Evans F. Carlson Marine Hero, Dies Of Heart Ailment

PORTLAND, Ore. — Brig. Gen. Evans F. Carlson, 51, Marine hero and leader of the famed Carlson's Raiders of World War II, died at Emmanuel Hospital here today from a heart ailment.

Carlson was brought to the hospital here last night from his Brightwood, Ore., home after suffering a heart attack.

Leader of the Makin Island raiders early in the Pacific war, Carlson suffered two heart attacks last November.

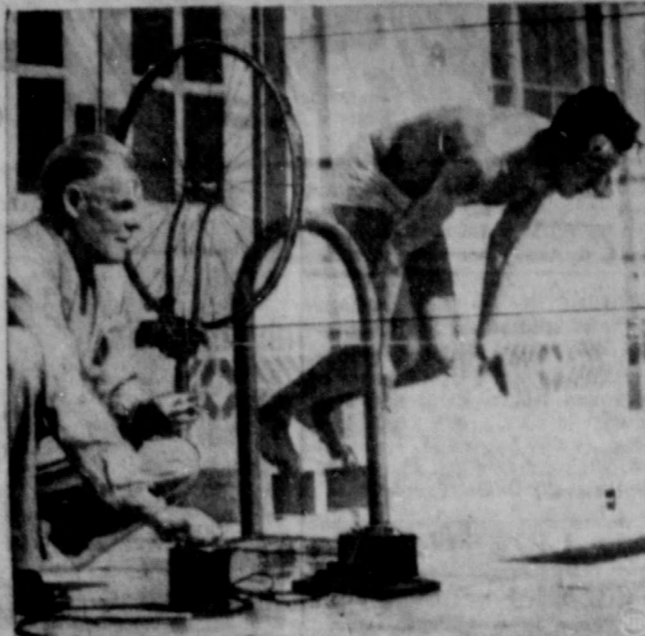

WASHINGTON — Business, though still good, has stopped getting better, the commerce department reported today.

While noting that business remained at a high level during April, the department said the uninterrupted expansion of more than a year was halted.

Both upward and downward trends were evident during the month but they tended to cancel each other out, the department explained.

Customer prices continued to rise except for food. That dropped 0.8 per cent between mid-March and mid-April.

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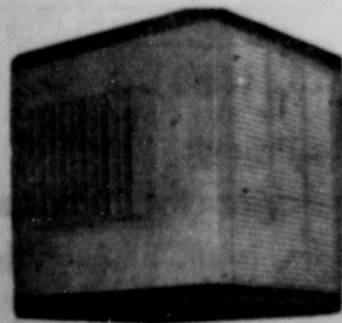
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
