PARIS — Great Britain and France today invited 24 European nations to convene in Paris July 12 and discuss the Marshall program of economic aid to Europe. The invitation was issued by Foreign Minister George Bidault n his own name and that of Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin few hours after Foreign Ministe V. M. Molotov made a pre-dawn departure from Paris without fare wells or formality.

The conference call went ou after Bevin and Bidault had in vited all European nations excep Spain to join with them in plan ning how Europe could take vantage of the economic aid pr mised by Secretary of Sta George C. Marshall.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—(NEA)—One of the more pathetic sights in Washington is that of a diplomat out of a job.

He comes to America full of high resolve. He presents his credentals to the President with a fine canned speech about "the dorious record of friends between our two countries."

He hopes to continue same.

He entertains. All official Washington becomes his friend. He is photographed for the society pages, holding a glass and a glassy smile while gazing at some grand dame or debutante in fur and gazing at some grand dame or debutante in fur and feathers. Ambitious hostesses invite him places. He is somebody.

Then things go haywire at home. There is a revolution or a war. The boys from the mountains come down and take over.

The poor diplomat is out of luck. Being a man of some principle, he can't just turn coat and join the revolutionists. Besides, they probably don't ast him and don't want him. He can't go home, either. All he can is quit, with another canned statement explaining how things are despressing regret over the sad plight of his poor country. He becomes a man without a country. He can borrow money for while. But finding a job for an ex-diplomat is tough going. Grapus, traveled, well-educated, speaking half a dozen languages, there ill isn't much an ex-diplomat can do.
