

PRESIDENT TO SPEED TAX **VETO MESSAGE**

WASHINGTON - President Truman and congressional leaders agreed today that a special session of Congress will not be necessary schedule by sending his veto message on the new tax reduction bill

to Congress promptly. He announced he will veto the bill, which the Senate expects to pass today. The house passed it




