father's trial on charges of war fraud conspiracy.

MCCRAW TO SPEAK AT SAFETY MEET

Former State Attorney General William McCraw of Dallas will be the principal speaker on the safety program at Eastland Friday which is being sponsored by the Oil Belt Safety Council composed of Eastland and Stephens counties and of which H. J. Tanner is chairman.

McCraw will speak at 8:00 P. M. at the Eastland High School Auditorium. Other notables scheduled to attend the program include Col. Homer Garrison of Austin, head of the Texas State Department of Public Safety, Capt. Musick of Austin, and Capt. Hutchison of Abilene, both of the State Department of Public Safety.

The day's program begins with a parade headed by the Ranger and Eastland bands and possibly the Cisco band, which will form at 10:30 at the Eastland City Hall. It will be in charge of Bill Harris of Eastland and will proceed down Commerce street to an intersection with Seaman street, turn north on Seaman to an intersection with Main and then west on Main to a suitable point where it will turn south to the City Hall.

In the parade will be cars, trucks and floats decorated with slogans on safety. There will also be a number of horses in the parade.

At 1:30 p. m. at the Lyric theatre declamations, essays and posters, featuring safety themes and which have already been adjudged winners in contests, will be given. The winners will be announced at the 8:00 o'clock meeting.

Demonstrations on first aid by Eastland Boy Scout troops and put on on the County courthouse lawn, and the "Maze of Fire" demonstration by the State Bureau of Mines, will feature the afternoon program. Those who have seen the "Magic Of Fire" demonstration say that if you have not seen it it will be well worth your time and trouble to be present for it.

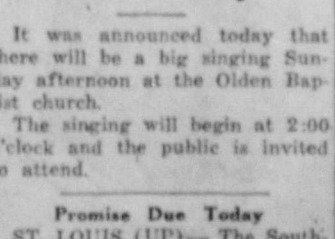
Company Safety Director Visits Local Gas Office

Representative Granted \$5,000 Bond In Shooting

OKLAHOMA CITY — Gun-toting Rep. Jimmie Scott one of two principals in a shooting scrape in the Oklahoma State Chamber yesterday, was granted \$5,000 bond today over strenuous objections of a prosecuting attorney who described the legislator as a "dangerous man".

After a hurried conference with his attorney, Scott agreed to return to the county jail pending a district court hearing set for 3 p. m. CST on his application for release on a writ of habeas corpus. The 34-year-old overseas war veteran and freshman house member from Holdenville, Okla., spent the night in a jail cell after wounding state Sen. Tom Anglin, 64, a fellow townsman, in a dramatic one-sided gun fight.

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LIGHTS NOW IN USE AT RANGER PORT

Lights at the Ranger Airport were turned on for the first time Wednesday night and from here on will serve to direct incoming planes at night.

Twenty cones topped by red and blue lights line the north-south runway and a blinker atop the hangar is a beacon to planes. Cones will also be installed along the east-west runway.

Gleason Romans of Tulsa, Oklahoma who contracts planes to the Gulf Pipeline Company for pipeline patrol duty was at the Airport this morning and stated that another plane has been stationed at the Ranger port for use in patrolling Gulf company lines. Ardell Kirk and Jimmie Phillips are pilots for the planes.

Romans stated that his company is the largest of its kind in the country and flies 7,000 miles a week in patrol flights. Romans further stated that pipeline patrol by airplane is proving highly successful with far more pipeline leaks uncovered than were found by the old system.

Another Team Enters League 2 More Needed

It was announced today that the First Baptist church will sponsor a softball team in the Ranger League this summer and this brings to a total of four the number of teams that have entered so far.

STATEMENT MADE ON HIS BIRTHDAY, V-E ANNIVERSARY

WASHINGTON — President Truman observed his 63rd birthday anniversary today by forecasting that the world would get a lasting peace.

Two years ago today Mr. Truman jubilantly announced to Americans the surrender of Germany. Today, he said that the United Nations—the organization which grew out of that war—would effectually carry out its charter for preservation of world peace.

Mr. Truman told a news conference this country had overcome a lot of problems in those two years and still faced many more. But the outlook now from his viewpoint, he said, was much improved.

And he still described himself as an optimist.

Other points touched on by the President today—

1. He expects a report very shortly from the special committee he appointed to develop plans for universal military training and he will attempt to get this plan through Congress this session.

2. He indicated he has no present intention to end the special Vatican mission of Myron C. Taylor, his personal representative to the Pope, as requested yesterday by the Southern Baptist Convention meeting in St. Louis.

3. Mr. Truman again expressed pleasure over the nationwide reaction to his appeal for lower prices. Asked whether we were over the peak of the inflation, he replied he never thought we were in an inflation and that what he was trying to do was to prevent inflation.

Urges UN To Make Palestine Jewish State

LAKE SUCCESS — The Jewish Agency today called upon the United Nations to establish Palestine as a Jewish state and called for immediate relaxation of British restrictions on immigration to the Holy Land.

Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, spokesman for the Agency, presented the Jewish case to the political committee of the United Nations General Assembly.

He charged that Britain has violated the terms of the mandate under which she has ruled Palestine through League of Nations sanction.

Silver told the UN that establishment of a Jewish homeland in Palestine would "serve as a great stimulus to the rebirth and progress of the entire Near East with which the destinies of the Jewish national home are naturally bound up."

Margaret Truman To Make National Concert Debut

PITTSBURGH — Margaret Truman, daughter of the President, will make her national concert debut in Pittsburgh May 20. It was announced today by Tom Beegle, manager of Beegle Concerts.

The tour will carry Miss Truman to Omaha May 25 for an appearance at the State Fair of Texas auditorium.

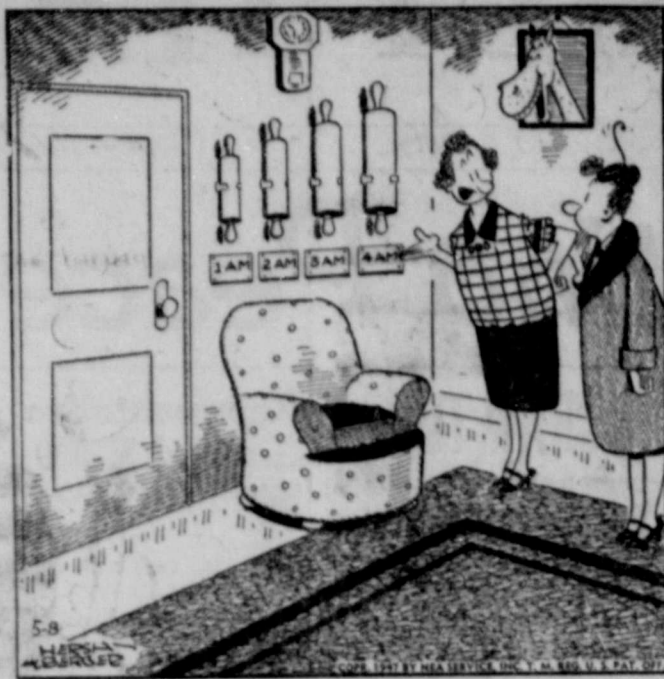

Navy Adds Frozen Foods To Menu

OAKLAND, Cal. (UP)—The navy is experimenting with shipping frozen foods with the hope of improving the bill-of-fare aboard ships and at navy posts throughout the world.

Only small amounts of frozen foods have been sent overseas, principally for use in hospitals, because the foods thaw quickly and spoil if left in the open air

in tropical climates. Chief difficulty has been the time required to transfer the shipments from one refriger ship to another or from a reefer to the deep freeze lockers on an island base.

To overcome that, the navy is using a canvas-covered, cork-lined bag which will hold 200 pounds of fresh-frozen fruits and vegetables. The bags are pre-cooled for two days at temperatures of 10 degrees below zero. They are filled and sealed in the cold stor-

EXPLOSION METHOD OF MAKING FLOUR TRIED OUT

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UP)—The Midwest Research Institute is planning a \$100,000 pilot plant to make commercial scale tests of its new process for exploding cereal grains into flour by compressed air.

Harold Vagtborg, president of the organization, called the process one which has "possibilities of revolutionizing the milling industry to the advantage of both the miller and the consumer."

Vagtborg said the significance of the experiments was in the fact that preferential separation

of the component parts of the grain thus can be obtained. He said wheat flour can be made free of the germ, something exceedingly difficult under conventional milling standards.

"We have reached the stage," he said, "where we shall need a large-scale pilot plant at the institute to make commercial tests. We are proposing to invest \$50,000 in equipment and \$50,000 in personnel and supplies to carry out the tests for two years."

He said plans had been drawn for a continuous process plant, with a series of explosive dissociators for cycling and segregation processes between each so that the finished product will be flour and by-products, or merely separated parts of the grain. Wheat, oats, sorghums and other cereal grains will be used.

C. J. Patterson, a trustee of the institute and a baking company executive, called the explosion method a process of vast possibilities.

"We don't know yet its commercial feasibility in the final making of flour," he said. "It should be able to simplify many of the stages in milling and cereal processing. We do not know that it will do things never done before and it may bring lower costs in some phases of milling."

Almost since the beginning of civilization man has prepared hard grains for food by pounding or grinding. First he used the mortar and pestle. Then stone rollers were used.

Modern mills use mere refinements of the grinding process, with intricate devices for separation.

The development by the institute for the first time abandoning grinding in favor of an atmospheric explosion to tear the grain apart, Vagtborg said he believed it opened almost unlimited

avenues for experimentation.

Bread so far baked from the flour collected in the institute tests, was rated good-minus by bakers. That was the same rating they gave a control loaf baked from standard whole wheat flour.

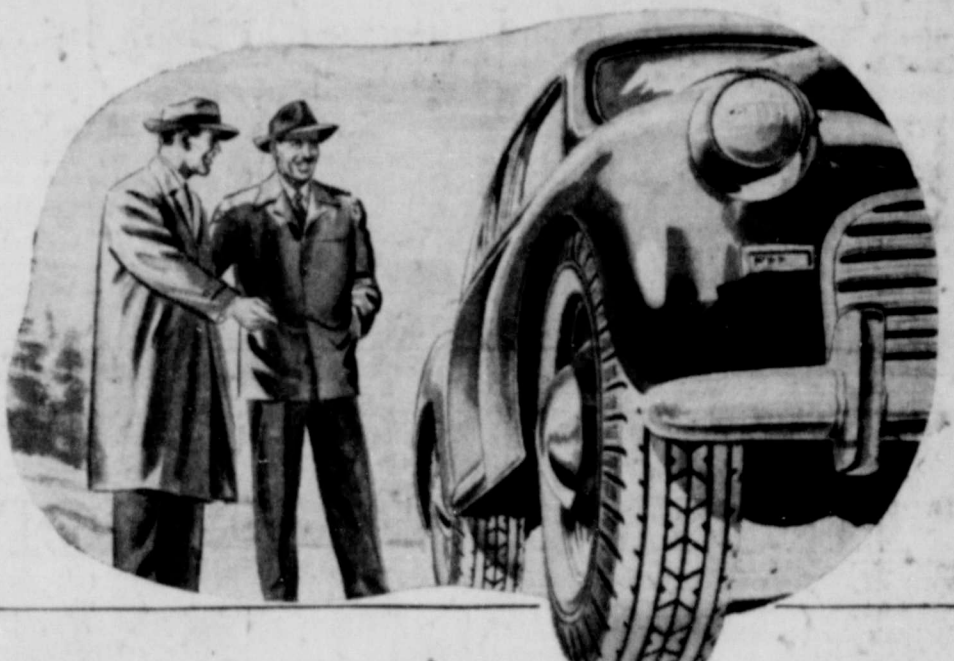

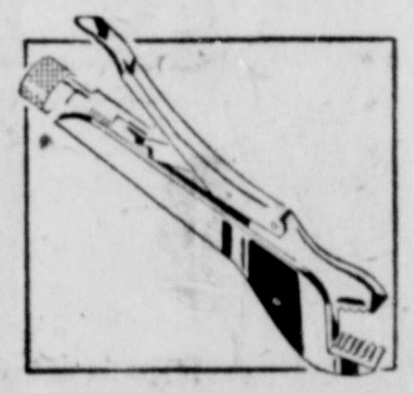

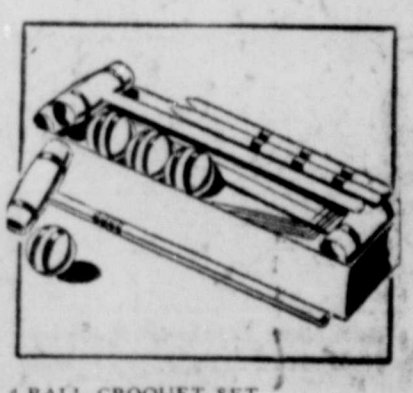

STATE PLANS X-RAY OF ALL ITS CITIZENS

WATERTOWN, Mass. (UP)—A campaign to X-ray every person in Massachusetts over 14 years of age in an effort to curb tuberculosis has been started in Watertown.

This city of 35,000 was chosen to start off the state-wide campaign because of the compactness of its population, its proximity to Boston and the interest shown by residents.

Sponsored by the State Public Health Department and local boards of health and health associations, the drive will be extended to other communities as soon as the Watertown project is completed.

X-ray equipment will be moved from one public building to another to make it more accessible and examinations will be by appointment. New type equipment will be used so that it will not be necessary for the person being examined to disrobe.

The examination is entirely voluntary and the state health department said it would serve two purposes—simplify treatment by early diagnosis and prevent contagion from persons who don't realize they have the disease.

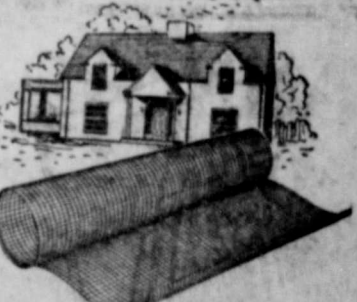

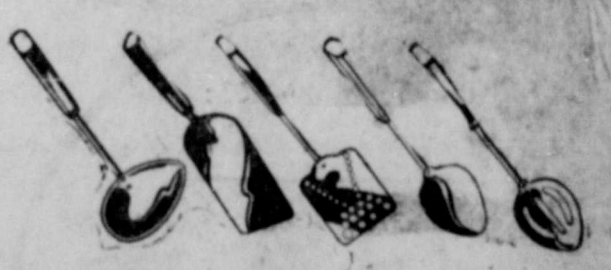

YELLOW BLUESTEM GRASS PROVES GOOD PASTURAGE

FORT WORTH, Tex., (UP)—A new excellent strain of yellow bluestem grass from the King Ranch is proving its worth in pastures over a large area of Texas and Oklahoma. C. B. Webster, Soil Conservation Service regional nursery division chief, has disclosed.

The SCS nurseryman said a number of farmers and ranchmen working with their soil conservation districts in the two states have successfully established the grass and harvested seed. Some tracts of the yellow bluestem have been grazed with good results.

Yellow bluestem is a cousin of the well-known native grass, little bluestem. A native of India, there are several strains of this grass, but the King Ranch strain never before has been available. The K-R strain, as the SCS men call it, represents a marked improvement over the common yellow bluestem. It is more easily established, is more nutritious to livestock, can stand up better under grazing pressure, makes more growth, is cold resistant, can be harvested for

shrubs was imported from the Orient.

There seems little doubt that the K-R strain of yellow bluestem will make its way to Texas, either directly or indirectly, from Asia or Australia.

As seed has become available at the Soil Conservation Service nurseries it was given to agricultural experiment stations and to farmers and ranchers who are cooperating with Soil Conservation Districts to test local adaptability and forage value.

Dave Foster, SCS nurseryman at San Antonio, has spent a great deal of time working to develop sources of the K-R yellow bluestem seed. He describes the grass as a perennial adapted to a variety of soils and rainfall. The early stems spread out and hug the ground, forming erosion-resisting matting. From the rosettes slender leafy stems grow two or three feet tall. These stems are pale yellow in the fall. The plants make almost continuous growth in the mild southwest and produce two to three seed crops each year. K-R yellow bluestem is highly drought resistant. It is so hardy that it ends to crowd out other grasses, especially the short grasses.

The European corn borer cost American farmers an estimated \$37,700,000 last year. About \$2,061,000 of it represented damage to sweet corn.

Students Too Bright Or Tests Too Easy

SYRACUSE, N. Y. (UP)—Too many students are getting "A's" at the Syracuse University graduate school.

The board of graduate studies reached that conclusion after surveying 2,279 grades given out last semester.

Among graduate students alone, the board found almost 42 per cent of the grades were A's, 51 per cent B's, about 6 per cent C's, and only 5 per cent D's and F's.

The board has called on a committee to establish a uniform grading system for all departments of the university.

Romantic Love Idea Called Menace To Marriage Institution In U. S.

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—A false idea of romantic love is in danger of wrecking the institution of marriage, according to a prominent sociologist.

In the opinion of Dr. Margaret Mead, associate curator of ethnology at the American Museum of Natural History in New York, the dewy-eyed "April-May" feeling of a couple for each other is expected by too many to last forever.

It doesn't, she told the national conference on social work here. And when it doesn't, she said, the marriage has none of the supports of 50 or 100 years ago to prop it up.

Those supports Dr. Mead listed as:

1. Marriage within the same social groups, as it existed among relatively isolated or stable communities of years ago.
2. Identical religious patterns of the man and wife; community morality.
3. Proximity to the elders, the parents and the older members of a community.
4. Pressure of communities small enough and stable enough to enable each family's intimate life to be subject to scrutiny of the neighbors.

(they) fasten upon each other the whole myth-laden aura of romantic love, marry without exploration of the thousand sober factors which should be taken into account, go to live as far away as possible, with a fixed belief that no marriage can succeed if one has to live with relatives. (they) bear children who are seen as a pleasure to be elected, or a link to bind the marriage faster, but in no wider social context...

ST. LOUIS PLANNING ONE WORLD FAIR OF ATOMIC AGE

ST. LOUIS, (UP)—Plans for a World's Fair in St. Louis in 1953 to celebrate the 150th anniversary of the Louisiana Purchase are being advanced with the endorsement of 110 civic groups.

An executive committee of 15 business leaders under the chairmanship of Stratford Lee Morton, president of the St. Louis Academy of Science, is formulating ideas for the international exposition.

Morton says that while four other cities are planning expositions soon, St. Louis has many claims on the 1953 date. He pointed out that in addition to the Louisiana Purchase anniversary, it is also the centennial of Washington and Westminster Colleges in the area.

The noted St. Louis historian said also that army engineers will

have completed by 1953 the \$30,000,000 canal by-passing the Chain of Rocks rapids in the Mississippi River. Morton also pointed out that studies of atomic energy might result in the fair being powered by atomic means and become the first fair of the atomic age.

No name has been decided on for the international exposition, but Morton suggested the "One-World Exposition," the "United Nations Exposition," or the "Jefferson Memorial Exposition."

Advocates of the fair point to the gains made by the city when St. Louis was host to another World Exposition in 1904. Streets were widened, buildings of great beauty erected and most of Forest Park, one of the largest recreational centers in the United States, came into being as a result of the fair.
