Advise Against Doing Your Own Prescribing

AUSTIN, May 26.—"It is an unfortunate fact that some people are willing to risk their health—possibly even their lives—by prescribing for themselves and taking a drug that they have read about somewhere and which has been termed 'miracle drug' states Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Although such drugs as penicillin, streptomycin, thiouracil and sulfa drugs have been of great value in combating diseases that have heretofore been very difficult to control, nevertheless, they can be very dangerous products in untrained hands. They were never intended to be used promiscuously for self-medication," the State Health Officer asserted.

If a pharmacist refuses to sell a particular drug and explains that it cannot be supplied without a physician's prescription the

would-be purchaser should not become provoked. The pharmacist is giving sound public health advice and is also complying with the law. The State Health Officer declared that self-medication is never safe and that even "miracle drugs" should be taken only when a doctor prescribes them.

Harvard Brings Art Hoard From War Shelters

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (UP)—Harvard's art treasures are back from their war shelters unscratched. In the days of blackouts and air raid protection, about 350 paintings, drawings and prints, boxed vases, bronzes and ceramics were removed by truck from Harvard's Fogg and Germanic museums to Shaler Hall in the heart of Harvard's 2,287 acres of forest in Petersham.

The "exodus" started in 1942 with part of the collection going to Amherst and the remainder to Petersham. By the following year all of them found permanent housing at Petersham. Among those chosen to be sheltered in the forest were such rare items as "Christ on the Cross," by Simone Martini of the Sienese school, and "St. Francis Receiving the Stigmata," a 14th century Florentine from the workshop of Giotto. Part of the Grenville Lindal Winthrop at bequest, estimated at \$8,000,000, went directly from New York to Petersham. Paintings chosen for the shelter

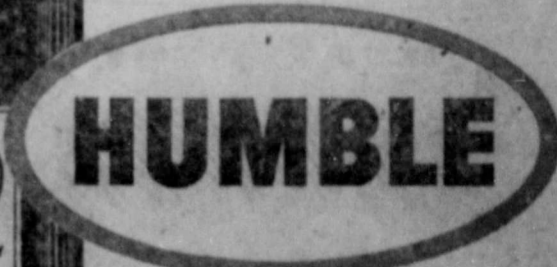
