

Taken together, this phase of the Commission's report and the proposal of the Republican senators may kill off any action on universal military training for this session of Congress.

Yet the need for speed, says the President's Commission, comes from the fact that it will take five years to get this universal military training plan in operation. It will take a year from the time legislation is passed to train the instructors and get ready for the first class. Then four years more before there will be enough graduates to fill out the reserve.




