MR. APLEY OF BOSTON TUSSELES WITH BIRDS, BEES AND FLOWERS

Still maintaining his handsome dignity, Ronald Colman recently came out of a two-year self-imposed retirement to play the surprising title role in Twentieth Century-Fox's rollicking film version of John P. Marquand's "The Late George Apley" which opens today at the Arcadia Theatre. His role is that of a staid, prim and circumspect resident of Boston, who learns about life from a vivacious Peggy Cummins, sensational young British newcomer to the American screen.

"I have been reading scripts for the last two years," Colman says, "but I didn't come across anything I really wanted to do until Twentieth Century-Fox sent me the Apley story. This is the first time I've played a stuffed shirt; after twenty-five years in motion pictures, I finally become the kind of a man I hope I never will be in real life."

The actor disclosed that the script, prepared by Philip Dunne, follows the Broadway play treatment more closely than it does the Pulitzer Prize-winning book for which the studio paid a record price. This price included both stage and book rights. Also, Director Joseph L. Mankiewicz has filmed the story in much the same technique used for the stage play. The shooting followed in natural sequence instead of being shifted around as is the usual custom.

Colman explains his role in the amusing satire on Boston, its thinking and its customs as "the sort of individual who becomes greatly perturbed when he sees a chap in his shirt sleeves, and who refuses to let his daughter (and such a daughter!) marry a man simply because he's from that crude metropolis, New York. At the same time, he tries to prevent his son from marrying a girl from Worcester, Massachusetts, which he considers definitely foreign territory. His world is Beacon Street, and anything or anybody who is outside of the immediate environs cannot possibly amount to much. Boston is the hub of the universe, according to him. He feels that it is more than a city—it is a state of mind as well as the embodiment of all the culture of the ages. Every other place in the country is vulgar and common by comparison. Yet, for all this, there's a sparkle in George Apley's eye, and when he's dealing with such an irresistible young lady as Peggy Cummins, he's bound to become more than a little bit."

Vanessa Brown, Richard Haydn, Charles Russell and Richard Ney also appear in the important roles in the film which was produced by Fred Kohlar.

Germany surrendered unconditionally to the United States, Great Britain and Russia on May 7, 1945, at 2:41 a. m. in Reims, France (8:41 p. m. eastern war time May 6 in the United States).

The unconditional surrender was signed in Berlin on May 8 at 12:01 a. m. with orders to all German commanders of land, sea and air forces to cease military operations at 23 hours one minute Central European time (11:01 p. m.) May 8, 1945. (6:01 p. m. e.w.t. in the United States.)

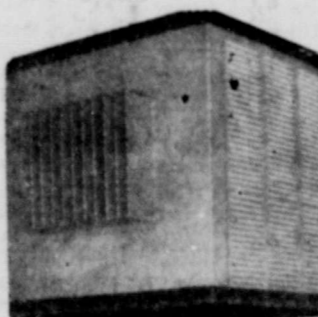
