WASHINGTON, D. C .- (NEA) -- Effort to change U. S. international aviation policy—substituting a single, U. S. flag "chosen instrument" airline in place of regulated competition among the 15 U. S. companies now certificated for overseas flying—represents one of the biggest subsidy grabs ever attempted in

As disclosed by Civil Aeronautics Board Chairhan James M. Landis in testimony before the fouse Interstate Commerce Committee five—really even subsidies—are now being sought for this proosed super-dooper airline, topped by a guarantee f 10 per cent profits no matter how bad its service might become or how much it worked against the national interest.

Two bills to create a joint international aviation company, owned by the U. S. airlines, railroads and steamship companies, are now before Congress.

Trey were introduced by Rep. Carl Hinshaw of California in the House, by Senators Owen Brewster of Maine, Pat McCarran of Nevada, and others in the Senate. Pan American Airways is the only U. S. company supporting this legislation. All the other airlines, the President's Air Co-ordinating Committee, State and Commerce Departments are opposing it. nerce Departments are opposing it.

SUBSIDIES which this legislation would provide are these: 1. A construction subsidy. If foreign plane manufacturers could build airplanes cheaper than U. S. manufacturers, the government would have to pay the American flag line the difference out of the

would have to pay the American flag line the difference out of the U.S. treasury.

2. An operating subsidy. If foreign airlines, with cheaper labor, could operate planes and ground crews for less than the American ine, the government would pay the difference.

3. An obsolete equipment purchase subsidy. If U. S.-made planes became outmoded—that is, if American manufactured four-engine propeller-driven planes should have to be replaced by British jet-driven planes—the U.S. government would be obligated to take the old planes off the U.S. flag line's hands.

4. A national interest subsidy. On routes that did not take in

5. A foreign subsidy offset subsidy. If a foreign government paid its airline a subsidy, the U. S. government would be required to match the foreign subsidy so as to keep the U. S. flag line in business on an even basis. This could lead to an international subsidy race.

6. A national defense feature subsidy. This could cover a number of things: Building of airports at strategic locations for the peace-time use of the U. S. flag line, maintaining a fleet of transport planes which could be operated by the U. S. flag line as a contract carrier for the armed services.

7. International mail pay subsidy. The U. S. government would be




