

The other day a fella who used to be considered pretty important got up and said, "High prices of today are more dangerous to free enterprise than the Communist Party of the U. S.

has ever been."

It wasn't Henry Wallace who said this from a the Chevrolet Motor Division to soap box in Europe. But suppose it had been. The cries of anguish that would have arisen from Republican leaders, the NAM, and other similar minded parties would have been enough to drown the neighbors' radio. It would have been de-nounced as New Dealism or pro-labor, left wing opaganda intended to destroy the free enterprise

It may come as a shock, therefore, to know that the quote above came from good old conservative Alf Landon, addressing the Republican National

Committee at Kansas City. It was Governor Landon, of course, who led the Republican Party in the worst licking it ever got. Therefore, he speaks as an authority on what it takes to beat the GOP. At the Kansas City meeting of the party bosses he showed no restraint in giving them several pieces of

his mind. Among other notable quotes was:
"Congressional authority over tariff rates and excess profitsit should not hesitate to use by drastically lowering the first and taxing the second, if necessary—is a powerful weapon to encourage industrial and labor leaders alike to work together towards a sensible

WHAT the governor had to say to the party bosses, however, apparently went right over their heads. They missed the significance just as Republican majorities in Congress seem to be missing it.

The U. S. may miss the recession that so many experts are now predicting, but there seems to be a lot of effort around here to head

right into it. A little depression is even suggested in some quarters as a good thing. It comes from the same people who in 1941 were suggesting that a little inflation would be a good thing.

All the blame for this can't be put on the Republicans. They get lots of help from the Democrats. The only thing the Republicans can be blamed for is lack of leadership to head in any other direction than towards glorious hours.

towards glorious boom and inglorious bust. On this current issue of high prices, Congress got in its main licks ngainst stabilization last year, when the Democrats were in control. But this year, congressional aid to wool growers looks toward high prices. Removal of sugar controls looks toward high prices. The new Wolcott housing bill, if passed, would mean higher-cost housing.

DRASTIC labor curbs, the proposed freeing from government conrols in the public interest for the private power industry, the natural gas industry, the railroad industry, the radio industry and other special interests whose lobbies are hard at work in Washington, the abandonment of the reciprocal trade agreements which seems to be a definite plank in next year's Republican program—all such things can only make a lot of people think that some form of socialism might ot be so bad after all

The trouble is that the people who claim to hate communism the nost can't see it—can't see what another uncontrolled spree would end to. The last time it led to the New Deal.

It is difficult to grasp the 'congressional frame of mind on all this. Republican congressional leaders feel that the last election gave them a "mandate" to take off government controls, restore free enterprise, curb labor, cut government expenses to the bone. When Roosevelt and the New Dealers claimed they had a "mandate" from the people to curb industry and install tight government regulation over business, Propublicant said that was a let of possesse.

"We have a large number of old Chevrolet trucks still in everyday service in the Ranger area," Mr. Anderson said, "and the winning vehicle may be on a farm or engaged in some other hauling work right in our own community.

The winning truck, Mr. Anderon said, must carry 1947 license plates. The oldest Chevrolet truck will be determined by the earliest serial numbers. In cases where the serial number is lost or illegible. the number may be established by original bill of sale or other legal documents showing the original serial number.

Entries must be filed with Chevrolet dealer by midnight June 15. Mr. Anderson emphasized Only vehicles manufactured as trucks by Chevrolet are eligible and the search is open to all truck owners with the exception of em ployees of the Chevrolet Motor Division, dealers in cars a n rucks and their employees.
